The quantity entered for consumption was 2,545,935 proof gallons as against 2,687,664 gallons during the preceding year.

The quantity held in stock on 1st July, 1891, was 12,836,079 proof gallons, the largest quantity ever held by the distillers of Canada, the production, however, decreased to the extent of 899,363 proof gallons, showing that the increase output due to the legal requirements as to the maturing of spirits has ceased and the production is now normal, except so far as it has been diminished by the systematic smuggling of spirits, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. This, notwithstanding the efforts put forth by the Department of Customs, appears still to be carried on to an alarming extent, curtailing the market for domestic spirits, while utterly demoralizing the people amongst whom it prevails.

There appears to have been a decrease in the quantity of malt taken for consumption to the extent of about 20 per cent as compared with 1890-91, and 12½ per cent as compared with the average of the preceding four years. This is doubtless due to decreased production of malt liquors on account of the increase of the duty upon malt from 1 to 2 cents per pound.

A careful analysis of the product of breweries has been made during the year, establishing the fact, that as respects the great mass of the brewers of the country no attempt has been made to use sugar in the production of beer, though some half dozen instances have occurred in which the suspicions of the Department have been aroused, and further investigations are in course.

TOBACCO :

The following table exhibits the transactions during the Fiscal Year in Tobacco, Snuff and Cigarettes:—

To the Honourable

The Controller of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—I have the honour to submit herewith my annual report on the inspection of weights and measures and gas, with the usual statements in relation thereto, for the year ending 30th June, 1892.

1. The total revenue collected during the year for the inspection of weights and measures was \$38,549.66, as against \$33,662.23 collected during the year ended 30th June, 1891.

The total expenditure was \$70,052.55, as against \$72,305.22 expended during the year ended 30th June, 1891.

2. Appendix "A" gives a summary statement of the expenditure and receipts of each inspection division.

3. In appendices "B," "C" and "D" will be found a detailed statement of weights, measures and weighing machines, presented for verification, verified and rejected during the year. The number of all descriptions may be summarily stated as follows:—

4. Since the date of my last report, Mr. Johnstone, Chief Inspector of Standards, has visited the Montreal, Three Rivers, Quebec, Kingston, Belleville, Toronto, Orillia, Hamilton, London and Windsor weights and measures divisions, and inspected the books, standards, &c., of the several offices, and verified, adjusted and stamped the whole of the 50 lbs. iron standards in use in the several divisions.

5. Mr. Johnstone reports having found the work of inspection progressing satisfactorily.

Manufacturers of scales in Hamilton still complain of the laxity of inspection in some of the scale factories, and ask for a more uniform original inspection, which they claim can only be obtained by the appointment of a practical man to inspect and direct the work of inspection in the several scale factories. They say that to carry out what they ask for there need be no new appointment made, as they consider that we have men in our present staff quite capable of performing what is required.

6. You will observe that the revenue for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1892, is \$4,887.63 greater than that of the previous year, while the expenditure for the same period is \$2,252.67 less. The expenditure might be considerably lessened in many of the divisions without affecting the efficiency of the service by reducing the staff of assistant inspectors.

INSPECTION OF GAS.

7. The total revenue collected during the year for the inspection of gas and gas meters was \$8,693.75, as compared with \$7,947.90 collected during the year ended 30th June, 1891.

8. The total expenses were \$18,654.72, as against \$19,933.71 expended during the year ended 30th June, 1891.

9. Appendix "E" gives a summary statement of the expenditure and receipts of each gas inspection district.

10. The details of gas meter inspection will be found in Appendix "F." The result, as compared with last year, may be stated as follows :—

REPORT OF PROGRESS.

20. Since the date of my last report we have had apparatus made and repaired to complete three full sets. One of the new sets has been placed in the Peterborough office, leaving on hand two English photometers, one new Aubin photometer, one new ten-foot meter prover, one old ditto relined and repaired, and the five-foot meter prover which was removed from the old office at Peterborough.

21. In order to give more room and accommodation to the post office in Hamilton, the gas inspection office was removed to a room taken off the weights and measures office. The new office is not large, but it is neatly and conveniently fitted up, and does not in any way interfere with the weights and measures office, which is still sufficiently commodious.

