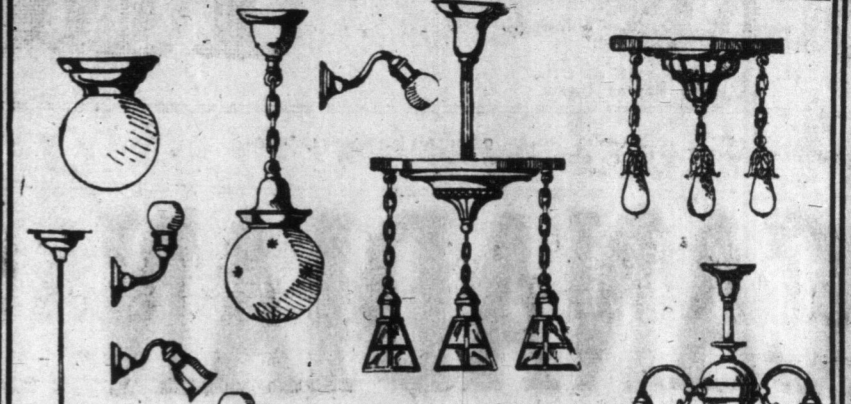

DUKE TO REVIEW OVERSEAS TROOPS

His Royal Highness to Visit Exhibition Park Camp Thursday Afternoon.

TWENTY MORE ENLIST

This Brings Number Joining Colors in Week to Four Hundred.

H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught has announced that he will visit Exhibition Park next Thursday afternoon, December 2, and it is expected that while at the camp the governor-general will hold a formal review of all the overseas troops in Toronto.

Authorization for the formation of a new Highland overseas battalion in Toronto, to be commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Duncan Donald, commander of the 48th Highlanders, has just been announced.

There were 20 enlistments in Toronto on Saturday. They brought the total of enlistments for last week up to 400, showing a decrease of 100 as compared with the previous week.

When the Queen's Own Rifles receive authorization to form an overseas battalion it will make a total of 20 active service infantry battalions raised or in process of mobilization in the Toronto military divisional area.

Major G. F. McFarlane, chief muster officer for the Toronto military area, has been recommended as the commanding officer of the new Grey County overseas Battalion, the formation of which was authorized at the week-end.

Special bayonet fighting and physical exercise courses will be given to a number of non-commissioned officers selected from each overseas battalion in Toronto. They will receive this special training at the bayonet exercise ground at the Old Fort when efficient they will act as battalion instructors.

Twenty men from each overseas battalion in Toronto, including the 32nd and 92nd at Riverdale Barracks, will take a six days' course in "bombing" at the "Ex" Camp, under direction of C. S. I. Coleman, R.C.M.P.

Many Sunday Visitors. Many Sunday visitors were at Exhibition Camp. In accordance, tho, with the camp regulations, only those who were allowed to enter any building occupied by troops unless accompanied by an officer, or to enter the Y.M.C.A. Canteen unless escorted by its soldier.

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Grain is Commandeered

NO GRAIN EXCHANGE CANNOT SEE THE POINT

Members Decide Not to Deal in Grain for a Few Days.

Millers Claim That Order May Cause Some Firms Hardship.

to the exchange, where a decision was reached to call a meeting Sunday afternoon.

Discussion centered largely round the ability of the Canadian transportation companies and ports to handle the balance of the western crop without aid from shipment in bond thru the United States, or what prairie farmers have been demanding thru their organization, the establishment of "free wheat," designed to give free entrance for Western Canada wheat to the market and mills of Minneapolis and Chicago.

Millions of Bushels. Revised estimates place the total western Canadian spring wheat crop at not a bushel less than three hundred and fifty million. Everywhere threshing returns show production much greater than the estimates. It may run nearer four hundred millions of this one hundred and fifty million bushels. The Canadian Pacific Railway has spent sixteen or eighteen million bushels in store there, and there is a total elevator capacity in Fort William and Port Arthur of about forty-one million bushels. About three million bushels are in transit, and the amount in farmers' hands or internal elevators available for export, after liberal provision for seed, cannot be less than one hundred and fifty million bushels more. Some of this is not threshed yet, but it is saved, provided it can be threshed before spring.

