Local News.

The farmers northwest of Hamilton are busily engaged packing apples for exportation to Lower Canada and Europe.

An English Dogberry has sent a woman to prison and hard labor for 21 days for taking a sprig of lavender from an open garden.

The name of the English premier is pronounced by himself and his friends "Dizrayly," with the accent on the second syllable.

A Kentuckian, who uses "the weed," "allows" that he has chewed 1825 pounds of tobacco during the last forty years, nearly a pound a week.

There will probably be ten quakers in the next British House of Commons. Among them are two Brights, Charles Gilpin, Edward Backhouse and William Slater.

The convict Whalen is now receiving spiritual attendance from the parish priest of St. Joseph's, and appears to give some attention to his counsels. He is also visited by the Sisters of Charity.

Two hemp cables have just been completed at the Chatham dock yard for the British navy, each twenty six inches in circumference, one hundred and one fathoms long, and weighing 13,000 pounds.

SALE OF FURNITURE.—Mrs. Henderson's sale of furniture will take place at her residence on Woolwich street, tomorrow. On sums over \$5, six months credit will be given to responsible parties.

The Dominion government is about to commence the opening of a harbour of refuge on Lake Huron. Engineers are to be despatched from the Public Works Department at Ottawa to locate the harbour.

The Ottawa Times says: Since the origin of the sect the Plymouth brethren have never known such great success, not even in England perhaps, as here in this city, since Lord Cecil allied himself with them.

Mr. L. P. Ryan, member for Montreal west, announces that subscriptions to the McGee Fund from all parts of the Dominion amount to between \$7,000 and \$8,000. It is expected this sum will clear off all the indebtedness of the estate.

Another illicit still was seized in Montreal on Saturday night, together with 600 gallons of whiskey. There seems to be a heavy business going on this illegal way, but the authorities are vigorously attempting to put an end to it.

The "English Church Union," the great Ritualistic league, has divided on the Irish Church question. Dr. Pusey and his friends having indorsed Gladstone, a large party have seceded, and formed an "English Church and State Union."

A young Albany girl, after receiving the attention of a young man for several months, abruptly asked him when he intended to marry her. The young man said he was not "on" the marry. She then broke a teapot, filled with boiling water over his head.

The Indians seem determined that the "long knives" shall have no peace on the borders. The American press admits that the agents have so long lied to and cheated them, that there is no hope of a treaty of peace—the Indians would place no confidence in it—and that the only hope is in extermination.

Mr. Sprague, Superintendent of Indian Affairs, publishes a notice stating that tenders for the large quantity of timber on the Indian reserves of Lake Huron will be renewed until the 21st of October, the tenders to state bonus, and to be prepared to pay down in addition to the ground rent of one dollar per square mile timber dues as per schedule.

A darkey is going along Essex st., was putting on a little style, with his master's plug hat and cane, when a twig caught his foot and caused him to fall. His mistress, seeing him from her window, exclaimed, "Why, Jim, pride always goes before a fall!" "Yes, marm," replied Jim, "and especially before a water-fall." The darkey was sacked next morning.

A Sailor Driven Mad by a Mesmerist.
An extraordinary incident occurred on Thursday night last, showing the danger of experimenting with mesmerism: On that evening, a young sailor, who with some shipmates, was lodging at the Ferry Hotel Sunderland was standing at the bar, when a man named M'Kenzie commenced some mesmeric passes, and the young man being extremely susceptible, he was soon in a state of coma. In this state, he was completely at the will of the operator, and was unable to move except by M'Kenzie's permission. Whether M'Kenzie was unable to restore the man to consciousness or not, we cannot say. His statement is that he took him to the open air, and he revived; but it appears that M'Kenzie left the house, while his 'subject' remained in a half-unconscious state for some time, and ultimately became very ill. His comrades had to sit up with him until three o'clock in the morning when he fell asleep. When roused at breakfast time, he appeared to be still laboring under the effects of the mysterious passes, became exceedingly excited, and talked with all the incoherence of a person insane. As the day wore on he became worse, and so dangerous that his comrades determined to take him to Mr. Morgan's, in Monkwearmouth, for his advice. On their attempting to enter the ferry landing, the young sailor rushed into the water and wanted walk across a river. Ultimately they reached Mr. Morgan's house to find that gentleman absent in Scotland. On returning back the mesmerist's victim became more and more excited, until at last he made his escape, and after performing a number of extravagant actions, climbed up a spout like a cat on to the roof of a two-story house and walked along the ridge, while his shipmates stood below expecting every moment he would be dashed to pieces. It is stated that on the previous evening while working with him, M'Kenzie said he would have to go on to the top of a house, and the influence still remaining on the young man's mind he had obeyed the impulse. At last he was coaxed down, but was in so dangerous a condition that he was removed to the work-house, with all the appearance of insanity about him. Later on in the evening, the police got hold of M'Kenzie who in the presence of Mr. Stainsby, denied that he knew anything of mesmerism, but after that gentleman had severely pressed him, he admitted he knew the mode of bringing the man out, and he was sent to try the effect of his curative powers upon his 'patient.' When he got there, however, he found that the doctor had given a sleeping draught, and he was not permitted to do anything with him.—Newcastle Journal.

