New York, July 6 .- A Chicago special to the Tribune says: "Seventy-one dead and 2,264 injured are the figures in the Chicago Tribune's fourth of July casualties list up to 11 p. m. last night. An analysis of the figures shows the following de-tails: Of the deaths, there were by fire-works and resulting fires 37; by cannon 2; by firearms 16; by gun-powder 6; by toy pistols 2; by runaways 5; by heart failure due to explosions of cannon crackers 2. Those injured were:— By fireworks 1,109; by cannon 212; by firearms 196 by gunpowder 551; by torpedos 60 by toy pistols 211; by bomb canes 50; by runaways 35. The fire loss was \$525,935. This breaks all records for death since