Railway Facilities. As to the transportation companies, they were never in better shape. The Canadian Pacific Railway has spent enormous sums in recent years in double-tracking and augmenting its facilities in regard to rolling stock, yardage and docks and elevators. Most of its north shore line is now double-tracked, as is the entire main line west of Port William. The company has established and broken in, turn, a number of new records this season for handling grain. Then there is the Canadian Northern Railway, operating for the first time an all-Canadian line between the head of the lakes and Montreal. And, in addition to these, the National Transcontinental, now being operated by the Dominion Government as part of its intercolonial railway system, and four transcontinental lines are available for taking care of western wheat shipments when insurance on lake boats runs out early next month. Every foot of these four lines runs thru Canadian territory and two of them at least are remote from the international boundary. It follows, therefore, that the "British Government or the Imperial Government," as the terms are used, are not likely to be in the neighborhood of \$1.05 unless the situation was disturbed by the government's action.

GREECE TO REJECT TERMS

IN NEW NOTE OF ALLIES?

Athens Reports That Situation Has Given Rise to Fresh Anxiety—Cabinet Council Not Agreed on All Points.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—The Greek situation is again disquieting. The Athens correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Co. says, with reference to the few joint notes of the entente ministers, that optimism has given way to skepticism.

Another Berlin despatch says: "If the occupation of Monastir by the Bulgarians becomes necessary the Bulgarian Government will give a definite promise to Greece that the occupation will be only temporary, and that it is caused only by the most stringent military necessities."

UNDER GUN FIRE

Canadian Bombardment Demoralized Germans, Who Feared Attack.

day 21 hostile machines flew over our area. Little signalling was observed, and they were probably reconnoitering for movements of troops.

German Biplane Falls. About dusk on Nov. 18 a German biplane landed in our lines about 1 1/2 miles behind our front trenches. The machine overturned, but was only slightly damaged. Two occupants, a captain and a sergeant, escaped injury and were made prisoners by one of our signalling officers and two lines. The machine had been engaged in a long distance trial flight. The pilot lost his way owing to the thick clouds and under the impression that he was still behind the German lines, being descended to earth to secure his bearings. The machine was successfully salvaged.

The use by our troops of an increasing number of rifle grenades and bombs was effective in checking the enemy's activity on our front. Rifle and machine gun fire was normal during the period. Enemy snipers were slightly more active than usual, but our snipers retaliated with good results. Enemy patrols displayed little activity.

Useful Information. Our patrols took advantage of the border to explore various sections of the enemy's wire entanglements. Useful information was secured. The activity of our patrols at night was well maintained. One of our patrols discovered an unexploded 4.5 shell between the front trenches. The shell was placed under the enemy's wire and detonated with a slab of cucumber, causing considerable damage.

In the early morning of Nov. 20 a German who was thringing bombs into our trenches from an old mine crater between the lines was shot by one of our snipers after daylight it was seen that this man had crawled from the crater to within 25 yards of the enemy's parapet. Ptes. J. J. M'Innes and A. Bonner of the 7th City of Winnipeg Battalion volunteered to investigate, and later in the day, also under heavy fire, succeeded in reaching the body. Various articles of value for identification purposes were secured and brought in.

Artillery Preponderates. During the period our artillery appreciably overbalanced that of the enemy's. On Nov. 24, with a view to damaging the enemy defensive works and causing him alarm, a systematic artillery bombardment was undertaken on our front, which was continued for two hours. A large number of shells of all descriptions were used. The firing was exceptionally good and in order to produce the maximum effect, an impending attack. The bombardment appears to have considerably demoralized the enemy, who in one or two instances bolted from his trenches, only to be caught in the open by our snipers and machine gunners.

