## BOARD OF AUDIT,

December 12, 1864.

SIR,—We have the honor to submit the Public Accounts for the half-year ending June 30, 1864, in the form of which there is little change which requires notice, excepting that in the special statement of the Post Office we have introduced an account for Ocean Postage and that we have assimilated the Financial year of the Department to that of the Province.

As many branches of the revenue and expenditure are not uniformly distributed over the year, the accounts of the six months, rendered necessary by the change in the financial year, cannot be satisfactorily compared with those of the preceding year. For the purpose of this comparison, therefore, we have appended a statement showing the Receipts and Expenditure of the first six months of 1863; and with the accounts of the current financial year a similar statement will be given of the corresponding period from June 30, 1863, to June 30, 1864. Upon the present occasion this statement shews an expenditure, exclusive of redemption of debt, of \$4,991,425.39 in the half-year ending June 30, 1864, against a similar expenditure of \$4,212,485.97 in the half-year of 1863. Of this increase of \$778,939.42, \$219,325.15 arises from the annual payment to the Sinking Fund, which did not appear in the corresponding period of 1863. There is, likewise, the large amount of \$83,279.11 for discount on the payment of more than two years Ocean Postage in American currency. The heads of Militia and Public Works also exceed those items in the previous half-year by about \$50,000 and \$100,000 respectively. The remaining increase of about \$500,000 is in a great measure due to including in the accounts many items which are not usually brought in until the close of the year, and are represented by corresponding entries under the head of Revenue. But if the Expenditure has really to some extent increased, the Revenues, exclusive of the proceeds of Debentures and Sinking Fund, have increased in a much greater proportion—from \$4,023,284.52 to \$5,464,099.60, shewing a surplus of \$472,484.21 in the half-year of 1864, whereas there was a deficiency of \$189,201.15 in that of 1863, making the entire improvement in our financial position \$661,685.66. Nor is this all; for there is an amount in the Imperial Sinking Fund in excess of the debt for which it is held, which, at present rates, is worth about \$96,500, and which is available for other purposes. The whole improvement, therefore, may be stated at upwards of \$750,000, and that before the new taxes imposed in the last Session had come into operation.

One of the main objects of the establishment of the present system of Audit was that no expenditure of any kind should take place without the sanction of Parliament previously obtained; but at the time of the passing of the Act all the expenditure of the half-year had already occurred in advance of the Parliamentary authority. Under the old system this was always the case; but with the existing arrangements, when Parliament assembles at the usual time, and the Supplies are voted for a financial period which has not yet commenced, there ought to be no difficulty in carrying out the provisions of the Audit Act strictly. The half-year now under consideration, however, was a period of transition between the two systems, and subject to the old objection that all the expenditure had already taken place on the authority of the Executive before Parliament had been asked

to sanction it by a vote. All that could be done therefore was to go carefully over the ledger and to include everything in the Estimates, not otherwise authorized, which had already been paid or was likely to be called for during the few weeks intervening between the Estimates being submitted and the end of the six months. But as the last quarter's Returns of the sub-accountants had not been received, and the books had not been balanced it was by no means easy to make certain that everything had been included; and the consequence has been that these accounts contain, and it is to be hoped for the last time, no inconsiderable amount of unprovided items which are given in detail at Part II., page 83,

