HIS ARRIVAL AT SYDNEY ON ST. PATRICK'S DAY.

The Champion Receives a fireat Ovation

And Insures His Life for £5000—The
Trip Out to Australia.

The World received from Edward Hanlan last night a copy of the Sydney Daily
Telegraph of March 17, St. Patrick's day.
The paper contains a five-column account of the champion's arrival at Sydney, his reception and a long interview by an Antipodean reporter. The introduction to the report says:

The Pacific mull steamship City of Sydney which came into port on Saturday night, about 8 o'clock, brought Edward Hanlan, the champion sculler of the world, who has arrainged for a five months' tour of Australasia, and is open to make matches for heavy wagers and the championship. He has taken up his quarters for the present at Petty's hotel, but on Saturday night, between 9 and 10 o'clock, he was driven up to the Oxtord hotel, where a crowd of 4000 er 5000 people had congregated, in consequence of the report which had rapidly circulated of Hanlan's arrival. Hanlan was afterwards driven back to Petty's hotel, where he has taken up his quarters, and both late on Saturday night, and during the whole of yesterday, was visited by a large number of gentlemen connected with rowing, and also by Americans and Canadians anxious to meet the acquatic champion. Among others Hanlan renewed a former friendship with J. P. Grant, the Australian representative of the Equitable Life Assurance society of Australian representative of the Equitable Life Assurance society of New York, with whom Hanlan before he had been many hours in the colony, negotiated for a life assurance policy of £5000. From the report of an interview which a representative of this policy of £5000. From the report of an interview which a representative of this journal had with Hanlan, it will be gathered that at present he has made no definte arrangements with regard to matches, and that the challenge which was sent home by Mr. Hunt, to row an Australian representative for £1000 a side, Hanlan to receive £300 expenses and one-third of the gate money, is still open. Hanlan appears to think the terms good enough if he gets two-thirds of the gate money instead of one-third, as originally proposed, and pays his own expenses. He will not row in a match probably for six or eight weeks, and in the meantime he intends to give a series of rowing exhibitions in the different zolonies, if terms can be satisfactorily arranged. His first exhibition will proceed to Melbourne and Adelaide. He is accompanied by his business agent, Morris Greenwall.
