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P R E F A C E .

At the request of the Executive of the Western Section of the Book Committee of the Methodist Church of Canada, the Revs. Enoch Wood, D.D., Ephraim B. Harper, D.D., Alexander Sutherland, D.D., John A. Williams, D.D., Richard Brown, Esq., J. B. Boustead, Esq., William Cluxton, Esq., and C. W. Coates, Esq., consented to form a Committee to prepare a collection of Tunes suitable to the various metres found in the New Hymn Book. A circular, inviting co-operation, was sent to the ministers, organists, and the principal leaders of choirs throughout the Connexion, which met with a large response; and the compilation now presented to the Church is the result.

The Music has been selected with great care, from the best sources, and with special reference to its adaptability for Congregational use, and at the same time meeting the growing improvement in the service of song observable in most of our Churches.

The Tunes here presented will be found to be in accord with the spirit and character of the Hymns in use amongst us; and the adoption of them, it is hoped, will promote intelligent expression, and devout feeling, in one of the most delightful exercises of Christian worship.

Many of the Tunes have been tested by long usage, and have become sacred as a medium of praise; others are relatively new; yet an acquaintance with them will soon render them as popular as the old.

The Committee express sincere thanks to those Publishers who have kindly permitted their copyright music to be inserted in this collection.

EDITORIAL NOTE.

As most of the tunes are printed in open notes, care should be taken not to sing too slowly. It is a mistake to suppose that all music so written is necessarily slow. For guidance in singing, certain terms are used. "Cheerful," etc., prefixed to the tunes, the terms being supposed to represent the time as marked by the single beat of a pendulum or metronome, as follows:—

<i>Joyful,</i>	Pendulum 23 inches.	Metronome 80 =
<i>Cheerful,</i>	" 27 "	" 72 =
<i>Moderate,</i>	" 31 "	" 66 =
<i>Slowly,</i>	" 38 "	" 60 =
<i>Slow,</i>	" 48 "	" 54 =

In following these indications, it should be remembered that the character of the hymn, the construction of the melody, the size of the congregation, and other circumstances, will be found to exert an influence upon the speed of the music.
