## **A Notable Achievement**

The unexpected has happened. In spite of predictions to the contrary, the Labor Party at home has already had returned at the present election as many members as it had in the last Parliament. Expectation had it, that the Osborne judgment would prove too heavy a handicap in the effort to achieve this. The Osborne judgment, it will be remembered, declared ille-gal the compulsory levying of money achieve this. The Osborne judgment, it will be remembered, declared ille-gal the compulsory levying of money from Trade Union members for poli-tical purposes. It was confidently predicted that the immediate effect would be to diminish the number of Labor members in the House of Com-mons. This prediction has been fal-sified, so far as the present election is concerned. Forty Labor members have already been returned, exactly the number in the last House. Whether there is a possibility of this number being increased before the close of the elections, we have not the means before us of determining. But whether that occurs or not, the achievement is a notable one, and not-withstanding that the effort has been assisted by the elimination of many of the conflicts between Liberals and Labor parties last January. Another feature of this achievement is that the Labor party is the first of the five independent parties to reach the Jan-nary limit. Last night the Liberal party was 19 behind, the Nationalists, 7 behind, the Independent National-ists 2 behind, and the Unionists, 16 behind.