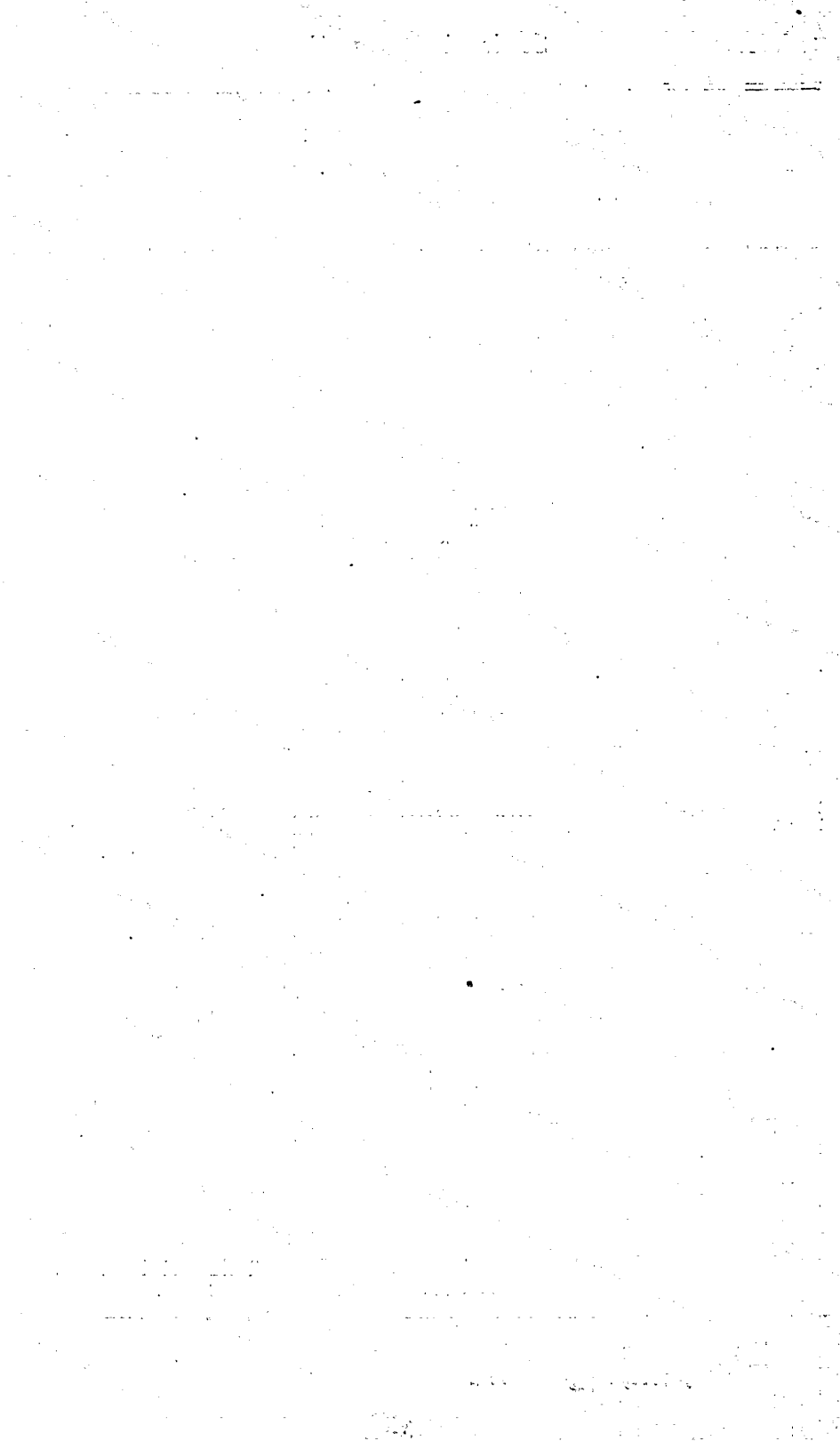
The Board has carefully examined into the peculiar circumstances under which each of the items came to be omitted from the Estimates; and it may be sufficient here to state that five of the items, amounting in the aggregate to \$4,866.66, were already entered in the books; and had there been more time for the preparation of the Estimates, the want of authority might have been obviated. But, with respect to the remaining items, amounting to \$32,105.69, the Estimates were submitted as prepared by the several Departments having charge of those services, and the Finance Department had no knowledge of the sums actually expended until the accounts of the other Departments came in, long after the Supply Bill had been passed. It must however be remembered that very little time was allowed the several accounting Departments for the preparation of their estimates; and, as the system to be adopted was so different from that formerly practised, it is not surprising that the first attempt to provide for everything by a vote was not entirely successful.

