Commerce Marauder Destroyed by British Vessel According to Reports

Paris, Jan. 22 - Albert Thomas. minister of manufactures, speaking the death of Jean Baptiste Semanez, horted the Socialists to sink all their differences and merge their efforts dulent bankruptcy. Italian Liquidated His Bank At Commencement of War

By Courier Leased Wire.

Paris, Jan. 22-An alleged swindle stimated by different newspapers a amounting from 3,000,000 to 10, 000,000 francs was disclosed yester day in the arrest of Philippe Simo oni, of Italian origin, and Prince Henri de Broglie Revel. M. Simeoni was accused in 1912 of swindling the German Prince Friedrich Carl Zu Hohenlohe-Oechringen out of 500, 000 francs. The case was settled ou: to six months imprisonment for frau-Industrielle, which was a stockbroking bank. Prince Henri de Brogli Revel, was placed at the head of the institution at its president, Simeon taking the title of manager.

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Jan. 22.—"La Prensa" publishes a despatch from Rio de Janiero saying that, according to a cablegram received at Pernambuco, the British cruiser Glasgow has sunk a German commerce raider 130 miles off Para. No details are given.
