The recent visit of the German En for and Francis Joseph and King umbert at Vienna and Venice is sup-sed to have had for its object the renewal of the Triple Alliance, which expires next year. The tripartite agreement covers a term of five years, but is extended without change save in the amount of fighting force contributed by each power, for successive terms, until terminated by formal notice. That it has again been renewed may be assumed, as it may be that it is satisfactory to the three nations concerned, though fensive as well as defensive has no foun dation, no one of the powers having any wish to build up the other. Indeed if their individual safety is to be assur ed, there is no other course left than extension of the pact, for without it Italy would fall a prey to France, Germany would have to fight both France and Russia, and the integrity of Austria would be constantly menaced by Russia. Bound together, however, they are believed to be safe from attack. and as a consequence European peace to be insured, for with Great Britain, though unpledged favorable to the Althe combination is too strong to assail Stretched across the centre of Europe with a complete system of intercommu nication, and able to throw three millions of trained soldiers into the field within forty days attack upon it would involve risks too great to be undertak-en. Diplomatists, therefore, assume that the Alliance is an absolute guar antee of peace and that it's renewa will insure Europe another five years of quiet, during which it can devote it

HARVESTING CRIMSON CLOVER.

Crimson clover should be mowed when the blossom is about half faded, allowed to wilt, and then raked, but left in the field until fully cured before housing. At the season when it is cut (May in this latitude), the sun is not very hot, neither are the nights warm, so it requires to stay out longer than red clover. If rained on, it is not injured as easily as red clover, which is often made worthless if thoroughly wet. Stock of all kinds do well on crimson clover, and eat it in preference to anything else. For ensilage it is considered excellent. As a soil improver we know of nothing better, but we are inclined to believe it is best to cut the crop for hay and plow under the stubble only. To save crimson clover seed, the crop should be allowed to stand urill half or two-thirds of the head is brown, and a part of the seed is ripe. As all of the seed cannot be saved, it is best to cut before it gets too ripe. Cut early in the morning, or during moonlight nights, while wet with dews. So soon as the dew is off, stop cutting. A self-raking reaper is best. If you have not one, use a mower, running a horserake behind it. House or stack the crop as soon as dry, taking care to hauf while the dew is on, so as to lose as little seed as possible. If stacked, cover with canyas or boards to keep out the rain. If this is not done, many seeds will sprout in the stalk. ### TO NUMBER THREAD

TO NUMBER THREAD.

The question, "Why is spool cotton numbered as it is, and why are the figures not used in regular order?" is often asked. The explanation is this: The numbers on the spools express the number of "hanks" which are required to wind a pound. The very finest spinning rarely exceeds 300 hanks to the pound, while in the coarsest there is about half a pound to each hank. The more common qualities, however, these from which sewing thread is usually made, run from ten to fifty hanks to the pound, and the spools on which it is wound are numbered ten to fifty in accordance.