Mr. Brydges and the French Canadians.
We find the following in the Montreal Witness: Mr. Brydges is said to have been appointed to the position of Railway Commissioner through the influence and obsequy of Mr. Cartier against the reluctant hesitation of his colleagues in the cabinet. Mr. Brydges has done so much for Mr. Cartier that the latter, who is well known to be grateful to his most zealous for his friends, has helped him at a time when his star was fading in the Grand Trunk's Councils. At the first news of Mr. Brydges' nomination, there was a most harmonious concert of indignation in all the French conservative papers; but Mr. Cartier has passed through our city on his way to England, and the password and countereign have been given and all has been made most agreeable. We give the explanation of *La Minerve*, the well-known organ of Mr. Cartier:—
"If Mr. Brydges is appointed, we must accept him, for he will be an honor to Lower Canada. We will most probably in that case possess the advantage of seeing our commissioner president of the board. It is already one consideration. We will have the satisfaction of being in a position to say that the best of the commissioners is our own. And if we are absolutely wish for our share of the pecuniary advantages, as Mr. Brydges, through his personal friendship with Mr. Cartier is truly the friend of the French Canadians, he will be so situated, more than a commissioner of our own nationality, to protect the tenders of our countrymen for sub-contracts, and applications for employment." An President of the commission, as manager, thus to speak of the undertaking, he will make himself heard when other people would fall."

It would, according to our notions of public affairs, be difficult to make a more humiliating, a more insulting, plea to smooth down a dissatisfied population. We wait now for the argument of the English organs. Will they say that Mr. Brydges, being an Englishman, will naturally favor his countrymen in preference to those of other origins? Truly we are falling very low, and we would not be astonished to find in some proceedings of the Grand Trunk shareholders, the nomination of Mr. Brydges represented as a great victory for the Grand Trunk interests in Canada.

BURGULARS CAPTURED.—Two second-rate named Durley and Weisner were captured at Freeton on Monday night last, after a most determined struggle.—Information of their whereabouts having reached the Hamilton Chief of Police, he detailed a detective and a constable to go in search of them. They were accompanied by the Chief Constable of Bothwell, who wanted to see the gentlemen in reference to some little transactions they had in his neighbourhood. On going to Freeton they found that the men they were in quest of had taken up their quarters with Durley's mother, and on proceeding to the house they found them both asleep. On being awakened both rose up in the bed and presented revolvers at the constables. A desperate struggle ensued with Durley, who made several attempts to use his revolver, but he was at length overpowered and ornamented with the "bracoles." Meantime Weisner ran towards a window and attempted to escape, but was prevented by the constable who stood outside. When his companion had been properly secured Weisner was found standing behind the door, with his revolver drawn. But the sight of another weapon of the same kind cooled his courage and he surrendered. They were both taken to Bothwell. It is very probable that they are the parties who committed the burglaries and robberies of which we have heard so much of late in this part of the country. They seem to have made a tour, and it was likely they who paid some of the Guelph stores a professional visit.

George Richardson, a Boston baker, residing at Longwood, while labouring under a fit of insanity on Friday morning before daybreak, cut the throats of his two sons, the eldest of whom was only thirteen years of age, and then died. He was afterwards found in his own barn. The eldest boy has since died, but the other may recover. Mr. Richardson has been complaining of his head for some time, having been surstruck last summer.

THE GUELPH POLICE COURT.
Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., Police Magistrate
THURSDAY, 15th.—*Wm Bell* was up again this morning, charged by his wife with assault and battery. He pleaded guilty. The Magistrate told him that he had already forfeited for himself and his sureties the amount in which he was bound to keep the peace, and it might at any time be exacted; but he had been speaking to Dr Howitt, about him, and the Doctor's opinion was that he (Bell) was insane. He would therefore remand the case until Saturday, and if the testimony then established his insanity he would have to be confined until he returned to his right mind. Yesterday he had taken a number of spoons, forks &c., which were found in his pocket and taken charge of by the constable. These were Mrs. Bell's own property and were restored to her this morning. Bell was sent back to goal until Saturday.

