**Editorial Brevities.**

James Hill, the great American railway magnate, thinks the war will end by October. If Hill knew as much about the war as he does about railroads, we would feel very much encouraged.

The general command of the army of the Vorges, with the consent of General Joffre, has forbidden the purchase or sale of spirituous liquors in the territory occupied by his army. Violators of this order will be court-martialed and punished severely.

Of course we are interested in what Kitchener says, or Joffre, or even Lloyd George, but for real news of the day command us to what Jack Johnson says about Jess Willard and what Jess Willard says about Jack Johnson, and what Jelleries and Fitzsimmons and other great warriors have to say about Willard and Johnson.

It is very singular to note that there is not a journalist nor a printer in any of the jails or penitentiaries of the Dominion. There are preachers, doctors and lawyers and every other class. In one of the States of the Union 'the cloth' has the highest percentage, but there are in Canada the journalist is conspicuously absent, although there are many people who would like to see some of them within the caged corridors.

'A menace to our national safety' is about the mildest term used to describe the drink traffic in an advertisement inserted in the London Times addressed to the public by British business men. The advertisement states that 'total prohibition of intoxicants throughout the period of this war is the one and only solution of this urgent and pressing problem.' If this menace to our national safety should be suppressed in time of war the thought occurs why not suppress it in time of peace, also. It is equally a menace then.

**Buying Horses.**

The evidence given at Ottawa last week in regard to the horse purchases in Kings county for the militia department leaves a bad taste in the mouth. It is true there was considerable evidence to show that a fair percentage of good horses were bought, and that the average price was not too high if the animals were what they should have been. But when a witness, such as A. B. Harvey, of Aylesford, set out to tell with glee how he worked off ring-boned, spavined, broken-winded, antedelinian horses on the representatives of the government, and explained his callousness to the welfare of the soldiers by saying others were doing the same thing and that he expected the horses to die anyway before they reached the front, the humor of the business turns into another quality altogether and one wonders whether there are sufficient penalties in the law to properly punish the individuals responsible for such a dirty trick.

It makes very little difference whether the individuals belonged to one political party or the other. The vital point is that the lives and welfare of the soldiers at the front depends in a large measure upon the quality of the supplies furnished them by the government, and when dishonest contractors and greedy individuals conspire to palm off inferior goods in order to make a few dollars extra gain at the transaction partakes of the quality of treachery to one's country, and has none of the humorous elements of a David Harum horse trade. The redeeming feature of the whole business is that the government has not attempted to shield these transactions in any way, but has lent its best service in having them promptly investigated.

**New Theatre Bill.**

Nova Scotia theatre managers are protesting vigorously against the new Theatre Licensing and Censorship Bill now before the House of Assembly in Halifax. They argue that the legislation sought is unjust, unnecessary, and will add such a financial burden to managers as to ruin many of them. The censoring of films at Halifax will compel the four principal companies booking films in Canada to open exchanges at Halifax. The minimum expense of operating an exchange is placed at \$50, so that with four exchanges an additional burden of \$200 a week would be placed on Nova Scotia managers, not counting the salaries of censors.

**Lime in Agriculture.**

One of the principal functions of the Chemical Division of the Dominion Experimental Farms is to attempt the solution of problems connected with the maintenance and upbuilding of soil fertility. Among the many valuable results so far obtained in these investigations is the demonstration of the vital part played by lime in the increase of a soil's productiveness. The subject is treated in an interesting and practical way in Bulletin No. 83 of the Experimental Farms' regular series, by the Dominion Chemist, Dr. Frank T. Shutt, who discusses it under the following heads:—  
The nature of lime and limestone.  
The agricultural functions of lime and its compounds.  
Comparative values of lime compounds.  
The application of lime compounds.  
The uses and misuses of lime.  
Those interested may obtain a copy of this bulletin by applying to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

The Post Office Department, having given notice a week or two ago, in connection with the War Revenue Act, that all letters and postcards mailed in Canada or delivered in Canada, the United States or Mexico, and letters mailed in Canada for delivery in the United Kingdom and British possessions generally, or wherever the two-cent rate applied, should in addition to ordinary postage carry a one-cent stamp as a war tax, and also having notified the public that such war tax, while it should be paid preferably by the postage stamp marked 'War Tax,' could, if such stamp were not available, be paid by an ordinary one-cent postage stamp, is now issuing further notice to the effect that postage stamps may be used for the prepayment of war duties on bank cheques, bills of exchange, promissory notes, express money orders, proprietary or patient medicines, perfumery, wines or champagne, as well as upon letters and postcards, postal notes and post office money orders, the intention being to provide facilities in those portions of the country where excise stamps are not readily available. This in view of the fact that postage stamps may be obtained at all points over the whole country, in many places where there is no Collector of Internal Revenue and so inland Revenue stamps could be obtained, is a distinct convenience to the public, and no doubt will be largely taken advantage of.

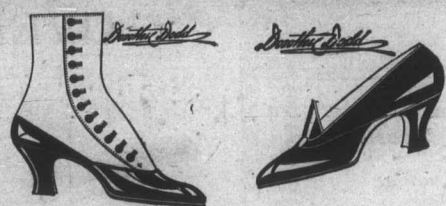

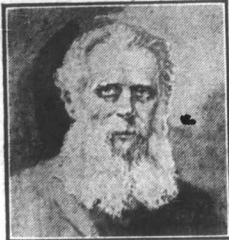
