# FAILURE OF TRAINMEN TO HEAR TORPEDOES CAUSED C.P.R. WRECK

# **To**rpedoes put ON TRACKS DID NOT EXPLODE LOUD ENOUGH

Eight Persons Lost Lives in C. P. R. Wreck Near

North Bay. ONE SECTION STALLED

Second Part of Train Crashes Into Rear of the One

Ahead.

INQUIRY IS BEING MADE. North Bay, Jan. 26 .- An exhaustive inquiry was opened this afternoon into the cause of the rear-end collision near here on Sunday morning, between two sections of the Canadian Pacific express for Vancouver, when eight were killed and thirteen injured, among the sleeping passengers of the first section. Conditions caused by the severe subzero weather, which caused the first section to stall for lack of steam. coupled with the fact that the crew of the second locomotive failed to hear the exploding warning tor-pedoes set by the first train, are generally accepted as the direct causes of the accident.

Montreal, Jan. 26.—Failure of torpedoes to explode loudly enough to be heard above the roar of the train was the cause of the rear-end collision at Corbeil yesterday on the Canadian Padific Railway, in which eight or more persons lost their lives, according to reports reaching the company's offices here this morning. When the first section of the transcontinental train was stalled owing to the difficulty in raising steam through the extreme cold, its ing steam through the extreme cold, its crew went back along the tracks and fixed torpedoes to act as a warning to the second section.

The members of the crew of the second train report they did not hear the torpedoes, and their train ran on and into collision with the Pullman car which was telescoped.

# Unhappy Marriages Responsible For Many Suicides in United States

New York, Jan. 26.-American newspaper editors appeared immuno rom suicide in 1919, according to a tabulated report of 5,121 cases in the United States, issued today by the Save a Life League. Of the professions, lawyers led the list with 43, of whom 12 were judges; 36 victims were physicians, 28 teachers, and 11 clergymen.

The list included 20 presidents of large business concerns, and more than 50 prominent club members millionaires and wealthy society women. Unhappy marital relations were responsible for about 350 tragedies, including persons killed by the self-murderer. Men outnumbered women 2,987 to 1,657, but of the child suicides 252 were girls and 225 boys. Ages varied from four years to an even

NORTH BAY, Jan. 25.—(By Canadian Press).—The death of Mrs. Susan Pedan and her two boys in the train wreck at Corbeil leaves one survivor in what was a few years ago a happy and growing family. Her husband had taken up land in Alberta and is in Calgary awaiting the arrival of his wife and sons. Two older boys were killed in France.





THE CASE OF THE ALBANY SOCIALISTS The trial by the judiciary committee of the State Legislature at Albany of the five ousted Socialist members is exciting very general interest throughout the United States because of the important principles involved and because of the general excitement incident upon the various "Red" raids that have been taking

place. Particular interest has been given to the Albany trial by the fact that the New York Bar Association, composed of the lawyers of the American metropolis, has decided that the Legislature is entirely out of accord with the American constitution in the course that it is taking. A deputation, headed by ex-Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, visited Albany on the opening day of the trial, where it was re fused a hearing, but the fact that so important and conservative a body as the Bar Association should protest against the Legislature's action is significant of a reaction from the extremes to which the campaign against the "Reds" has been carried in the last two or three weeks. It comes at a time when a number of the leading New York newspapers are questioning the advisability of allowing local authorities here, there and everywhere about the country to in-

dulge in Socialist-baiting without regard to the

character of the views held by those prosecuted.

The New York Bar Association, in a public statement issued after the refusal to hear its representatives at Albany, contends that the Legislature is not warranted in the action it is taking, because the five men accused were legally elected, were admitted to the Legislature without challenge, subscribed the necessary oaths, have not violated the law of the land and have not misconducted themselves as legislators. While admitting the right of the Legislature to be the judge of the qualifications of its own members, it is contended that this is not an arbitrary power, but must be used in accordance with essential principles of representative government. Moreover, it is pointed out that by the constitution of the United States no other oath, declaration or test than that required by the constitution shall be required as a qualification for any office of trust, and the Assembly has no right to establish any test of loyalty or olitical principle as a qualification of memership in addition to the prescribed official

The contention of Martin W. Littleton, who s acting as prosecutor for the Legislature, is that the five Socialist members are advocates of an "invisible empire," the socialist state, contained in the American constitution, and that Incidentally there are charges of pro-Germanism made and the usual charges of holding ideas of "revolution by violence." Comparisons have already been made with the case of Victor Berger. who was expelled from the House of Representatives. In the case of Berger, however, there was the difference that he presented himself for admission to Congress while under sentence of twenty years imprisonment for violation of the federal espionage law, while no charges of a criminal character have been laid against the Albany members. A Canadian comparison might be made in the case of Louis Riel, who presented himself as a member of the Canadian Parliament while practically an outlaw from Canadian justice, and was smuggled drunken voice. into Ottawa, where he took the oath of office, but was later expelled by the House of Com-

