1st Lesson.

The first lesson comprises five phonographic elements, and exercises.

1<sup>st</sup>. Write a small circle, the smallest you can: that is

the sound ah<sup>2</sup>, or a as in,  
fat, father, ask.

2<sup>o</sup>. Write now a circle much  
larger than the first: O  
that will answer for oh,  
and will figure o as in  
note, not, form: or a as in  
all, talk.

3<sup>o</sup>. The same size circle,  
with a tail inside: O, will  
stand for oo as in moon,  
wool, or u as in rude,  
full.

4<sup>o</sup>. The fourth sign is a short  
perpendicular, about one eighth  
of an inch long: |, invariably  
written downwards: it is  
the letter p.

F - - - - = 3 - - - - ;

5° A perpendicular two or  
three times longer is the sign  
used for the consonant b.

With these five elements we  
can already figure a number  
of words.

Draw the sign used for  
p, ending in a small circle  
as used for a; b you  
have the word px : b.

It would be wrong to make  
an angle between the p and  
the a by placing the circle  
straight under the perpendicular "d": that would make  
two strokes of the pen instead  
of one. The angle can be  
avoided by turning the circle  
either side of the perpendicular:  
f or b.

Our great rule is to avoid angles, whenever it is possible. Take notice also that, after beginning a word, the pen should not be lifted from the paper, before the word is ended.

Now draw the p, as before, and terminate by a large circle, as for oh b : you have the word paw.

Draw again the same as for paw, drawing in a tail at the point where the circle naturally closes : b : you have poo.

Write now first the letter f : a : beginning at the bottom, so as to connect it without an angle with the following letter p : q : you have ap. Write in the same manner oh and p : q. Also f and t : Q : oop.

Write now a long perpendicular as for b ; terminating into a small circle : you have b : ba. In the same manner b : bear ; b : boo.

Write again the monogram b, pa, but before lifting the pen, draw downwards another perpendicular; it makes: q :: pap. In the same manner: q : pope. q : poop. If to the monogram q, pap, you add another o, you will have q : papa.

Note. = It will be good to study this lesson two or three times, copying out all the signs and monograms, before passing to the next lesson; it will secure rapidity in mastering the system.

We also suggest attention to avoid making the ah. o. too large, and the oh O too small.

Beginners are also liable to make the p too long, and the b too short, so as not to be able, when reading them over, to distinguish one letter from the other.

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Lesson.

The second lesson adds only two more elements to the tones already given.

Like p and b, the sounds t and d are similar, the one being short and sharp, and the other long and soft.

The letter t will be represented by an horizontal line, very short, and always written from left to right: —

The letter d, the same sign, but much longer: —

Now write an horizontal line, very short, terminating, without an angle into a very small circle turned above or below the line: it is ta

Then, write first the vowel, followed by the consonant, without making an angle.

Write again a, ta, but before lifting the pen, draw another t in this manner:

a or a : fat.

In the same way you have;

o or o : taught.

A number of other words can be written with the help of the two consonants of the first lesson:

Here the circle has to be turned above the line, so as to connect with the following consonant without an angle, and without the pen running the same course twice.

Rule : The circular vowels should always be turned in the direction opposite to that which the following consonant is to take.

L and R are called liquids
Lines written upwards, from
left to right, will represent
these letters: a short one for L
and a long one for r.

At first sight, these two
letters seem to resemble K and
lg. Yet they are perfectly
indistinct, and no confusion
can be made; for l and r

l are always written upwards, |
and k and g, downwards. |
When written on the same |
line, l and r will ascend |
above, and k and g descend |
below the line.

K and g, being downward
strokes will also appear thicker
and heavier than l and r,
which are upward strokes.