PER ATLANTIC CABLE.

Despatches to the Evening Mercury.
LONDON, 14th, midnight.—Despatches from Spain say it is reported that the Bishop of Saragossa is at the head of 2,000 men pronounced against the Provisional Junta.

PARIS, 14th.—Gen. Menebro, the Italian Prime Minister, is said to be here on a special mission in regard to Rome.

LIVERPOOL, 14th.—Mr. Gladstone addressed a large political meeting here to-night. He charged the government with being responsible for an unsuccessful increase of expenditure, and urged the disestablishment of the Irish Church.

NAPLES, 14th.—The volcanic eruption of Mount Vesuvius is daily becoming more intense and violent.

LONDON, 14th.—The reports of the coronation of Gobeyze as Emperor of Abyssinia is confirmed. He is supported by Prince Kassa, but opposed by the eldest son of the late King Theodoros.

Despatches from India report that the civil war in Northern Afghanistan is at an end.

The naturalization treaty negotiations which are being conducted between the minister Reverdy Johnson and Lord Stanley are progressing favorably. The Alabama claims will be the next subject of conversation.

American Despatches.
The Election in the States—Immense Majority for the Republican Party.
NEWARK, N.J., Oct. 14.
The vote on the general ticket is too close to decide as to a majority. The aggregate number of votes for aldermen gives the Republicans 282 of a majority. The Common Council will have seventeen Republicans to nine Democrats, being a Democratic gain of one alderman.

European Steamer Arrived.
NEW YORK, Oct. 15.
The steamer *Germania* from Southampton, arrived here this morning.

ATTEMPTED ESCAPE OF TWO PRISONERS AT OTTAWA.—Henry Murphy, one of the Fenian prisoners, from Montreal, now in Ottawa jail, attempted to escape on Monday night. When the turnkeys were locking up the prisoners in the cells at six o'clock, Murphy slipped out of the corridors unperceived, and passed down through the kitchen into a small yard well enclosed, where the witness Lacroix was then walking around. Murphy, seeing no chance of escape there, re-entered the kitchen, where meeting a turnkey, he struck him a heavy blow on the head with a bill of wood. Lacroix followed and seized Murphy. An alarm was then given, and some of the soldiers on guard outside, entered and secured him. The turnkey, though severely, is not dangerously wounded. On Wednesday night, about six o'clock, another prisoner Felix Callaghan, who is confined in the goal under the Habeas Corpus Suspension Act, attempted to escape. The turnkeys went to put the prisoners in their cells for the night. While one of the turnkeys was engaged in this duty the bell rang, and the other descended, leaving the corridor open. Callaghan seized the opportunity to descend, and passed out into a small yard off the kitchen. Finding he could not make his exit here he re-entered the kitchen, where he was met by the turnkey Lewis, who had descended. He asked Callaghan to come with him to the cell, who replied "You can't take me, Bill." Lewis then attempted to take him by the collar; Callaghan, who had a towel roller in his hand, struck Lewis on the side of the head and felled him, and he would have probably followed up the blow and disposed of Lewis if Hilario, a prisoner, had not seized him and struggled with him until the alarm was sounded, and some of the guard entered with fixed bayonets.

MR. HOWE ON THE SITUATION.

The Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition, held at Halifax, was formally closed on Tuesday by an address from Mr. Howe. Contrary to his usual practice he read the address. The reason is obvious. He did not wish to be misrepresented by incompetent reporters. At the commencement he said: "The Province is passing through political changes, almost revolutionary. We are not here to discuss them, but this I may be permitted to say, that whether the future is to be marked by the disastrous consequences which some predict, or by the brilliant results that are promised by others, it is our duty to take stock of the present—to survey our industries as they have been developed under our old institutions, and to place on record in some practical and enduring method the results of our observations." Towards the close he said: "Of the political aspects of our country I can here say nothing, though I may take an early opportunity in some other place freely to discuss them; but this I may say, that Nova Scotia in all the vicissitudes and trials of the past, has not wanted skill and energy to guide her. Let us hope that with the blessings of a kind providence, the resources of her statesmanship may not fail her now." These were the only allusions to politics. He was warmly applauded throughout.

New Tariff of Fees for Quebec.

The Local Government of Quebec has established a tariff of fees to be paid for commissions, registration, &c. in the Secretary and Registrar's offices for the Province, whereby, if appointments can only be made fast enough, there is a fair prospect that the Provincial Secretary might make his office a source of revenue. Among the items in the tariff are the following: Commission of Recorder, \$15, do. of Judge of Sessions, \$15, Sheriffs, Clerks of Peace, &c., pay at the same rate for their commissions, while Coroners, Fire Marshals, and some others, get their parchments for \$10. All certificates, registrations, &c., in or from both the offices above named, are to be paid for at rates of from 50 cents upwards. These regulations are adopted in accordance with an Act passed at the last Session of the Legislature, which, if we mistake not, was a device of Hon. Treasurer Dunkin to increase the Provincial income.

