### Tour of Fruit Men

(Annapolis Spectator)

A very interesting and important expedition was the tour of Valley Orchards last week by fruit men, under the leadership of George E. Sanders, chief of the Entomological Laboratory at Annapolis Royal. Starting from the King's County end and including the famous Chute estate at Berwick, where more than ten thousand barrels of apples will be picked this year, the procession sometimes numbered more than thirty automobiles and at times some three hundred orchardists, passing opinions on everything they saw on their stops at the various plantations through toward Annapolis Royal. Efficiency of spraying and spraying methods was the principal matter of consideration and it is understood that dusting is now much more highly favored than any other method, because it can be applied more quickly and when the foliage is damp.

# A Great Shipping Record



The 18,000 ton C. P. O. S. Liner "Empress of France" at the outbreak of war the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, Ltd., had in commission in the Atlantic and Pacific services thirty-eight steamships, with an aggregate gross tonnage of 241,399 tons. Since August, 1914, the construction of four steamships, previously authorized, having a gross tonnage of 67,000 tons, has been completed, and twelve steamships of 76,000 gross tons have been purchased within the same period. During the war fifteen steamships were lost by enemy action or through accidents at sea, and eight have been sold to the British Government after having been requisitioned, and one sold to an Indian Prince who later presented it to the British Government for use as a hospital ship. The construction is being proceeded with at the Clyde yards of the Fairfield Shipbuilding and Engineering Company, of a ship 825 feet long between perpendiculars, having a gross tonnage of 22,000 tons. This ship will be known as the Empress of Canada. Three passenger ships of the intermediate class for the Atlantic service are to be put under construction at the yards of John Brown & Son, and the Fairfield Shipbuilding Company. At the end of the last fiscal year the company had in ocean service twenty-eight steamships, of a gross tonnage of 264,430 tons, and six steamships under order or purchased but not delivered, having a gross tonnage of about 88,600 tons. The steamships lost through enemy action were the following:—  
 Calgarian, 17,615 gross tons; Carthaginian, 4,444 tons; Ionian, 8,268 tons; Hesperian, 10,920 tons; Lake Michigan, 9,288 tons; Milwaukee, 7,223 tons; Mont-real, 8,844 tons; Mount Temple, 9,792 tons; Montfort, 6,578 tons; Missanable, 12,469 tons; Methven, 5,135 tons; Minniota, 4,928 tons; Pomeranian, 4,421 tons.  
 The ships lost through accidents at sea were: the Corinthian, 7,333 tons; Lake Manitoba, 9,674 tons.  
 The eight steamships sold to the British Government were the Montezuma, 8,360 tons; Monticm, 5,505 tons; Montrose, 7,207 tons; Mount Royal, 7,998 tons; Mongolian, 4,828 tons; Numidian, 4,836 tons; Ruthenia, 7,208; Tyrolia, 7,535 tons. The S.S. Empress of India was purchased by an Indian Prince and presented to the British Government for use as a hospital ship. Her gross tonnage is 5,954. The total tonnage lost through enemy action and other causes is 126,552, and the tonnage sold is 59,421, a grand total of 185,973 gross tons.  
 Ships purchased during the war are as follows:—  
 Botsford, 4,782 tons; Dunbridge, 6,650 tons; Holbrook, 6,655 tons; Montezuma, 5,038 tons; Montcalm, 6,542 tons; Medora, 5,135 tons; Mat-tawa, 4,874 tons; Minniota, 4,928 tons; Methven, 4,852 tons; Mottifont, 5,892 tons; War Beryl, 10,800 tons; War Peridot, 10,800 tons. Vessels built and added to the fleet during the same period were the Missanable, 12,469 tons; Metagama, 12,420 tons; Melita, 13,967 tons; Mianedosa, 13,967 tons.

