It is not known what was the cause of the quarrel. A heated argument was heard at 7 o'clock, and a few minutes later several shots were heard. After shooting both her husband and daughter, Mrs. Hester locked the door and shot herself.

The annual report of dividends remaining unpaid, unclaimed balances, and unpaid drafts and bills of exchange in the chartered banks of Canada, for five years and upwards, prior to December 31, 1900, issued in conformity with the act respecting banks and banking, and amendments thereto, has just been published.

A Difference of Opinion

Vancouver City Council Does Not Want to Pay For High School. Attorney General However Says It Comes Under General System.

Vancouver, May 30.—City Solicitor Hamesley has given it as his opinion that high schools need not be maintained at the expense of the city.

The opinion of Mr. Hamesley, which was handed in to the finance committee of the council, is as follows: Sir: My opinion has been requested on the following matter:

EXTRACTS FROM ACT. Accompanying the letter are the following extracts from the Schools Act relating to payments by the city of salaries, maintenance, etc.

Section 7.—Power of council of public instruction to make and establish rules, etc. for conduct of the public schools, duties of teachers, etc.

Section 13.—To establish a normal school with departments, etc.

Section 34.—Payment of salaries of teachers employed in the public schools shall be made and established by the municipal corporation in the respective cities.

Section 37.—Trustees to annually make estimates for city council of sums required by the board for the current year's ordinary expenses of maintaining the schools as they exist at the time of making such estimates.