22. The Peterborough office has been removed to the new Government building and a complete new set of apparatus fitted up therein. The office is small, but is neat and convenient.

23. The Lindsay office has also been overhauled and the apparatus thoroughly repaired.

24. I understand that Vancouver and Westminster, British Columbia, are likely soon to apply for gas inspection. In view of such application it would be advisable to have two or three sets of apparatus put in order and held in readiness to supply such or any other demand when made.

25. You will doubtless be pleased to observe that, as in the case of weights and measures inspection, there is an increase in the revenue of some \$745.85, and a decrease in expenditure of \$1,279. Under the amended tariff, which did not come into operation until the beginning of the present fiscal year, I look for quite a large increase of revenue from gas inspection.

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ANALYSIS OF FOOD, DRUGS AND FERTILIZERS.

To the Honourable Controller of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—I have the honour herewith to submit my report respecting the analysis of food, &c. ; also the reports of the analysts appointed under the Act.

The following is a summary statement of the whole number of samples reported upon by the official analysts:—

The following bulletins were published regarding samples collected and analysed during the year, and form an appendix to this report:—

It will be seen that out of 829 samples in all (including fertilizers and white lead), 199 were found adulterated and 60 doubtful. The proportion of adulterated articles is somewhat reduced by the inclusion of fertilizers—which were almost wholly up to the required mark of purity.

The report of Dr. Kenrick, of Winnipeg, upon the analysis of some 32 samples of milk will be interesting to those watching the growth of that new country. The average of the series shows as follows :—

No better proof could be offered of the nutritious qualities of the prairie grasses. These compare with an average, in Western Ontario, of 54 samples analysed by Mr. Harrison as follows :—

The examination of coffees continues to show shameful sophistication.

With reference to fertilizers a great improvement is reported by the chief analyst in the physical condition of the samples, while the number submitted for analysis has largely increased, indicating a growing interest among Canadian farmers as regards the use of fertilizers and an increasing competition among manufacturers to supply the demand.

Of the 42 coffees, 14 were from Halifax, all of which were adulterated with chicory, some to a large extent, and with two exceptions contained farinaceous matter as well. Of 14 from four northern towns, two in Nova Scotia and two in New Brunswick, 28·6 per cent were adulterated, 5 with chicory and farinaceous matter and 2 with chicory alone. Three of these were sold as mixtures, and not reported adulterated.

Of 14 from five western towns in Nova Scotia, 21·4 per cent were adulterated, two with chicory and farinaceous matter and one with chicory alone. Twenty-eight white leads were examined, one-half from Nova Scotia and the others from New Brunswick. Twenty-four were ground in oil, 41 per cent of which were adulterated, the remaining four were dry and all genuine.

Three of the fourteen from Nova Scotia were adulterated with barium sulphate, the amount varying from 7·8 to 47·1 per cent. In those from New Brunswick, one-half contained from 19 to 65 per cent of barium sulphate.

The spirits received were case whiskeys, with one exception, of Canadian manufacture. They consisted of one Irish, one White Wheat, one Canadian Scotch and thirteen Ryes.

Excluding the sample of Irish, the highest alcohol, 49·18 by volume, was found in No. 10767, the lowest, 38·75, in No. 10766. If 42·84 alcoholic volume were fixed as the limit, Nos. 10033, 10766, 10769 would be deficient in strength. Opalescence on dilution, with its own bulk of water, was noted in three cases, strong in No. 10029, faint in 10766 and 10768. The first Irish, the second Rye and the third Canadian Scotch.

Neither amyl nor methyl compounds were detected in any of the samples. I append a tabulated statement of results, arranged according to brand.

Of these 133 samples, 45 are reported as genuine, 58 as adulterated or as below official standard, and 7 as doubtful.

Drugs.

In some cases it has been difficult to decide whether these have been intentionally deteriorated or have been supplied in accordance with local custom, especially in the case of the important remedy P. Creta. Co. or aromat. c. opio, the British Pharmacopœia has been ignored and a cheaper compound substituted, in accordance with the American or German code; unless the compounds of the British Pharmacopœia are made by law, the only standard under which these medicaments can be sold, it remains open to a doubt whether their sale is illegal.

