AN INVESTIGATION PROPOSED

The Premier Denies an Insinuation-\$3,000,000 Loan to Montreal Harbor Commission.

Ottawa, June 11.-The House this afternoon discussed the resolution providing for a loan of \$3,000,000 to the Montreal harbor commissioners, which was reported. This evening, on motion to go into supply, Mr. Casgrain moved for the appointment of a special committee to investigate the Treadgold concession. The debate lasted until midnight, and was unusually warm. The amendment was lost by 88 to 40. Mr. Fisher's estimates were then taken up, and at 1:35 the House adjourned, having passed appropria-

tions aggregating \$97,000. GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC BILL. This afternoon Mr. Hyman, chairman of the committee on railways, moved that the bill incorporating the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company be referred back to the committee. He explained that the reason for this motion was that when the bill was before the committee it was decided that the railway should not build within 30 miles of existing or incorporated railways. The duty of drafting a clause to this effect was left to the Minister of Railways and himself, but they had been unable to bring the contending parties to agree to the terms of the






