## JAPS TO STARVE OUT PORT ARTHUR.

Paris, Sept. 16.—The Matin today published a long interview with Baron Hayashi, the Japanese minister n London, who is quoted as saying: "Before the war we demanded that Russia recognizes China's sovereignty over Manchuria. Today, after our victories and expenses, we are no longer content with our former demand. After the fall of Port Arthur our conditions will be still more extreme and after taking Vladivostock they will be yet more extreme

"The next battle will be at Tie Pass. We shall continue hostilities throughout the winter. We have given up the plan of taking Port Arthur by assault and will compel its capitulation by famine. Its fall would free 50,000 men and enable them to reinforce our northern army; but we do not need them just now."

One would expect that the leader of the Opposition would rise to the dignity of such an issue and discuss it in a large-minded way. It is his privilege to tear the Government's proposition to shreds if he chooses, but he should at least state it fairly. This he has not done. In playing fast and loose with this great question, Mr. Borden is not doing justice to his repu-

On the fiscal issue he straddles the fence which divides "adequate protection" from imperial preferential trade. The two policies are inconsistent, and one of Mr. Borden's followers, Mr. Kendry, M. P., has been candid enough to confess it. Canada cannot close her doors against British manufacturers, and expect a preference in the British market. The present Canadian tariff does not pretend to protect Canadian manufacturers at any cost to the consumers. It gives them a reasonable margin of protection, which has hitherto enabled them to supply most of the demands of the home market. Such a tariff affords a basis for preferential or reciprocal trade relations with the mother country. The tariff advocated by Mr. Borden does not. #### Gamey Climbs Down.

M. McEvoy, of London, who was junior counsel at the Stratton investigation, tried to intimidate Mr. Ga-mey by suing him for \$10,000 damages for alleged slander. The issuing of the writ was only a bluff. Nobody ever expected that the case would come to trial. The object was to frighten Mr. Gamey, and to influence the Muskoka elction by trying to discredit him. But Mr. Gamey went right on telling his story. Now the announcement is made that Mr. McEvoy has discontinued his suit.—Hamilton Spectator.

Mr. McEvoy's suit was no bluff, but it has exposed Gamey as one. The Conservative press reported Gamey as saying from the public platform that Mr. McEvoy was privy to the disappearance of the leaves in the Crossin cash book, which would have thrown light on the origin of the money. 