Liquors.

The remarks in my report of last year apply equally to this year's experience. I find many liquors diluted, but none adulterated by fraudulent addition of any of the drugs named in schedule A.

Coffees.

These, as usual, are still largely adulterated and not sold as a declared mixture to the public, and in one case the whole bean ground in the presence of the inspector was found to be adulterated, great caution is therefore necessary in the purchase of coffee.

Sundries.

The fertilizers and white lead samples are sold under terms and descriptions unknown to the local analyst, and will doubtless be fully reported upon by the department, and therefore call for no further comments from me.

Milk.

I herewith submit in tabulated form the figures obtained from the milks collected and examined since 1st October, 1891, and have the honour to state that the analysis was performed by the "asbestos method" and that out of 27 samples, representing part of the supply of Ottawa, Smith's Falls, Perth, Kingston and Cobourg, Ontario, two were found to be watered (No. 12003 to the extent of about 25 per cent) 1 probably watered, 5 under average, 15 of good average quality and the remaining 4 classed as partly cream. This result although satisfactory to a certain extent, shows that even in certain cities where municipal corporations have specially appointed dairy inspectors, some milkmen still continue to impose upon the public and authorities by distributing diluted milk. The mean composition of the genuine milk of each locality excepting the abnormal ones, is shown as follows:—

The figures thus obtained are, therefore, well above the established departmental standard of milk of good average quality.

White lead in oil and in powder.

Of these 18 samples I ascertained that 13 were good commercial products, 4 were bad, more or less adulterated and 1 was doubtful in that sense, that the other matters than the white of lead are in such a small quantity (2 per cent) that it would not be remunerative to adulterate; an accident or negligence may have occurred in its preparation. The white of lead varying very much in its different constituents (lead carbonates, hydrate of oxide, &c.), it seems to me that there is only one means of appreciating their commercial value and not their chemical purity, it is to dose the lead and to calculate it at the metallic state, and then find the proportion and nature insoluble in the acid. It would be desirable that the department, considering the act on *paints* should decide upon a standard in metallic lead which should contain the white of lead of commerce, first in oil, second in powder, in a dry state.

Coffees—Nine Samples.

The analyses was made according to Bulletin No. 29.

Moisture has been made, in duplicate, in asbestos tubes. Five samples were assayed in duplicate for fat, in asbestos tubes by petroleum ether. (Proceeding of Mr. Macfarlane.)

The specific gravity of extract at 10 per cent and results are concordant.

The bottle of specific gravity is a bottle of 100 grammes. Twenty grammes of coffee were taken, boiled during one hour, allowed to settle during a quarter of an hour, cooled and volume completed at 200cc., exactly at the temperature of $15\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ C. Specific gravities taken equally at the same temperature.

Two samples, Nos. 12101 and 12102, are strongly adulterated by chicory in the proportion of about 20 per cent for the first and 35 per cent for the second.

Six samples are pure ; 1 is doubtful—No. 12109.

Coffees.

Nine samples of ground coffee were collected in the city of Ottawa and received for analysis on 17th November last. The determinations were made according to Mr. McGill's directions, as published in the proceedings of the Royal Society in 1887, and are given in the accompanying table as well as in my certificate in percentage of the dry substance.

Two samples, Nos. 12045 and 12046, by the high specific gravity of their infusion, their deficiency in fat and soluble ash, and their almost total absence of caffeine, pointed to gross adulteration, which was confirmed by microscopical examination. Both consisted of the admixture of chicory, roasted wheat, beans or peas, with a foreign substance whose microscopical structure resembles closely that of coffina, roasted ground lupin seeds (Hassall's Food, page 159), or that of French lentils (Hassall, p. 384).

These two samples contain hardly any coffee. Chicory alone with coffee was found in Nos. 12043, 12049 and 12050. The other samples were found unadulterated. In expressing my opinion on samples consisting of coffee and chicory only, I have thought that the latter being added merely to impart a somewhat more decided colour and bitterness to the decoction, an addition of 10 per cent of chicory was more than sufficient for such purpose and would be accepted as "fair" for a "coffee mixture." I therefore return as adulterated those samples containing more. Thus, out of 9 samples, 4 were found pure, 1 fair, 2 bad and 2 very bad.

