Our attention has been called to the case of two poor women who, with their children, are residing in an im-provised camp near the quarry on the Southside Hill. Their names are Sib-ley and Peddle, the former a widow, whose husband was accidentally kill-ed at Grand Falls, and the latter has ed at Grand rails, and the latter has a husband not supporting her. Mrs. Sibley came here some time ago with her infant child and the child of some relative of her husband. She took up residence in one of the small houses in the Ropewalk Range, and for a time worked at different places in the city. With two children, whose ages are five and six months respectively, it can be imagined what a hard trial was hers. She was only able to leave them at intervals to do a bit of washing and scrubbing, for which she re ceived a miserable pittance, insuffi-cient even to provide food. Failing to pay her rent she was evicted and, having no friends to whom she could turn for assistance, was obliged to take up her abode at the place afore-said. 

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

WAR DECEITS-AN INVENTOR'S UNIFORM AND SENTENCE.

(Daily Mail, June 7.) Saturday with persons—men and women—who were accused of deceitful acts or false pretences in connec-

tion with the war.

The inventor of an aerial torpedo Alfred Rutt, thirty-five, describing himself as an engineer, was charged before Mr. Francis at Westminster, under the Defence of the Realm Act with wearing a uniform like that of a naval officer, calculated to deceive. Mr. Isaac Francis Towning, an underwriter at Lloyd's, residing at Pur-ley, said he had known the defendant since last October and had agreed to finance his aerial torpedo invention. first the uniform was that of a naval lieutenant. In cross-examination he said there had been interviews and correspondence by the defendant with the War Office over the aerial torpedo, and that the official permit was given to the defendant to allow him to demonstrate the machine in action.

The defendant, giving evidence, said he had made a practical test of 105 miles an hour speed and been up to a height of 2,000 feet. By his dress he simply wanted to be regarded as an engineer.



bich Lincoln, was Liberal member for Darlington from January, 1910, to December of that year, and has in his time played many parts, having been born a Hungarian Jew and later figured as a Presbyterian missionary and an Anglican priest. 



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