Germans Fired On Own Men. In one place, apparently under the belief that an assault had taken place, the German artillery opened fire on their own front line trench and practically destroyed one of their own strong positions. A considerable por-

ROUMANIA TO VOTE CREDITS

TO STRENGTHEN DEFENCES

Money to Be Asked of Parliament to Face Present Difficult Conditions Created by War and Supply Needs of Army.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—King Ferdinand opened the session of the Roumanian Parliament in the presence of the crown prince and the ministers. The speech from the throne, says a Bucharest despatch to Reuter's Telegram Co., referred to the continuance of the war which is drenching the world with blood, and called attention to the fact that since the previous session other belligerents had been added to the nations engaged.

"This situation," the king continued, "imposes upon us increasingly the duty of uniting our efforts for the defeat of Roumania. You will be called upon to decide various measures and credits to face the present difficult conditions, and am convinced that you will continue to supply the needs of our beloved army, which has always shown itself worthy of the love and confidence of the country."

ASKS FOR RECRUITS

Capt. Buchanan Makes Stirring Appeal to Crowded Houses at Hippodrome.

Bigger crowds than ever were unable to gain admission to the Sportsmen's continuous Sunday concert at the Hippodrome yesterday. In the evening the people stood in line from deep half way down to Queen street, and the line to the north extended round the corner on Albert street. Last night's speakers included Capt. Buchanan, an officer with the Australian forces, who made a stirring appeal for recruits, relating some of his experiences on the front to show that fighting is good sport. "Have you ever tried on a suit of khaki to see if it will match your complexion?" he asked the men in the audience. "It will surely suit you, if you're not yellow."

"The entertainment, under the direction of Charlie Musgrave, official pianist extraordinary to the Sportsmen's Association, was the best yet given. Bugler Morgan sang twice acceptably. The 83rd Battalion Band, under Sergeant Reeve, played patriotic selections to a rousing reception, playing as well the accompaniments for Pte. Jack Slack, who repeated his big hit of the preceding Sunday night. Duncan R. Cowan, who has also become a favorite, appeared in Guardsman's uniform and won a big reception with his three songs.

The Zetland Choir, under the baton of Alex. Gorrie, appeared afternoon and evening, with Frank Oldfield and Albert Downing as soloists. This was the first time a choir has been introduced, and it proved a very acceptable addition to the program. Ernest Caldwell, the baritone, also contributed two fine solos.

FORMER GUELPH MAN DIES FIGHTING TURKS

MANY RESCUED

BY SUBMARINE OF TURK NAVY

Passengers of Steamer Near Cyprus Leaped in Terror Into Sea.

PICKED UP BY BOATS

"We Are Not Murderers," Shouted Captain of Submersible.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—A Turkish submarine stopped the British passenger ship Barulos in the Mediterranean, and after 25 had been drowned, assisted in rescuing many of the 360 passengers who had gone overboard in a panic, said Eleanor Franklin Egan, an eye witness who arrived today from the steamship New York.

The Barulos, Mrs. Egan said, left Piraeus for Alexandria on Oct. 2. Greeks and orientals, South of Crete, the ship picked up the British crew, containing the crew of the British steamship Sailor Prince, which had been sunk by a submarine.

Suddenly a submarine came to the surface, about two miles distant, and fired a shot over the Barulos. "Instantly wild panic broke loose," said Mrs. Egan. "Led by the crew and fireproof force, the passengers rushed for the boats. Women threw their children into the sea and jumped after them."

The submersible had her collapsible lifeboats out and the submarine crew were pulling people out of the sea as onto her deck. The officer was holding up his hands shouting, "God's sake, go back to your ship, we are not murderers."

"When all the rescued were returned to the Barulos, 25 were found missing. Two of the latter were British sailors from the Sailor Prince, who lost their lives diving overboard with their mates rescuing children.