Coffees—Nine Samples.

The assays were made according to the Bulletin No. 29. The moisture was taken in asbestos tubes (proceeding of Mr. Thos. Macfarlane) and taken in duplicate on four samples.

The fat was dosed by difference (proceeding of Mr. Thos. Macfarlane) by extraction of same asbestos tubes by petroleum ether.

Three assays of fatty matter have been made in duplicate ; results were concordants, as can be seen by the accompanying table. The specific gravity was taken by the extract at 10 per cent in the specific gravity bottle (100 grammes) exactly at + 15½° C.

Five assays were made in duplicate on 9 samples submitted to analysis. Seven are pure coffees ; 1 (No. 12134) is a little adulterated by about 5 per cent of chicory ; 1 (No. 12142) contains very little chicory, perhaps accidentally, less than 5 per cent of chicory. Total, 9 samples.

The samples of drugs I have not classified in the table, for the reason that in some instances the impurities are due to deterioration, and in others, where the strength is deficient, I have no doubt it is due to carelessness in manufacture rather than with any thought of adulteration. I have therefore dealt with them under their respective headings as given below.

Liq. Ferri Perchlor.

This preparation should be of such strength that the specific gravity will be 1.11 and that one fluid drachm properly treated will yield between 3.75 and 4 grains of ferric oxide. Six samples were examined, which varied between 2.273 and 4.074 grains of Fe_2O_3 to the fluid drachm, and the specific gravity (except No. 10290) between 1.070 and 1.123.

No. 10290 contained 60 per cent by weight of alcohol. *Liq. ferri perchlor* is made by diluting the strong liquor with water to one-quarter its strength. The tincture of ferric chloride is made by diluting the strong liquor with one volume of rectified spirits and two of water. In the old Pharmacopœia, however, the tincture was made by diluting the strong liquor with rectified spirits alone, and having the same iron strength as the present liquor and tincture. This sample, No. 10290, corresponds nearly to the tincture as prepared by the old formula.

Apart from the error in substituting the tincture for the liquor, the samples while varying in strength considerably, were found to be free from all impurities or contaminations, except that in numbers Nos. 10282, 10284 and 10290, I found a trace of nitric acid. No. 10282 was much too weak, containing 40 per cent too much water.

Syr. Ferri Iodide.

Five samples were examined and were found to vary in strength and much more than ought to be the case. The weight of the syrup was nearly correct, but the amount of ferrous iodide contained in one fluid drachm varied between 3.62 grains and 5.95 grains, while the amount required in the Pharmacopœia is 4.3 grains.

Hydrargyrum cum Cretâ.

This is a preparation containing chalk with metallic mercury in a very fine state of subdivision. It not unfrequently, however, as found in commerce, contains mercurous and mercurous oxides. The only test given in the B. P. is for the detection of the latter, which when dissolved in dilute hydrochloric acid gives a precipitate with solution of stannous chloride.

I examined six samples, two of these were in good condition, three were slightly oxidized, while the remaining one No. 10293 was badly oxidized.

Various methods are employed in preparing this compound, those of the B. P. being simply trituration. I believe it was Dr. Squibb who proposed the use of honey or syrup in its preparation. This method was stated to aid in dividing the globules of mercury, and also to prevent oxidation taking place during the process. Traces of the honey or syrup would remain in the finished product and this is believed to prevent or at least retard oxidation taking place afterwards. It is worthy of note that the two samples which I found in good condition contained traces of sugar and were probably made by this process. The harsh action of the Hyd. c. Cret. frequently complained of by physicians, is probably generally due to the presence of mercuric oxide. As this is liable to be formed on the preparation being kept some time, it is strongly to be recommended that dispensers frequently apply the simple test given in the Pharmacopœia, which will readily detect mercuric oxide in very small quantities.

Pulv. Cret. Aromat. cum Opio.

In commerce this powder is found in a variety of colours, this is not always due to a difference in composition, but to the method of preparation and the only difference being in appearance. However, in the six samples which I examined, only one (No. 10298) contained true saffron. Four contained what is called American saffron, while No. 10291 contained none at all.