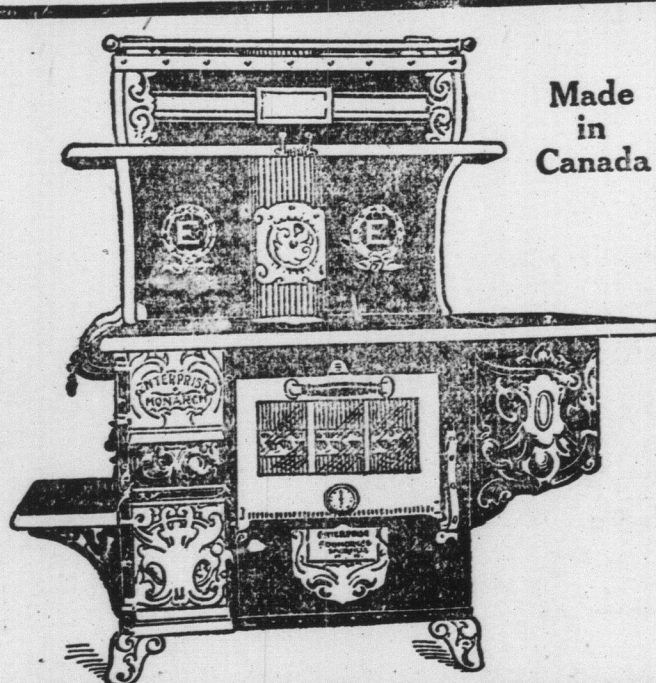

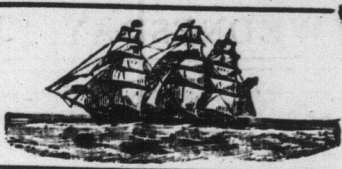

Marine News



The New York & Yarmouth Fish Company Limited, have made an assignment.

The schr. Leo LeBlanc has sailed from Belliveau's Cove for Weymouth to load lumber for the West Indies.

The survivors of the crew of the ill-fated schooner Francis A., passed through here on Wednesday on their way to Yarmouth.

The two masted schooner, B. B. Hardwick is off the marine slip at Halifax and was towed to Bridgewater to load for Madiera.

Digby Courier: The schr. Swan, Capt. Morrell, arrived from Tiverton last Saturday and cleared the same day for Gloucester, Mass.

The new schooner A. W. Longmire, Capt. Longmire, arrived at Digby from Parker's Cove, Wednesday evening and is having an engine installed.

At the railway wharf, Halifax, are the tern schooners Victory Chimes, of Charlottetown, and Alma R., of Digby, loading with deals for England.

Capt. Oscar Outhouse, of the tern schooner Souvenir, was caught in the shaft while in the Bay last Friday afternoon, and he suffered several painful injuries.

The Yarmouth Trading Company's schooner Wilfred L. Snow, Capt. McNair, arrived at Yarmouth on Saturday from a handlining trip with a fare of 14,000 lbs. of fish.

Not many mackerel are being taken in nets off the Nova Scotia coast just now, but the traps between Hubbards and Mill Cove made big hauls on Monday night.

While in Montevideo, the Nova Scotia bark, T. H. MacDonald was fouled by the Brazilian steamer Purus. The former suffered the loss of a motor boat and deck damage.

Thursday's Halifax Herald: Steamer Arammore is loading for a supply trip to lights and fog alarm stations to the eastward, including St. Paul Island and Cape Race, Newfoundland.

The new four mast schooner Charlotte Comeau, built by the I. M. Co. mean Shipping Co., was launched at Little Brook last week. This handsome vessel is 799 tons gross with a register tonnage of 728.

There were two fresh groundfish fares at the Boston pier Saturday morning besides a couple of shore boats with flounders and groundfish. Two small lots of mackerel from the southward sold at 13 cents a pound.

The schooner Susie N., is at Parrsboro loading for Tiverton, and the Annie Conley is at the same port loading for Church Point. The tern schooner Souvenir has also been chartered to load coal there for Tiverton.

The steamer Harbinger, now herding fishing for parties in Black Harbor, N. B., put into Yarmouth Monday on account of the weather. The herding taken by the Harbinger are being Scotch cured by the Black Harbor people.

By a notice recently issued by the Marine and Fisheries Department a red conical buoy has been established on Northwest Ledge and to the northward of northwest rock. It is moored in 78 feet of water in lat. 44. 19. 17 and long. W. 66. 24. 20. 3.4. miles 307. 15. from the north point of Erier Island.

