LESSON I. THE RESURRECTION OF CHRIST.

[April 2.

Matt. 28. 1-10.

[Commit to memory verses 6, 7.]

1 In the end of the Sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene and the other Mary to see the sepulchre.

2 And, behold, there was a great earthquake: for the angel of the Lord descended from heaven, and came and rolled back the stone from the door, and sat upon it.

3 His countenance was like lightning, and his raiment white as snow:

4 And for fear of him the keepers did shake, and became as dead men.

5 And the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear ye not; for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified.

6 He is not here: for he is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay.

7 And go quickly, and tell his disciples that he is risen from the dead; and, behold, he goeth before you into Galilee; there shall ye see him; lo, I have told you.

8 And they departed swiftly from the sepulchre with fear and great joy; and did run to bring his disciples word.

9 And as they went to tell the disciples, behold, Jesus met them, saying, All hail. And they came and held him by the feet, and worshipped him.

10 Then said Jesus unto them, Be not afraid; go tell my brethren that they go into Galilee, and there shall they see me.

CONNECTING LINKS.—At the close of the Friday on which the Lord was crucified, and before the Sabbath began, Joseph of Arimathea, Nicodemus, and the faithful women had buried the body in Joseph's new tomb. The hour was late and the work was hurried, and they planned to finish the embalming after the Sabbath. Early in the morning of the first day of the week they started for this purpose, and our lesson tells the rest of the story.

EXPLANATIONS.

In the end of the Sabbath—This means after the Sabbath had ended and the night had almost passed to the dawn of the day. **A great earthquake**—An earthquake marked his death and an earthquake marked his return to life. **Rolled back the Stone**—It was probably circular and set in a groove. **Countenance like lightning**—The appearance which Jesus had when transfigured. **Became as dead men**—Fell into a swoon, or fainted away. **The place where the Lord lay**—Probably a cell or niche cut in the perpendicular wall; perhaps a stone shelf or bench cut along the wall. **Held him by the feet**—An oriental salutation of profound reverence.

There are many other reasons, but this is the chief reason. Our Lord honored the Old Testament, and we must honor it, and receive it as the word of God.

17 Behold, happy is the man whom God correcteth: therefore despise not thou the chastening of the Almighty:

18 For he maketh sore, and bindeth up: he woundeth, and his hands make whole.

19 He shall deliver thee in six troubles: yea, in seven there shall no evil touch thee.

20 In famine he shall redeem thee from death: and in war from the power of the sword.

21 Thou shalt be hid from the scourge of the tongue: neither shalt thou be afraid of destruction when it cometh.

22 At destruction and famine thou shalt laugh: neither shalt thou be afraid of the beasts of the earth.

INTRODUCTORY.—Who wrote the book of Job no one knows. It is probably one of the oldest of books. It tells the story of Job, a man of great piety and wealth, who suffered extraordinary sorrows. These sorrows were with God's permission applied as tests to Job's character by Satan. His three friends, Eliphaz the Temanite, Bildad the Shuhite, and Zophar the Naamathite, came to condole with him, but really criticised him. Our present lesson is taken from part of one of the speeches of Eliphaz.

EXPLANATION.

Bindeth up—Most ancient medicines were externally applied, and a large share of the pains and aches of our ancestors were "bound up" for cure. **He woundeth, and his hands make whole**—He dislocates, then sets the dislocated limb. **Six and seven mean many**, just as in modern phraseology "half a dozen" means a few. In verses 20, 21 and 22, the great sources of ancient sorrow are mentioned: **famine**, which is almost sure to prevail wherever there are massed unproductive populations, as was the case throughout the Orient in Job's day, and is now the case in large portions of India and China; **war**, which was the normal condition of the ancient world, six months of peace being often unknown for a century; **the tongue**, which stands for malicious detraction, false testimony, such as must ever be prevalent in despotisms; **destruction**, which may stand for all natural calamities, like earthquakes; **the beasts of the earth**—Only in our century has this terror been removed from mankind, and even now the wolves of Russia and the beasts of Indian jungles ravish large districts and destroy many lives.