No. 10285 contained cinnamon, and in all the others I believe this to be substituted by cassia. An assay was made for the opium, and I believe all to contain the proper proportion.

Milk.

In the above table I have placed those as doubtful which came below the average given in Bulletin I, namely, 3.5 per cent of butter fat, and 8.5 per cent of other solids. Of the adulterated samples one was completely skimmed and four were watered.

The average of the total 54 samples was 3.97 per cent of butter fat, and 8.88 per cent of other solids.

White Lead.

Of these samples, two were dry white lead, and were pure, of the 16 samples ground in oil, 10 were free from impurities, consisting only of basic carbonate of lead ground in oil. Three samples contained a very material amount of adulteration, and three others which I have returned as doubtful, contained very small amounts of impurities.

Whiskey.

In the analysis of these samples I followed closely the process detailed in Bulletin No. 27, as given by Mr. McGill.

Coffee.

These were sent me in two lots of nine each, of the first lot four were adulterated, and of the second lot only one. The adulteration in each case was chicory.

Milk.

A special report has already been published in Bulletin No. 28.

Coffee.

Of the whole 37 samples 46 per cent were adulterated, 22 per cent being mixed with chicory and 24 per cent containing both chicory and grain. Some of these samples were, however, sold as mixtures. In those samples free from other adulterants the amount of chicory varied from 8 to 75 per cent, and averaged 39 per cent of the weight of the mixture.

The only adulterant apart from chicory positively identified was a species of roasted grain, a small quantity of which submitted to analysis, gave the following average results :—

In most cases, or at least in the case of those samples in which the normal microscopic characters had not been entirely destroyed in the roasting process, the starch granules agreed in shape and size with those of rye starch, being round or slightly oval and measuring about 0.002 to 0.04 millimetre in diameter. In a few cases larger granules were met with, indicating perhaps wheat rather than rye as the source of the starch. While I cannot state definitely that no other kind of amylaceous substance was present, I may say that all the samples which gave the starch reaction were found to contain grain, no sample in which this substance was not observed giving any blue or violet coloration with iodine. On the other hand some of the samples contained small quantities of a hard starch free substance, the origin of which was not made out. In mixtures containing nothing but coffee and chicory the specific gravity of the 10 per cent solution forms an excellent basis for the calculation of the percentage composition, 10 per cent solution of pure coffee and chicory being prepared in exactly the same manner as in the case of the sample under examination. In several cases where the coffee and chicory in the mixtures were coarsely ground, I was able to pick out the coffee from the chicory and weigh the ingredients directly, and, in these cases, obtained results within one per cent of the results calculated from the density of the extract. Where a third ingredient is introduced, the problem of obtaining quantitative results becomes far more difficult, and the figures obtained will contain a much larger probable error. Failing to get satisfactory results from the proportion of caffeine and ash in such mixtures, I have attempted to utilize the amount of tannin in the sample in calculating the percentage composition. Putting the average value of tannin as unity the results obtained from 12 samples of pure coffee varied from 0.93 to 1.18. I have also made use of the figures obtained by comparing the colours of the infusions. By combining in pairs the specific

gravity equation, the tannin equation and the colour equation, three sets of values are obtained for the three ingredients, and although a close agreement cannot naturally be expected, a rough approximation may at least be arrived at. In calculations of this nature much trouble is saved by starting with the specific volumes of the solutions instead of the specific gravities. The ordinary somewhat obscure specific gravity formula of the textbooks then becomes $100 V = p v + p' v' + p'' v''$, where V , v , v' and v'' are the specific volumes respectively of the solutions of the mixture and of the ingredients, and p , p' and p'' the corresponding percentages of these ingredients; on substituting in this equation the values for p' and p'' in terms of p (as found from the equation, for the other determinations) the final equation then takes a very simple form.

White Lead.

Of the white lead samples 6 out of the 18 (33 per cent) were adulterated. Among those classed as adulterated is included a sample of zinc-white consisting of almost pure zinc oxide. Apart from this the only adulterant found was barium sulphate, the amount of this substance present varying from 33 to 78 per cent of the solid (oil free) material.

Whiskey.

