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GENERAL BRITAIN.

Items of Interest from the United Kingdom.

Oscar Wilde was married in London on Tuesday to Miss Lloyd.

A London despatch announces the death of Sir John James Esdaile, M.P.

Since informant Delaney gave evidence at Sirigo in the Tuberculosis conspiracy case, certain well-known Fenians have left Dublin.

It is understood that the action of Miss Fortescue, London, against Lord Cairns, son of Lord Cairns, for breach of promise of marriage has been withdrawn.

A suite of pearls, owned by the late Lady Olga, has been purchased by the Countess of Devonport for £40,000.

Earl Granville announces that he will shortly present to Parliament an Anglo-Portuguese treaty in reference to the acquisition of commercial privileges in the Congo.

The Earl of Euston is about to apply for a divorce from his wife, the Countess of Euston, on the ground of adultery.

A large meeting of Nationalists was held at Mullingar recently. Healy, Dawson, and Kenney were present.

Up to seven or eight more bodies had been recovered. Edward Bowen, a coloured man, was the first to be recovered.

PHILADELPHIA, May 28.—In the Methodist Episcopal Conference to-day, his Committee on the Study of the Government of the Church recommended that no divorce be granted except on grounds justified by the Scriptures, and that the commission be appointed to study the subject.

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FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

General Gleanings from Distant Lands.

EUROPE. A despatch from the Hague says the Prince of Orange is dangerously ill with fever.

A Berlin despatch says—Grand Duke Louis of Hesse persists in his demands for legal separation from Mme. Kalmrec. She has refused her case to the Hessian Minister for Darmstadt.

It is reported that a marriage between the Czarevitch and the Princess Sophia Dorothea, granddaughter of the Emperor of Germany, was arranged by the Crown Prince during his visit to St. Petersburg.

Prince Bismarck opposed the pardoning of Kraszewski, recently convicted at Leipzig of treason; but the government, when the Polish party desired to show sympathy for Germany, Kraszewski acted as a spy in favour of France. He was, Bismarck declared, playing the double game of Polish patriotism and Russo-French sympathy.

France to Honour the Revolution of 1789. The Government proposes to celebrate the centenary of the commencement of the French Revolution, which was an imposing manner. It has also resolved upon making an especially brilliant exhibition to be held in Paris in 1889.

When Louis XV. died in 1774 his grandson, Louis XVI. succeeded the throne as a period which was, perhaps, the most important in French history, and which is one of the opening paragraphs of his French Revolution, says—'With Pompadour and the French Revolution, which has been shamefully struck down in all lands, all else; poverty ravaged even the royal exchequer, and tax farming can squeeze out no more; the people are in a state of utter despairing; the Revolutionary war where Want, Dishonesty, Unbelief, and not-brained Socialism, have been the result of the Revolution.' In this condition of affairs, King called together the assembly of the Notables to consider how the necessary money for the affairs of the State was to be raised; but when it was proposed to tax the privileged class the Government met with the most violent opposition, and the Assembly dissolved without coming to any conclusion. In this difficulty a general assembly of deputies from all the recognized classes met in Versailles, and the meeting of the body should be conducted with strict regard to the rights of the various orders. Three Estates meeting and voting separately, and the Estates which the higher Estates considered the action of the Commons, after the Estates had been dissolved, and in June, on the proposition of the Abbé Sieyès, the Estates declared themselves to be a single body, having a right to act in the legislature of France. This did not please the King, who insisted upon the Assembly being dissolved upon which he had been sent in his famous reply—'We are here by the power of the people, and we will not be driven hence by a few bayonets.' With these events the revolution began which destroyed the old régime and set upon its ruins the modern constitution of France which it is proposed to celebrate.

ASIA. A Paris despatch says Mr. Millot attacked the treaty with Turkey on Friday. The treaty was a feeble resistance.

A Paris despatch says the Emperor of Annapolis has expressed his acceptance of the principle of the proposed treaty with France.

AFRICA. News has reached Cairo that the new black Flag Fleet has appeared before Darfour and defeated El Medhi's troops. The new Medhi says El Medhi was one of his former lieutenants.

The Nile is rising rapidly, and it is expected that seven Italian priests and four Sisters of Mercy, who were on their way to the Nile, will be driven from the Nile by the rising water.

The Governor of Dongola telegraphs that the rebels northward of Berber have completely submitted to his authority. The rebels continue to be in the hands of the Government.

Second Anniversary of the Emperor's Death. Rome, June 3.—The anniversary of the death of Garibaldi was observed throughout Italy yesterday. A number of his statues were unveiled in various parts of the country.

Giuseppe Garibaldi. Giuseppe Garibaldi, the 'Saviour of Italy,' was born in Nice, July 4, 1807, and died in the island of Capri, on the 2nd June, 1882. His life was one constant struggle to free the oppressed, he having fought on behalf of the Republic of Rio Grand in 1834.

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