"The rescued British sailors proved heroes. They not only tried to quell the panic, but succeeded in rescuing many persons. Afterwards they helped the women."

"An enemy force which occupied our advanced positions west of Konak made up his hand to retreat, but was defeated by our counter attacks and retired southward pursued by Turkish troops."

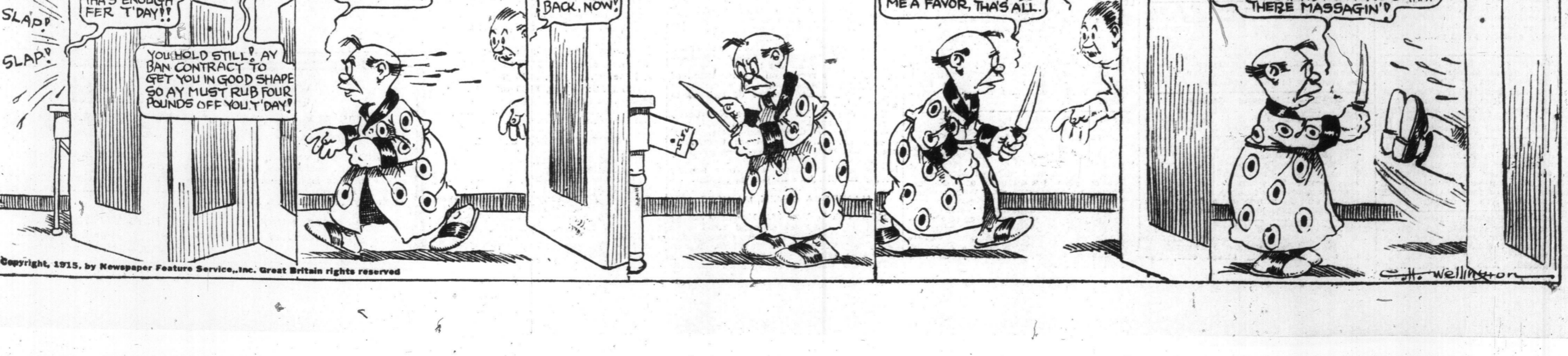

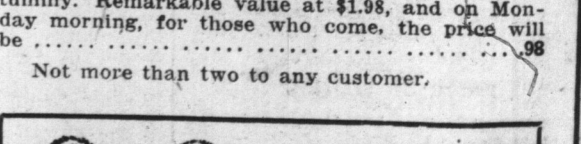

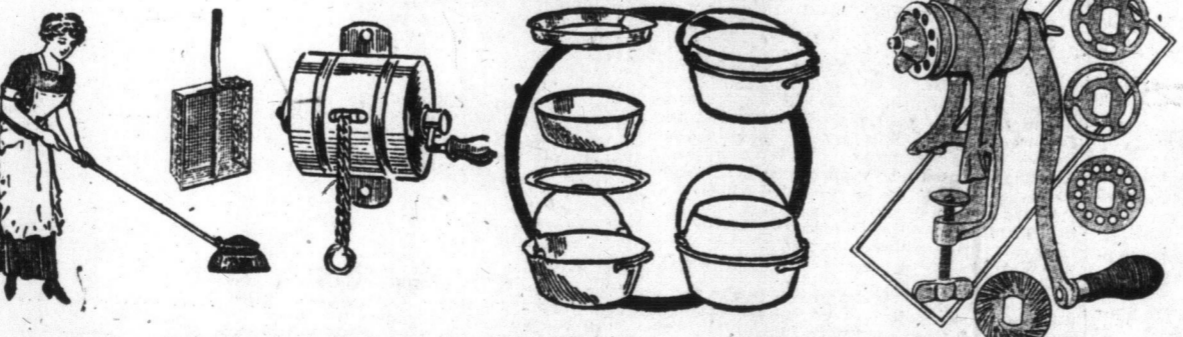