In addition to the ordinary determinations, I obtained the refractive indices of the original liquids and those of distillates of known specific gravities. From the latter results were calculated the refractive constants by the formula $v(n-1)$ in which v is the specific volume and n the refractive index. This constant being a function of the refractive index practically independent of the physical condition of the substance, should furnish a means of getting at the refractive constant of the anhydrous alcohol in the aqueous mixture. I reported the figures thus calculated in my certificates and though I have found in practice that the values thus obtained are not entirely independent of the strength of the alcohol, a comparison of the results arrived at with those obtained from pure alcohols, clearly showed, I think the absence of methyl and amyl alcohols in the liquors.

WEST—1891.**

SIR,—I submit herewith and recommend for publication, a series of tables, giving the results of the analysis of a large number of samples of milk collected in Ontario, Manitoba and the North-west in the latter part of 1891. Those obtained in Ontario were not only analysed by the local analysts, but the duplicate samples were also examined by myself here. There are, therefore, two lines of figures given for each of the Ontario samples—the first giving the results reported by Dr. Valade and Mr. Harrison, and the second line showing in each case the result of my examination. In cases where no “remarks” appear opposite my figures it is to be understood that the milks are considered to be genuine. It is interesting to observe how closely the figures of two lines agree, in spite of the varying distances which the samples and their duplicates may have travelled. This is, no doubt, owing to the voluntary adoption by the local analysts of the method practised in this laboratory. With reference to the samples from the North-west it was not judged necessary to incur the expense of sending the duplicates to Ottawa, and therefore it is only Prof. Kenrick’s results which are stated in the tables. I also send herewith the reports which have been addressed to you regarding these milks by Dr. Valade, Mr. Harrison and Prof. Kenrick, in order that they may be published at the same time.

SIR,—I herewith submit in tabulated form the figures obtained for the milks collected and examined since 1st October, 1891, and have the honour to state that the analysis was performed by the "Asbestos Method" and that out of the 27 samples, representing part of the the supply of Ottawa, Smith's Falls, Perth, Kingston and Cobourg, Ont., 2 were found to be watered, No. 12003 to the extent of about 25 per cent; 1 probably watered; 5 "under average;" 15 of "good average quality," and the remaining 4 classed as partly cream.

This result, although satisfactory to a certain extent, shows that even in certain cities where municipal corporations have specially appointed dairy inspectors, some milkmen still continue to impose upon the public and authorities by distributing diluted milk.

The mean composition of the genuine milks of each locality, excepting the abnormal ones, is shown as follows:—

SIR,—I have the honour to submit my quarterly report. During the past three months I have analysed 54 samples of milk.

The samples stated to be below average refer to the standard given in Bulletin 1, namely 3·5 per cent butter fat and 8·5 per cent of other solids, and it is more than probable that some of these are adulterated.

As the samples returned as "genuine" vary to such a great extent, I also give the following schedule, showing the average in the different places. This average includes the "genuine" and those "below average," but not the skimmed or watered samples.

The method of analysis used was the asbestos process, as proposed by the Chief Analyst, and the specific gravity bottle, and all the work was done in duplicate.

It will be seen by the above tables that while 5 samples are undoubtedly fraudulently adulterated and 6 more that may be considered doubtful, the average milk sold in the market in this district is at present of better quality than the average of whole milks as reported in Bulletin No. 1.

SIR,—I have the honour to present my report on 52 samples of milk collected during the present month in Manitoba and the North-west Territories.

Notwithstanding the great distance from which some of these samples were sent, the milk in nearly every case was received in a satisfactory condition. The bottles were despatched packed in ice and sawdust, but the ice had in most cases melted before the samples reached me and the milk was found to be at about the same temperature as the atmosphere. The weather, however, was cool at the time, so that three only of the samples had become perceptibly sour to the taste. The two samples from Moose Jaw seem to have been delayed on the way and were in a semi-solid condition when received. These two samples gave, on analysis, fair average results, and duplicate determinations agreed remarkably well; yet it must be remembered that analyses of such samples are not generally considered of much value.

The following synopsis of results shows the number of good, inferior and adulterated samples, arranged according to the localities where samples were taken.

