





## THE STATUS OF THREE CANADIAN SCULLERS QUESTIONED.

The National Association of the Unit States Reject Entries from O'Connor, Enright and Laing-Baseball Matters. Some excitement has been created in amateur rowing circles by the rejection by the National Amateur Rowing assoc of the United States of entries from feseph Laing of the Grand Trunk boat Plub, from O'Connor and Enright of the Torente Rowing olub and from Mumford of the Perseverance club, New Orleans. Regarding the qualifications of the latter as an amateur there have been doubts for ome years, but relative to O'Connor, Enright and Laing the action of the National association of the United States is not only an outrage to the men themselve not only an outside to the the Canadian association of amateur carsmen and should be fought against to the bitter end. The Canadian association have accepted all entries from clubs affiliated with the United States association although at times there have been good rea-son to doubt the standing of the men. In one case only has the Canadian organiza-tion doubted the qualifications of an entry, and that was in the case of the champion Hillsdale crew, who received \$2500 in hard oash as a testimonial from the citizens of their native village on their return from vistory at Saratogs. Secretary Garfield of the National rowing association was written to, and he pronounced the Hillsdales gentlemen and thorough amateurs. That settled the question. but is an absolute insult to the Canadian to tell gentlemen and thorough That settled the question. amateurs. That settled the question. The Hillsdales were at once notified they were eligible, but they had heard their status was idoubted and chose to ride the high horse and refuse to come. If they had crossed the border they would have been beaten. But they didn't. However, Mr. Garfield's ipse dixit was received, but now this same Mr. Garfield and his mendiate not only decline to accept bat now this same hr. carnel and his associates not only decline to accept certain Canadian entries of men in good standing, but de so after, in answer to doubts expressed by them, the standing of those entries has been investigated, under oath, we believe, by President Boswell and the arcentive complitue of the Canadian those entries has been introduced to be the consident model and the executive committee of the Canadian association, and found thoroughly amateur in all respects. There is only one course open in honor to our association, and that is from henceforth to refuse all entries from clubs affiliated with the National association and not members of the Canadian association of amateur coarsmen. 
