THE INDUSTRIAL CITY



THE City of Hamilton—known as the manufacturing centre of Canada — is situated on the shores of Hamilton Bay, an almost perfect landlocked harbor at the head of Lake Ontario. It extends from east to west for a distance of about six miles, and from north to south from Bay to Mountain, for about three miles. From the Summit of the Escarpment, or Mountain, as it is generally called, a magnificent view is to be had. The City lies immediately below, with its wide, regularly laid out and well paved streets, its fine residences and

public buildings, and its wealth of beautiful shade trees. To the north are the clear waters of Hamilton Bay; to the west is a bird's eye view of Dundas Valley; while to the east, five miles away, is Burlington Beach—Hamilton's favorite Summer Resort—separating Hamilton Bay from Lake Ontario; and to the southeast "The Fruit Garden of Canada," with its fields of green and gold, greets the eye in a panoramic view seldom equalled, and certainly not surpassed, by any other on the American Continent—people from all over the world having come to visit this place and view the great garden in all its glory. About one million dollars' worth of fruit is shipped annually from this section, the greater portion of it passing through Hamilton.

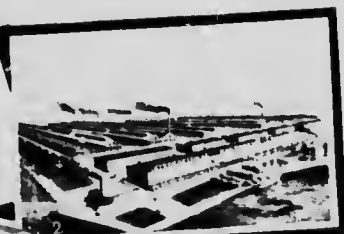

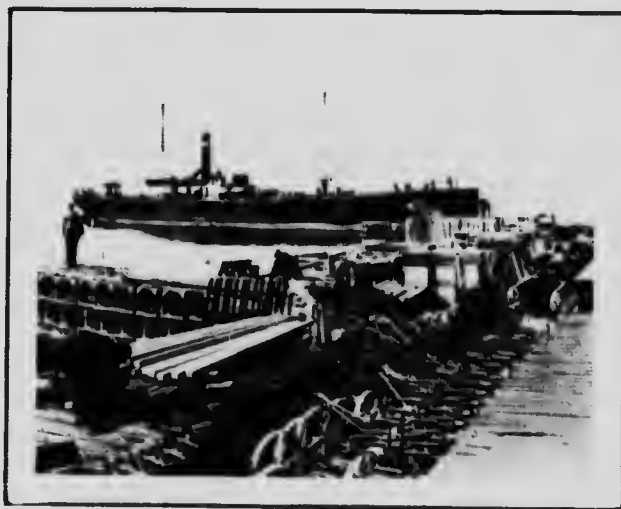

SHIPPING FACILITIES

GEOGRAPHICALLY, Hamilton is so situated that its manufacturers have a big advantage over those of other cities, both in the matter of assembling their raw material and disposing of manufactured ware, to the North-West Provinces and European markets by rail or water.

It is the regular port of call for all the Steamship Lines operating from Montreal to the head of Lake Superior; besides having direct connection with the principal railways of Canada—The Grand Trunk Railway; Canadian Pacific Railway; Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo Railway; Michigan Central Railway; New York Central Railway; Canadian Northern Railway, all operate through Hamilton. It is also the centre of a complete Electric Railway System.

The large bulk of the consuming population lies within what may be fairly called "short delivery distances."

RAW MATERIALS

MANUFACTURERS coming to Hamilton will find a large percentage of their materials here waiting for them. They will not have to import them, thereby suffering the exactions of high prices because of no competition. Iron and Steel Castings, Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Machine Tools, Wire Nails, Screws, in fact 90 per cent. of the raw material entering into the construction of machinery, is manufactured in Hamilton.

LABOR

ON ACCOUNT of its 415 industries, Hamilton has a well supplied labor market, of the best type of skilled mechanics and laborers. It has been particularly free from strife, there having been no strikes of any consequence in several decades.

HYDRO-ELECTRIC POWER

In Unlimited Quantities and Continuous Service.

POWER.