In connection with this subject, it may be proper to observe that although, under the new system, any over-expenditure upon an account rendered can be easily prevented by the Audit Office, yet in those services, the details of which are under the superintendence of other Departments, a very similar difficulty may occur even in the future. The Auditor is responsible that no accountable warrant or letter of credit issues for a greater amount than the aggregate sum appropriated to any Department; but if two or more distinct appropriations are included in that aggregate, the Department may over-expend upon one of them, without the knowledge of the Audit Office, until the accounts are rendered. It is true that under the letter-of-credit system the Auditor might refuse to issue a warrant to make good to the Bank the amount so over-expended, and it would probably be his duty to do so; but a debt would have been contracted to the Bank nevertheless, which Government would be bound to repay. It would be the duty of the Board of Audit to report the circumstance, and Parliament must decide how the money should be made good.

Sir,—The Act passed during the last session of the Provincial Parliament, entitled, "An Act to amend the Law respecting the Public Accounts, and the Board of Audit," having changed the periods at which the fiscal or financial year shall commence and terminate, the commencement under that Act being the 1st July instead of the 1st January, and its termination the 30th June instead of the 31st December, I have, in compliance with your instructions, directed the preparation of the Trade and Navigation Tables of the Province for the six months from 1st January to 30th June, 1864, covering the broken period involved in the change referred to; and I have the honor of laying before you the aggregate Returns, as compiled from the official documents transmitted to this office by the several Collectors of Customs, Excise and Canal Tolls, respectively.

The transition from the old to the new fiscal year has rendered it desirable to restrict the comparative tables in the several branches of Trade and Revenue to the six months of the preceding year only, reserving for the trade and navigation tables for the whole fiscal year 1864-65, the resumption of comparisons extending over several years.

The importations during the first six months of 1864 show a large increase upon those of the first six months of 1863, viz. :—

This increase is entirely in the importation of goods chargeable with duty; the value of free goods having, on the contrary, fallen off during the six months referred to, as shown by the following figures :—

Turning from the Imports to Exports, we here also find a considerable increase in the first six months of 1864 over 1863, the gross value of exports being—

In 1864,..... \$13,883,508

Against, in 1863,..... 11,966,895

showing an increase of nearly \$2,000,000, arising principally from the increased exportation of animals and their products, timber, lumber, and ships built in the Province (chiefly at Quebec) and exported.

The aggregate trade of the Province in Imports and Exports for the period referred to, thus represents a gross amount of

\$37,765,724.....in 1864

Against 32,060,135.....in 1863

being an increase of \$5,705,589 during the first six months of 1864.

showing an increase in the aggregate amount of the Excise duties on the two articles mentioned of \$141,481.26.

The Excise Act passed last session imposing a duty on Tobacco manufactured in this Province, having come into force on the 1st of June only, and all stocks of Tobacco then in the hands of manufacturers or in the possession of dealers having been relieved from the liability of paying the duty thereon imposed, the operation of the Act as a revenue

measure was almost wholly deferred until after the expiration of the period included in these returns, and can, therefore, form no part of the present Report.

That our Western trade has been considerably disturbed by the unfortunate war in which the United States of America are now engaged, is evidenced by the traffic through our Provincial Canals. During the first six months of 1864, the traffic on the Welland Canal was about 12 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. less than in the corresponding period of 1863, and above 3 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. less than in 1861. So also on the St. Lawrence Canal, we find a decrease in 1864, as compared with 1863, of 33 per cent.; and, as compared with 1861, of nearly 23 per cent.

Whilst, however, the trade of these canals, which are the great channels of commerce with the West, is thus shown to have fallen off, the local, or internal traffic appears to have somewhat increased on the Chambly, Burlington Bay, and Ottawa Canals, so far strengthening the inference that the comparatively depressed trade of the Welland and St. Lawrence Canals is mainly, if not entirely, due to the war as already adverted to—and that a reaction may be looked for, highly favorable to the traffic of our canals, whenever peace may be happily restored.

On the whole, the foreign and internal commerce of this Province, during the six months under review, give good grounds for satisfaction, inasmuch as the official returns exhibit increased trade in our imports and exports, and increased revenues, under both our Customs and Excise Laws.

This difference is owing to some Collectors of Inland Revenue not having accounted to the Accountant's Branch of the Finance Department for Malt Liquor made and returned to the Customs and Excise Branch, during the last quarter ending December 1863, until the 31st March, 1864.
