## Wolfville a Shipping Port

THE NATURAL AVENUE FOR SHIPPING FROM AND TO A FINE SECTION OF COUNTRY.

It is the evident destiny of Wolfville to become the shipping port for the eastern end of the Annapolis Valley and that destiny will be realized when our people awaken to the fact and unitedly take the necessary steps to bring it to a reality. We have all the required conditions and all that is needed is the expenditure of a little public money. The harbor needs dredging, the wharves require repairs and railway facilities considerable attention. The government wharf is fast disappearing and instead of again replacing it the government should be urged to make the necessary appropriations for work inside the creek. It is understood that before the war the government had secured land for this purpose and that plans had been made that would have greatly improved our shipping facilities. This work, which was interrupted by the war, should be pushed forward with the least possible delay. Unfortunately we have no live Board of Trade that might take the matter up and present the claims of our town and sections adjacent upon the action of the government. However, the citizens should get together and at once take such steps as are required to launch a vigorous campaign in the interest of the scheme. This is Wolfville's opportunity. Grant it. Unless some improvement is made we shall probably lose the Parrishore boat next summer.

## Nova Scotia Egg Laying Contest

TWO ENTRIES FROM WOLFVILLE

The first Nova Scotia Annual Egg Laying Contest has been inaugurated at the Agricultural College, Truro, and consists of 30 pens of fowls, chiefly pullets. This contest began on Saturday, November 1st, and continues until September 30th, 1920. Each entry consists of five birds, hens or pullets, male birds being excluded in this contest. All the pens, with the exception of two are pullets. The houses have been erected at the east end of the Poultry Department, on a plot of freshly seeded ground, and contains four trap nests in each pen, also a dry feed hopper, grit shell box, a record file, a hopper for hard grain and a small wooden feed trough. The results of the contests will be published weekly, giving the number of eggs produced by each hen in each pen and also the weight of the eggs produced by each hen in each pen. A systematic record of the quantity of feed will be kept in order that at the close of the contest an accurate estimate of the cost of producing the eggs will be made.

Pen No. 5.—J. W. Williams, Wolfville, White Wyandotte pullets.

Pen No. 10.—Evangeline Poultry Yards, Wolfville, White Wyandotte pullets.

Pen No. 12.—E. C. Griffin, Port Williams, Rhode Island Red Pullets.

## Children's Aid Society Holds Annual Meeting

EXCELLENT WORK DURING PAST YEAR

The Children's Aid Society of Kings County was organized about seven years ago and the good work done for the children and homes of the county has given it good ground for its existence.

The annual meeting was held at the Town Hall, Wolfville, on Tuesday evening of the week. There was a good attendance and most interesting discussion took place.

Rev. Mr. Miller, who for several years has worthily filled the position of president, gave a brief outline of the work done during the year. A number of successful public meetings, addressed by members of the Society, had been held in various parts of the county, and a very satisfactory interest had been created. Fourteen children had been taken over by the Society during the year. The total number of children who have come under the control of the Society is fifty-five, most of whom have been placed in good homes.

The report of the secretary-treasurer was referred until a special meeting on Nov. 13th.

Mr. H. Stairs, the efficient agent in charge, more than any other person has done the good work done by the Society. He gave a detailed account of the work done by his department, which was very interesting and which was well received by all the members.

### Notes and Comments

Sugar once sold as high as \$2.38 a pound, but this was in the earlier days of its production (from 1351 to 1400). It had fallen to 38 cents by 1800 and in the United States the average price of refining sugar from 1845 to 1895 was \$4.38 for 100 pounds; on Feb. 21, 1895, it sold for \$4.93 for 100 pounds and the refined sold for 4 cents a pound.

A ten mile limit for fishing was the proposal of Prof. Prince, of Ottawa, at the meeting of the International Association of Fish and Game Commissioners, at Louisville, Ky., recently, and the other delegates thought it was the limit and threw it out. This proposal, if adopted, will provide work for several navy fleets and, it is contended, would be the most effective way of starting a war as yet invented.

Many times the man who grows up in his native village is regarded as a boy by his elders until he is well started down the declivity which ends in a hole. The stranger coming into a place may not be so honest or so upright as the home boy, but he is more often pushed to the front, because the transportation of the boy into a man has not been noticed by his everyday companions. #### Farmers Win Bye-election

Ottawa, October 27.—The political upheaval against the historic parties in favor of the agrarian movement, manifested so strikingly and dramatically in Ontario last week, has been carried into the federal field. In five bye-elections today, the first appeal to Dominion electors since the great experiment of 1917, farmers candidates swept three of the five constituencies, overwhelming government opponents in Carleton-Victoria and Glengarry, and administering an equally crushing defeat to the Liberal candidate in Assinaboia.