Under the average 60 per cent. load factor, continuous, from \$12.84 per h.p. per annum for restricted 10 hour service, to \$21.72 per h.p. per annum for unrestricted 24 hour service, including meter and transformer and delivered to consumer's motor.

These rates will likely be reduced very materially in the near future.

Special rates for quantities of 500 h.p. and over quoted on application.

LIGHT.

For factories using Hydro-Electric power, light is supplied at power rates. House lighting 4 cents per 100 square feet per month of area lighted, and 3 cents per k.w.h. for current consumed, including meter, less 20 per cent. 10 days.

The equipment of the Hydro-Electric Power System is of the most approved and up-to-date design, the installation having been completed within the last year. Every provision has been made to maintain an absolutely continuous service.

The Hydro-Electric System purchases power through the Ontario Government at Niagara Falls, and has a capacity of 200,000 h.p.

ELECTRIC POWER

HAMILTON possesses the advantage of having competition along this line, and rates are consequently exceedingly low. Far famed as the "Electric City of Canada," it has a practically unlimited supply of electric power from large power companies, economically generating power from Decew Falls 35 miles, and Niagara Falls 42 miles distant.

THE HAMILTON HYDRO-ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT is municipally owned and sells power to large or small consumers on the basis of the actual cost to serve them.

THE HAMILTON CATARACT POWER, LIGHT AND TRACTION COMPANY, LIMITED, a public service corporation, is ever ready to serve manufacturers in the best possible manner and to their entire satisfaction.

GAS AND COKE

THE Hamilton By-Product Coke Ovens, Limited, is the most recent addition to Hamilton's 409 industries.

This Company will carbonize a minimum of 1,000 tons of coal, producing about 700 tons of coke per day.

This coke is eminently fitted for foundry use for melting pig iron in the cupola and for any purpose for which metallurgical coke is used. It is also used for domestic and industrial purposes, such as baking, heating and steam raising.

This plant will also provide By-Product Coke Oven Gas of a high candle power and very high heat value for domestic and manufacturing use, at practically the same prices as are now charged for natural gas.

This will give Hamilton the lowest priced artificial gas on the American Continent.

HAMILTON'S HOME LIFE

HAMILTON has a Mild and Even Climate. The mean temperature for February, 1913, the coldest month, was 21 degrees, and for August, the hottest month, 68 degrees.

Although the greatest manufacturing city in the Dominion, from a sanitary point of view, Hamilton ranks as one of the most attractive residential localities in Canada.

The manufacturing plants, situated for the most part in the north and east of the city, are in nearly all cases admirably laid out, and models of the practical application of modern sanitary methods.

The streets and public thoroughfares are wide, well paved and well kept, the parks, pleasure grounds and theatres all that could be desired. The homes of the industrial classes are in the main substantial and comfortable, and in most cases have a grassy plot in front and sufficient ground for a garden in the rear.

Hamilton's water supply is obtained from Lake Ontario, six miles distant, is sand filtered and famous for its purity.

Situated in the midst of the greatest garden territory of Canada the city is well supplied with fresh vegetables and all the fruits in season.

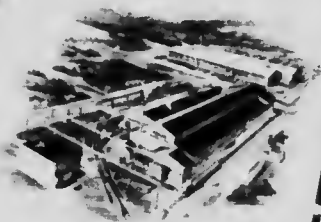
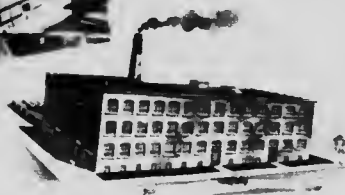

FREIGHT RATES

HAMILTON is more favorably situated than the majority of Canadian Cities, as regards freight rates. Being an intermediate point between Buffalo or Detroit, it can get lower freight rates from places like New York and Chicago, and being nearer the border pays a lower rate on coal, etc. Many factory sites are available where switching privileges may be obtained from the railways.

EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES

THE facilities for acquiring an education in Hamilton ranks high—there are over thirty private and public schools, with a daily average attendance of about 12,000 pupils.