THE ELECTIONS IN THE STATES.

By our telegraph despatches to-day (Thursday) we learn that the Republican State Committee for Pennsylvania fix the Republican majority in that State at 10,965 after giving all the heavy Democratic Counties their own returns. This estimate has been thoroughly tested, and may be relied upon as correct. It is not likely the returns will vary 1,000 either way. As regards Indiana, returns have been received from eighty-two counties, which give a Republican majority of 6,831, with ten counties to hear from which gave Democratic majorities in 1866 of 3,300. If the Democratic gains in these Counties are as large as those already reported, they will reduce the Republican majority to 1,500 or 2,000.

In Ohio, the Republican majority is probably between 20,000 and 30,000. The Congressional delegation is probably as strongly Republican as before, when it stood 16 to 3—though the Democrats possibly have 4 members now.

The State of Nebraska has been carried by the Republicans by a majority of about 2,000. They thus secure the election next winter of a United States Senator.

RECIPROcity TREATY.—The Washington correspondent of the New York Tribune says:—"The interests in the proposed Reciprocity treaty between the United States and Canada, which existed last Winter, is being revived. It is now certain that a draft of the treaty was prepared, that the authorities arrived at an understanding, and that the Canadian Commissioner was ready to leave for Washington; but at present, in view of the Canadian position on the Fishery question, it does not seem probable that Canada will consent to any arrangement with a foreign power without the interference of the Imperial Government. The draft of the treaty was submitted to the British Ministry, and, some time ago, when the negotiations were a most complete, orders from England stopped all further proceedings."

Henry W. Beecher delivered a political oration on the "Issues of the canvass" at the Brooklyn Academy of Music Saturday evening. One of the features of the occasion was a scene on the stage representing Grant as the successful and Seymour the unsuccessful candidate, the latter with his countenance distorted with rage, and in his immediate background a representation of negroes being hanged and houses being burned by a mob.

MEETING OF PARLIAMENT.—La

Minerve (Ministerial) states that the Legislature of the Province of Quebec will not be called together for the despatch of business before the middle of February next; and that it will sit till the first of March, the time for the meeting of the Federal Parliament. This delay in the meeting of the Quebec and Federal Parliaments is wholly attributable to that curse to the country—dual representation. Sir George Cartier, member of the Local Parliament, and Cabinet Minister of the Dominion, is in England, and the Local Parliament must not meet till his return. All the legislation of both the Province of Quebec and the Dominion must, therefore, be postponed for months.

THE PACIFIC RAILWAY.—The track of the Central Pacific Railway is finished to Reese River Valley, five hundred miles east of San Francisco, and about sixty-five miles north of Aust. The grading is ready for the iron one hundred miles beyond, and it is said the requisite grading to Salt Lake will be done by the 15th of December. The earnings of the road for September were \$263,000 in gold. In a few days Wells, Fargo & Co.'s stages will connect with the railroad at Gravelly Ford, on the Humboldt river. This will shorten the stage route nearly 200 miles.

With pleasure we inform our readers that the Committees of this Society have secured the services of the Rev. J. Howie, as visiting agent, and that he has entered upon his work. It is to be hoped that, through the blessing of God upon his labours, many families in Guelph will be benefited by being brought to enjoy the advantages resulting from total abstinence from intoxicating drinks. We have no doubt that the committee will be heartily encouraged, and sustained in this enterprise by all who desire the well being of the town.—Com.

MURDER AND ROBBERY.—Capt Miner, of the tug *Goodnow*, was attacked at Amherstburg, on Tuesday evening, by three colored men named Brown, Kirtley and Medley, receiving injuries on the head resulting in his death. Their object appears to have been to rob him of a sum of money which he had on his person. Kirtley was arrested but through the carelessness of the constable was allowed to escape. The murderers are supposed to be in Detroit. Capt. Miner had on his person about \$400, it was supposed, before attacked, but when he was discovered afterwards about \$100 was all that could be found.

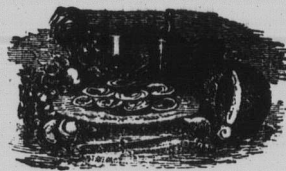

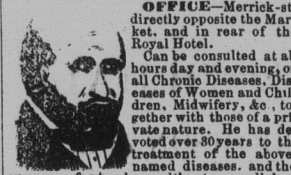