Government and Opposition shared the two remaining seats between them. Mr. Tolmie, the minister of agriculture, defeating a Labor-Soldier candidate in Victoria and Ernest Lapointe, easily triumphed over an independent opponent in Quebec East.

#### Edith Cavell

The exigencies of war brought out the flame of heroism in the hearts of unnumbered women, many indeed who were wondrously brave, wondrously staunch, magnificently selfless; and who today go unsung. Yet one fancies that upon the great day when all that was mortal of Edith Cavell was brought for burial in her own country, when multitudes everywhere from Dover to London where a beautiful service was held in Westminster Abbey; onward through the glowing countryside to the quaint old city of Norwich, that the spirit of homage was abroad, not alone for this one true woman, but for all the rest who had nobly played their part.

"Life's race well run,  
Life's work well done,  
Life's crown well won,  
Now comes rest!"

These lines from Edward Hazen Parker's funeral ode on President Garfield appeared in Queen Alexandra's writing on a lovely wreath of carnations and lilies, and it is said they fittingly expressed the spirit of the day.

In the shadow of that grand Norman Cathedral, in a quiet spot, that to one who remembers and loves it well; where always there seemed to linger something of the peace that passeth understanding, Edith Cavell rests. Surely in all the world there can be found no more beautiful burying ground. Just beyond stand the crumbling walls of the Lady Chapel, but there is life and growth, too, in Life's Green, rose bloom, as well as the lilacs and wild cherry, and the triangle of sward is green, so tenderly green. There are tall trees, too, where the rooks nest.

The Bishop of Norwich himself read the prayer of committal at the graveside, when the birds were already singing their evensong, and he spoke a few moving sentences of the Christian's sure and certain hope of the Resurrection. Then the "Last Post" was sounded, and all present joined in the Nunc Dimittis: "Now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace."

**Editorial Jottings.**

The Newfoundland election returns so far received indicate the defeat of the Cashin government.

Werner Horn has been sentenced to ten years imprisonment at Dorchester for attempting to blow up the international bridge over the St. Croix river on February 2nd, 1915.

The Alumni of Kings College have decided to raise the sum of at least \$50,000 to build a Hall for lecture rooms and executive offices as a memorial to the fallen soldiers from that college.

Before the next general election is called in the Province of Alberta the proportional representation system of voting will have been put into effect by the Provincial Government, according to Premier Charles Stewart.

Mr. Ernest C. Drury, who was last week chosen to lead the United Farmers in the Ontario Legislature, has been asked by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario to form a Government. Mr. Drury has asked to be given until November 14th to name his Cabinet.

As a result of negotiations which have been going on between the Kentville Electric Light Commission and the Provincial Government, the town of Kentville will, early in December, be supplied with electricity from the thoroughly efficient plant of the Nova Scotia Sanitorium. This will give the town a continuous service day and night.

The output from the mines of the Dominion Coal Company last month was 280,502 tons, as against 245,628 tons for the previous month, and 275,890 tons for the month of October, 1918. Additional demands for Cape Breton coal as a result of the British railway strike, and huge orders from the Netherlands and other Governments are responsible for the increased production.

December 3rd and 4th are the dates now set for the Provincial Conference called to convene at Halifax under the auspices of the Halifax Board of Trade to consider ways and means of floating the Old Home Summer and the World's Fair project. Factors are rapidly lining up that will make this conference the most important ever held in the history of Nova Scotia to discuss the industrial development of the Province.

The University of New Brunswick football team defeated the Mount Allison team at Fredericton on Tuesday by the large score of 30 to 0. Mount Allison was outclassed in all departments of the game. The U. N. B. team is to play Acadia here next Wednesday and a fast game is expected.

**The Rural Deanery Meeting**

The Rural Deanery of Avon, comprising the counties of Kings and Hants, met at the rectory last Monday to discuss preliminary work in connection with the Forward Movement next February. There was an excellent attendance of clergy, including the rectors of Aylesford, Kentville, Cornwallis, Hantsport, Windsor, Newport, Horton, Rev. H. A. Harley, and Archdeacon Vroom of Kings College.

The Rural Dean presided. A scheme for a general interchange of pulpits for January was drawn up and many valuable suggestions were made which will be elaborated later on. In the afternoon there was a large and representative gathering of the Woman's Auxiliary, which was addressed at length by the Archdeacon, Rev. W. H. Bullock, of Hantsport; Rev. Patterson Smyth, of Windsor; and Rev. Mr. Bent, of Kentville.