In expressing an opinion as to the genuineness of a sample, I have done so in the same terms as those used in my report for last year—being those expressions employed in previous bulletins of the department. The expression “below average” has reference to the limit suggested by Mr. Macfarlane (Bulletin No. 1) for milk of “good standard quality,” viz., 3·5 per cent for butter fat and 8·5 for other solids. Milk samples classed under this head must be regarded as of doubtful purity, being either good milk more or less skimmed or watered, or poor milk naturally deficient in butter fat or other solids—the variations from the standard being too small to warrant the analyst in certifying the samples as adulterated.

But apart from doubtful samples thus classed, in reporting samples as actually adulterated, I have employed the standards of the Society of Public Analysts, *i. e.*, 3 per cent for fat and 8·5 per cent for other solids. The number of samples below these limits is less than 8 per cent of the number, while these taken together with the samples classed as “below average” constitutes about 19 per cent of the whole.

In my last report on milk I called attention to the fact that the averages for Manitoba milk were considerably higher than the averages for other parts of Canada, and questioned the propriety of adopting a uniform standard for the whole Dominion. The former samples analysed were nearly all taken in the city of Winnipeg and at a time of year most favourable to high averages. The averages for the present series come out close to those obtained before, the butter fat being slightly lower and the other solids rather higher than last year's figures.

As in my former report, these averages are calculated on the whole series of analysis—including those of genuine, doubtful and adulterated samples, as well as of those samples in which the fat is abnormally high. The explanation I suggested before for the high yield of fat in certain samples would of course equally well explain the lowness of the fat in those samples classed as “partly skimmed.” But not in every case can an unusually high figure for fat be explained on the assumption that the milk was not mixed when the sample was taken, for in some of these rich samples a high yield of fat is accompanied by high non-fatty solids, whereas the addition of cream to the milk would tend to lower the percentage of other solids.

The method used for these analyses was the same as that employed last year, viz., the asbestos method, devised by Mr. Macfarlane for use in the Inland Revenue Laboratory at Ottawa.

APPENDIX C.

BULLETIN No 29.—COFFEE—1891.

E. MIALL, Esq.,

Commissioner of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions, a large number of samples of coffee were collected throughout the Dominion in October, November and December of last year, and submitted to the various district analysts for analysis. Many of them were found to be adulterated, and twenty-seven of the most flagrant cases were selected for prosecution. Fourteen of the delinquents, on being required to pay the cost of procuring and analysing the samples (as provided by subsection 2 of section 11 of the Adulteration Act), amounting in each case to \$14, complied with the demand. The remaining thirteen were sued, five of them convicted, and the remaining eight cases are still in litigation. There were, however, a great many instances in which the article was sold as a "compound" or "mixture," either verbally, or having one of these words written or printed on the package. Very frequently, however, the word was placed in obscure positions and not by any means in "conspicuous characters," as required by the Act. These "compounds" were very often remarkable for the very small amount of coffee they contained, and it would seem to be necessary that the public should be informed of their true character and origin, as well as of the names of the manufacturers and dealers who produce and sell a genuine coffee. I beg, therefore, to present this report and the tables attached to it, giving the information referred to and the particulars of the analyses, and respectfully request that you will authorize their publication.

Not only were the samples analysed by the several district analysts, whose results are given in the upper line of figures placed opposite to each sample in the tables, but very many of them were subjected to an additional examination in this laboratory, the particulars of which are to be found on the second line, underneath the figures of the official analysts. It may be mentioned that among the figures obtained in this laboratory there are some which were obtained by a new and more expeditious method. This consists in introducing the portion to be operated on of the properly ground sample into and among asbestos, or rather crysotile fibre, contained in a glass tube of the same construction as used in milk analysis, the tube and fibre having been previously dried and weighed. The tube and contents are then subjected to the following operations: (1) Drying in the water bath; (2) extraction by petroleum ether; (3) exhaustion by alcohol or water; and from the loss in weight sustained in each operation, the quantity of moisture, fat, alcohol or water extract are respectively obtained. With regard to the three latter percentages they are always calculated upon the dry substance. The results thus obtained are quite interesting.

