Second term cancelled

by R. Woodstein Funding cutbacks have forced the University of Alberta to cancel all second term classes for first and second year students, university president Never Horowich an-nounced yesterday.

New really have no choice," said Horowich. "The provincial govern-ment has cut back funding by 23 percent...in reality, that works out 0 66.5 percent, when you take institutional costs..inflation, and in-cidental furniture expenses into ac-count."

"We feel that first and second year students don't really need to

Horowich expects more offers as the news of the class cancellation spreads. Advanced Education Minister Dive Rustle could not be reached for comment. Assistant Deputy As-

Dive Rustle could not be reached for comment Assistant Deputy As-sociate Minister Jane Flunky issued a statement which noted that "cut-backs are an unfortunate part of the economic times...universities, as all institutions, must bear their part of the burden, and, in effect, suck it up."

Horowich denied that the move would in effect limit the accessibility of the University. "Most of these first and second year students drop out or change

courses in midstream anyway. They'll still be able to get into the U of A, but this way they can do all their decision making somewhere and not muck up our paperwork."