The case of the Socialist members at Albany will hardly end with the decision of the Legislature's judiciary committee, unless it should find in their favor, which is unlikely. The case is one that will probably come eventually before the supreme court of the United States, and the decision there given will be one of the first mportance, determining, as it will, whether members of the Government may represent forces which aim at essential changes in the form and character of that Government. Incidentally it might be interesting to speculate on the chance that George Washington would have had if he had been cited before the colonial assembly of his day on charges of holding allegiance to the idea of an "invisible" republic.

#### THE KAISER-AN ESTIMATE.

In view of Holland's refusal to surrender the ex-Kaiser the following estimate of the former German emperor is of interest. It was written by A. G. Gardiner, the distinguished English journalist, and appeared in his book, "Prophets, Priests and Kings," published before the war:

"Remember how he disappointed expectation when he came to the throne. Germany was on the verge of war with France and Russia combined, and Europe saw the accession of the youthful kaiser, so hot-headed and impulsive, with fearful expectation. Here was a new Napoleon, filled with dreams of glory, armed with the most gigantic military weapon in history. And his first official word were words of peace; his first act to visit the European courts, returning with the message I believe that with the help of God I have succeeded in insuring the peace of the world for many years to come.' Set this and the record of his reign against those sudden ebullitions that seemed so alarming, but are really only sound and fury, signifying

"He keeps his powder dry and his armor bright. But he stands for peace-peace armed the teeth, it is true; peace with the mailed fist, but peace nevertheless,

"And so as one watches him riding down the rarks at Potsdam in the bright sunshine. hears the morning greeting rapped out in sharp staccato, and sees his salute to the empress watching the parade from the windows of the old palace, one feels confidence displacing distrust, and discerns beneath all undercurrent of purpose, making, it is true, for the aggrandizement of Germany, but making also for the peace of of the world. If he fails in his policy of peace, it will be because of the incurable air of falsity that is the besetting sin of German policy-a policy which has been well described by the Frankfurter Zeitung as 'incalculable, untrustworthy and disturbing.' It is a policy that always wears a mask, and a mask is a menace. Its words are smooth, its acts are sinister and seem to have no relation to the words. It exists even among the animals. But civilization is largely product of the acquirement of private property. All commerce, and all the prosperity that results from commerce, is founded upon personal acquisition. It is the desire to own, to acquire, to create, that makes fruitful the soil, that builds the city, that brings into existence all the machinery and all the arts of life. Without this constant incentive to action, this eternal spur to individual effort, mankind would still be in a state of savagery. This incentive, this great builder, Socialism would abolish. If it could achieve its aims completely progress would cease and man would inevitably revert to barbarism. This is no theory. It is proven in the results of the great experiment in South America, and in every other similar attempt the trend of retrogression sooner or later revealed itself. Socialism can produce nothing but unhappiness, because it must ever be at war with the qualities of human nature whose expression is essential to mankind's advancement.

The moral aspects of his conduct on former occasions do not appear to strike him at all. What he did was for Germany's benefit. Therefore it must obviously b approved by all men.

This moral obtuseness probably does not afflict the whole Teutonic people. The prospects of rejuvenation would be rather hopeless if it did. It is confined largely to the military and to the aristo cratic classes who held high positions in the government. But unfortunately these very elements are still powerful in the country's affairs, even though there has been an infiltration of a proportion

### CANADIANS A RACE?

A complaint that has some justification is registered by the Toronto Star against official dictum that there is no such race of people as Canadians. When the people of this country are required to make registrations for official records, as in the case of births or deaths, they must trace their origin back to some other country. Thus, in the latest registration forms issued by the registrar-general is stipulated that the terms "American" and 'Canadian" may not be used to indicate race. The form declares that these terms signify citizenship

The Toronto paper holds that the effect of this ruling is to declare that there are no Canadians in "Why should the state itself go to such great pains to repudiate her children, and insist, generation after generation, that they are but strangers here, and ever must remain so?" it asks. The people of this country, it thinks, should be encouraged, not forbidden, to look upon themselve

Many people in this country are undoubtedly ore Canadian than anything else. People whose forefathers lived in Canada for two or three genera tions have little of the racial characteristics of the countries of their origin. A distinct race of people has been developed in this country. The people of the old country do not look upon Canadians as English, Scotch or Irish, although they descended from those races. We are considered by them as a distinct race, but we are not permitted to con-