The fat in pure coffee varies from 10 to 12.50 per cent. Several of the district analysts obtained higher figures, but this is probably owing to the use of ethylic ether in the extraction instead of petroleum ether. The quality of the latter used in this laboratory is obtained by distillation from "deodorized gasoline," at temperatures varying from 60° to 80° C. The percentage of fat contained in adulterated coffees varies from 12 to 1 per cent, and as a general rule it may be assumed that the lower the percentage of fat the greater is the amount of adulterant added to the pure coffee. It would, however, be unsafe to depend entirely upon this, as there is nothing to prevent the manufacturer from introducing foreign fat into the mixture, if he finds it to his interest to do so.

With reference to the quantity of substances removable when exhausted with 90 per cent alcohol in a Soxhlet or Stutzer tube, it varies in the case of pure coffee from 9 to 16 per cent. Adulterated samples show much higher figures, varying from 15 to 35 per cent, owing, no doubt, to the sugars contained in the adulterants used. When hot water is used for exhausting the samples, the percentage of soluble substances is much greater. According to Kœnig, the average quantity of substances removed from pure coffee by the ordinary domestic treatment is 25.5 per cent. Coffee substitutes, on the other hand, lose from 21.55 to 73.91 per cent. The figures obtained in this laboratory in treating pure coffees vary from 21.50 to 26.50, and average about 24 per cent. In the case of adulterated samples, the soluble matter varies in amount from 25 to 68 per cent, the high figures being always occasioned by the caramel, gum, soluble starch and dextrine contained in the substances which are mixed with the coffee in order to produce a cheap article.

The manufacturers of sophisticated coffee do not by any means confine themselves to the use of chicory. Roasted peas and grain are also ground in with and sold as part of the resulting "compound." There are, moreover, large quantities of a substance imported under the name of "essence of coffee," for adulterating purposes, which is a species of burnt sugar, and, from its containing dextrine, is probably made from some of the bye-products of the glucose factories. It costs in New York and Philadelphia from 3 to 5 cents per lb. As it possesses no organic structure, it is apt to be overlooked in the microscopical examination. It contains about 75 per cent of matter soluble in water, which has great colouring power, and a little of it is capable of imparting a strong brown coffee colour to water. It would seem that the importation, manufacture or sale of such an article is as much deserving of prohibition as the manufacture of oleomargarine.

BULLETIN No. 30.—FERTILIZERS—1892.

E. MIALL, Esq.,
Commissioner of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—I beg to submit the following report regarding the agricultural fertilizers which are being offered for sale in the Dominion of Canada during the present year. The number of the various grades in the market is 74, as against 55 for last year. This probably indicates increased interest among Canadian farmers as regards the use of fertilizers, and certainly shows that there is abundant competition among the manufacturers to supply the demand.

These samples were subjected to analysis in this laboratory, and gave the results recorded in the following table (II). Two lines of figures will generally be found in connection with the name of each fertilizer, the upper one giving the quantities of fertilizing constituents guaranteed by the manufacturer or vendor, and the second line showing the actual results obtained on analysing the samples.

As required by the Act, this table also contains a column in which is stated the "relative value" of each fertilizer. This has been calculated in the same manner as for the fertilizers of 1891 (Bulletin No. 22), and the same rates have been adopted for the values of the fertilizing constituents. These values are as follows:—

There is a great improvement to be observed in the physical condition of the samples for this year. The coarsely-ground bones have disappeared from among them, but still some of the fertilizers contain such an amount of moisture as to cause their particles to ball together if kept long in stock.

APPENDIX E.

BULLETIN No. 31.—COFFEE.—1892.

E. MIALL, Esq.,
Commissioner of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—I beg to present the following report regarding coffee samples collected in April, May and June of the present year. The results of their analyses are given in the annexed table, the method of examination used being the more expeditious one described in Bulletin No. 29. The inspectors were instructed, in collecting these, to decline coffees when offered them which were labelled as "compound." In the table 141 samples are described in all, and of these 39 or 27·6 per cent were found to be adulterated. Those which were found to be grossly adulterated with chicory, or roasted grain, or both, were challenged, with the result that in the most of cases the vendor paid the cost of collecting and analysing the sample (\$14). In some cases prosecutions have been instituted which are still pending. For purposes of comparison the results of examining four samples of pure coffee of different qualities, ground from the roasted bean in this Laboratory, have been added at the end of the table.