The speakers were introduced by the Rural Dean. On motion of Mrs. L. H. Moore, seconded by Mrs. Black, a vote of thanks was accorded the Archdeacon for his very impressive presentation of the subject. After the withdrawal of the clergy a very successful meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held and it was decided to hold a 'Sale of Work' in December at the rectory. The clergy dined at the rectory and left by the afternoon train.

**"Lest We Forget"**

The Young Peoples Societies of the Baptist church will hold a public meeting in the vestry of the church Tuesday, November 11th, at 7 o'clock, to celebrate the signing of the armistice one year ago. A good program of patriotic songs, solos and readings has been prepared. Some of our returned soldiers will tell how the news of the armistice was received on the different battle fronts. Dr. McDonald will tell of the celebration in London.

A silver collection will be taken for young people's work.

News has been received of the death at Dorchester, Mass., of Mr. J. W. Follett, a native of this town. Mr. Follett visited Wolfville last summer and although in poor health at that time, the news of his death comes as a great surprise. Mrs. Haverstock, of Maple avenue, is a sister.



**Fertilizer on Pastures**

Judging by the correspondence received at the Agricultural College, Truro, quite a number of farmers are this Fall applying fertilizer to at least a few acres of pasture land. The results from this practice at the College Farm have been so striking that the College authorities feel that the practice should be urged on many more farmers.

The story told by the experiments at Truro, is briefly this: The total cost of grain in live weight, including interest on investment, fencing and all incidentals, was 5c. per pound on pasture, as war prices. The improvement in grazing capacity of pastures to which fertilizer was applied was equally striking.

From this date until the snow flies is the time to make this application of fertilizer. Good results have been obtained from the use of slag, acid phosphates and wood ashes, but almost any fertilizer will give results. It is not good practice, however, to apply material which is very rich in ammonia, since it leaches out the ground in winter. The phosphoric acid, lime and potash, which are the main ingredients in the above mentioned varieties, will not leach out but will become the better incorporated with the soil during the winter months.

**Crosses For Mothers Who Lost Boys at the Front**

Victoria, Oct. 30.—Major General Mewburn, minister of militia, speaking at a re-union of the 16th Battalion members here last night, announced that a silver cross, hung from a purple ribbon, would be given to every mother who had lost a boy at the front. Eight war memorials are to be erected to the memory of the Canadians who fell overseas. One of them would take the form of a Hall of Records, while the others would be memorials commemorating the fallen.

**A Word of Caution**

"Lest we forget" were the words of caution which went far and wide about a year ago when the epidemic of influenza cut a swath through Canada and brought suffering and distress and carried away tens of thousands of our loved ones. A timely word or two may not be out of place to health authorities and the public generally.

The benefits of fresh air, healthy living and the early medical attention to colds and catarrh should not be forgotten as some of the preventive measures which should claim our personal attention. Let each one of us like a good scout, "Be prepared" against what may happen and the worst may never materialize.

### A New Use For The Aero-plane

The Department of Agriculture at Ottawa has discovered a new use for the aeroplane. The Entomological Branch is investigating the mosquito in the Lower Fraser Valley in British Columbia. By using the aeroplane, the country can be surveyed in order to map out the swampy areas and other breeding places that are readily located in photographs taken from overhead, according to a statement by Dr. C. Gordon Hewitt, Dominion Entomologist, that appears in the October Agricultural Gazette. The aeroplane was used in making a comprehensive survey of the complicated water system of the Fraser River and the adjacent bodies of permanent and temporary water in that district. A flight reported by Dr. Hewitt has demonstrated the possibility of using this machine also for making surveys of timber that is being killed or has already been destroyed by various insects. Its use, it is believed, will help very greatly in the entomological work with various insects being carried on by the Federal Department of Agriculture.

### Germany Must Make Good All Violations Of The Armistice

Demand will be made of Germany that all violations of the Armistice shall be made good. This has been decided upon by the Supreme Council which has completed the protocol to the German Treaty.

The protocol provides that Germany shall surrender cruisers and destroyers to replace those sunk at Scapa Flow, and also surrender floating dry-docks, lighters, trains, tugs and other naval equipment in value to that of the first-class battleships destroyed, which Germany cannot replace.

There is no provision in the protocol as to how the warships and naval supplies shall be divid-

ed among the Allied and Associated Powers. Germany has been asked to send a commission to Paris to sign the protocol and attend the formal ratification of the treaty.
