GREECE TO HAND OVER FLEET.

LONDON, To-day. The Minister of Marine, the correspondent continues, says that Vice-Admiral Furnet's demand will be complied with, and that the fleet will be handed over before the prescribed time. Mr. B. C. Thomson Lectured at Seamen's Institute Last Night.

objections raised would be easily overcome.

Mr. W. B. Grieve proposed a vote of thanks and in doing so expressed the opinion that no permanent market could be established with the Old Country on the lines laid down by Mr. Thomson, in view of the fact that the Icelandic and other nearer fisheries would have an advantage over us, owing to the great distance we would have to ship our products. As an instance, he showed the failure of the Dundee sealers coming here. The shipping of salmon from Labrador to Europe had been a failure. Our markets lie in the other direction, in Canada and the States. As a patriotic movement, however, to supply fish to the Motherland during the war the idea had his approval, and he hoped that practical steps would be taken as the result of Mr. Thomson's lecture.

Mr. W. F. Coaker, M. H. A., who seconded the vote of thanks promised the help of the body which he represented in establishing a fresh fish industry to supply the Old Country, and made reference to the gigantic storage plant which is to be completed at Catalina in 1918 at a cost of \$35,000. The fish will be collected in motor boats from the various fishing stations in that vicinity. Matters in connection with the project have already been discussed with Canadian experts.

Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris in moving the vote of thanks spoke of the failure of establishing cold storage plants in the past owing to the guarantors not standing by their agreements. While in England he visited Grimsby and there spent four days with Mr. T. Robinsin, and with him discussed matters relating to the fishery. Sir Edward was of the opinion that our fishermen would benefit greatly by the project, as they would obtain a greater price for the green article than they are now getting for the dry cured fish, while the time now lost in salting and drying could be utilised in catching more fish. It would mean millions to the country and it would have the support of the Government.


