





Sprague" is a member of the American Guild organists; also, one identifying him with a Masonic lodge in Providence. The prisoner was somewhat confused when asked whether his right namewas Sprague and finally admitted that it was. He strenuously denied it at first, but, on being shown the newspiper clippings found on him, brokedown? 