Schr. Pisaquid, Capt. Dinsmore, for

the Canary Islands with lumber, has been lying at anchor in Westport for the last ten days. We understand that the Captain's wife has had some severe eye trouble, which has caused the delay. The captain, mate and most of the crew are all of one family. There are also small children aboard.

Twelve men, members of the crew of the Texas auxiliary four-masted schooner Elmira Roberts, Capt. Jorgensen, arrived at Yarmouth Wednesday reporting that their ship, loaded with ammunition, caught fire and blew up at sea. The schooner was on a voyage from Bordeaux to New York, with a full cargo of ammunition.

The Boston schr. Morning Star, Capt. Harry Ross, and Laverina, Capt. Ross, which were tied up in Gloucester, owing to the strike are now fitting out to resume fresh fishing out of Boston. Both of the above captains are brothers to Capt. Percy Ross and Ainslie Ross who were lost when the schr. Francis A. was sunk as reported in the MONITOR.

The steamer Glenholm, owned by the St. John Steamship Company, which went aground at Spencer's Island on Friday, was refloated on Saturday. It could not be ascertained just what extent of danger had been done but it is expected that when a few temporary repairs are made, she will be taken back to St. John and that she will soon be able to continue in the Bay service.

The dried fish situation shows some improvements since the settlement of dock strikes and other difficulties, which for several weeks past, have hindered the free movement of stocks in export. While there is little change in prices, if any, the market appears to be more buoyant. Operators in New York are taking an interest in new supplies, and several are prepared to make pilgrimages to Nova Scotia with a view of purchasing.

W. D. Sweeney's schr. Grace & Ruby, Capt. William Murphy, arrived at Yarmouth on Friday evening and on Saturday landed a fare of 12,000 lbs. fresh halibut, 50,000 fresh mixed fish and 10,000 salt fish. The vessel stocked \$4,100 and the crew shared \$84 per man for the trip. Among the halibut fare was one about 25 lbs., which had on some previous occasion been caught, initialed with the letters "I. F." and let go. When captured by the Grace & Ruby's fishermen the letters were of a bright blue color and very distinct.

Shipping arrivals at Annapolis the past week include one of the smallest 3-mast schooners afloat, the Souvenir, 31 tons, Capt. Outhouse, which arrived from St. John on the 25th and cleared for Digby the same day. Being also equipped with a gasoline screw propeller, the Souvenir lost no time nor tide. Schr. Emerald, 23 tons, Captain Clayton, arrived also on the 25th and cleared same day to return. Schr. Ariadne, 48 tons, arrived 26th from Portland, Maine, to Robin Jones & Whitman. Auxiliary schr. A. W. Longmire, 60 tons, cleared 25th for St. John. Stmr. Valinda arrived 27th from St. John.

The halo of the Sacred Cod received a jolt when the Ocean county, New Jersey, court was moved temporarily from Toms River to Seaside Heights, a distance of 10 miles, to listen to a tale about fish kept in storage two years. Judge William H. Jeffery conducted proceedings resulting in the condemnation of about 57,000 pounds of fish belonging to the Bay State Fish company of Boston, which had been stored with the Barnegat Power and Cold Storage company for more than a year. Although the fish had been in storage in New Jersey for the full maximum period of a year, marks on some of the packages indicated they had been stored in other states since August, 1917.

More Work Than Fun. Digby Courier says: We do not print obituary poetry unless it is paid for at regular advertising rates; so don't go to the bother of copying or composing it unless you wish to pay for having it printed. The doctor, undertaker and nurse all get paid for their services, but the printer is expected to set obituary poetry for the fun of the thing. And there is mighty little fun in it.

Holds An Auto Record. Capt. Guifford Melanson, of Gilbert's Cove, Digby County, who is as good at his Oakland auto wheel as at the wheel of a vessel, holds the record for time between his ship yard at Gilbert's Cove and Digby railway station, a distance of 15 miles, which he covered in company with the editor of the MONITOR last Thursday afternoon.