5 I would know the words which he would answer me, and understand what he would say unto me.

6 Will he plead against me with his great power? No; but he would put strength in me.

7 There the righteous might dispute with him; so should I be delivered forever from my judge.

8 Behold, I go forward, but he is not there; and backward, but I cannot perceive him:

9 On the left hand, where he doth work, but I cannot behold him: he hideth himself on the right hand, that I cannot see him.

EXPLANATIONS.

My stroke—Better, the hand; that is, God's hand pressed the groans of bitterness from Job's suffering soul. **His seat**—The judgment seat of God. Job thinks that if he could only find God, meet him face to face, he could clear his own character and show the injustice of his tribulations. **I would know the words which he would answer**—"If God would only speak I could understand him, and depend upon the truth he uttered; but man misjudges me." **But he knoweth the way I take**—Job has been lamenting that whether he turns northward, southward, eastward, or westward he cannot see God, and so cannot present his cause to him as an earthly sovereign; but at last he remembers that God is omniscient, and his confidence is renewed. **As gold**—That is, all the better for the fiery trial.

10 And the Lord turned the captivity of Job, when he prayed for his friends: also the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before.

EXPLANATIONS.

Job answered the Lord—Eihu, without introduction, follows Job's three friends, and tries to vindicate God's government of the affairs of men. His remarks are interrupted by a storm which rolls across the desert, and out of the thundercloud the voice of God is heard. When the Voice is silent Job confesses his error in the words of our lesson. **I uttered that I understood not**—Job perceives that it is foolish indeed for man to call in question God's way. **Dust and ashes**—In oriental lands people sit down in the dust and cover their heads with ashes as a sign of grief. **The words**—The words of chapters 38 to 41. **Spoken of me**—Better, spoken unto me. **Seven**—The perfect number; a complete

sacrifice. **Offer up for yourselves**—This passage is one of several which seem to prove the great antiquity of the story of Job. **Turned the captivity**—His sufferings were due to a certain bondage to evil powers. **Twice as much**—double the amount of property.

LESSON V. WISDOM'S WARNING.

Prov. i. 20-33.

20 Wisdom crieth without; she uttereth her voice in the streets:

21 She crieth in the chief place of concourse, in the openings of the gates: in the city she uttereth her words, saying,

22 How long, ye simple ones, will ye love simplicity? and the scorners delight in their scorning, and fools hate knowledge?

23 Turn you at my reproof: behold, I will pour out my spirit unto you, I will make known my words unto you.

24 Because I have called and ye refused; I have stretched out my hand and no man regarded:

25 But ye have set at naught all my counsel, and would none of my reproof:

26 I also will laugh at your calamity; I will mock when your fear cometh;

27 When your fear cometh as desolation, and your destruction cometh as a whirlwind; when distress and anguish cometh upon you.

28 Then shall they call upon me, but I will not answer; they shall seek me early, but they shall not find me:

29 For that they hated knowledge, and did not choose the fear of the Lord:

30 They would none of my counsel: they despised all my reproof.

31 Therefore shall they eat of the fruit of their own way, and he filled with their own devices.

32 For the turning away of the simple shall slay them, and the prosperity of fools shall destroy them.

33 But whose harkeneth unto me shall dwell safely, and shall be quiet from fear of evil.

EXPLANATIONS.

Wisdom, in this book stands for *right living*, morally and religiously. It begins with "the fear of the Lord." Rightly understood, true Wisdom and true religion offer the same counsels and direct in the same courses. **The chief place of concourse** was the crowded thoroughfare of the city. **The gates** were the places of popular resort. **Simple ones**—inexperienced and heedless ones. **Will laugh at your calamity**—This phrase simply means that the moral government of the universe unvaryingly pays the wages which sin has earned.