There is also a Normal School, Technical School, Collegiate Institute and several Business Colleges.

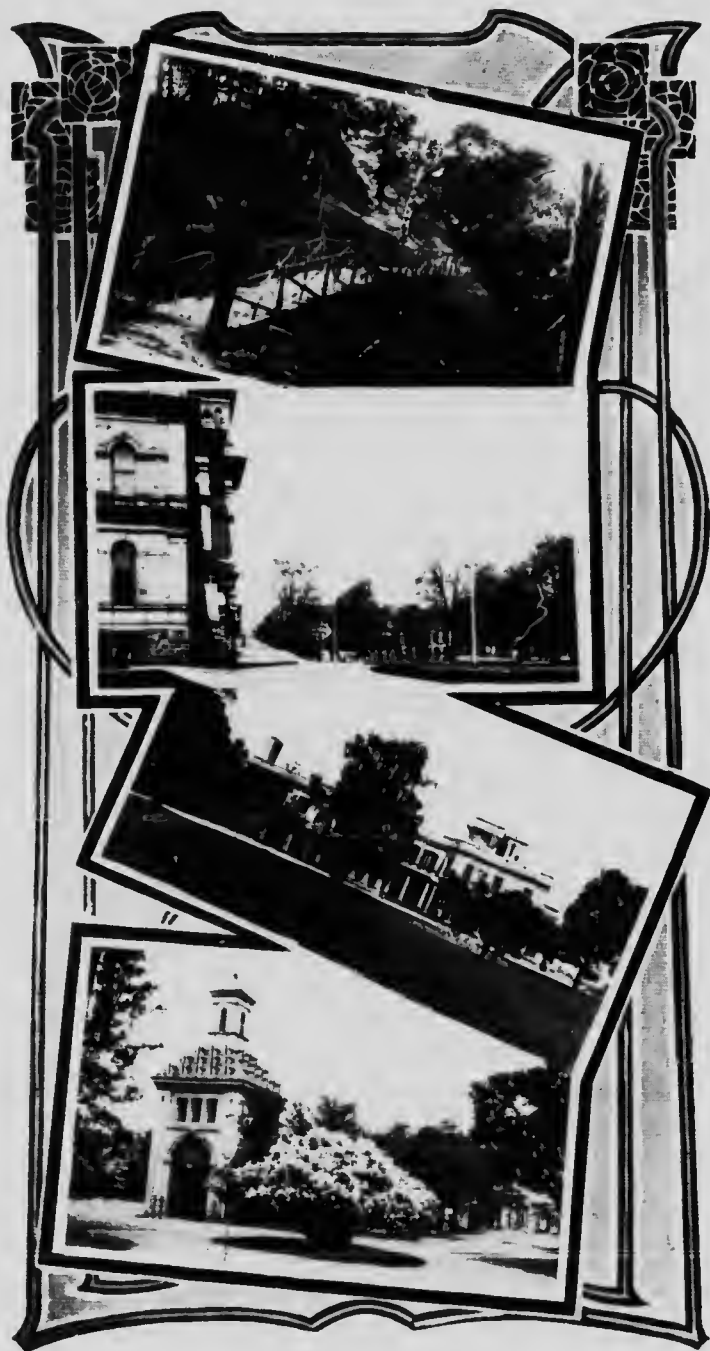

CIVIC GOVERNMENT

THE popular trend in municipal circles is towards Government by Commission. Hamilton has been moving this way for some years, but with this difference from most places—that while they have been concentrating power in the hands of a small Commission, Hamilton has distributed the power to a number of Commissioners, mostly appointed by the City Council. The School Board, Parks Board, Library Board, Hospital Board, Cemetery Board, Board of Health, Hydro Electric Light & Power Commission, and Harbor Commission, are practically independent Boards, in full control of their departments, so far as their management and expenditures are concerned, while the general policy of the city, the amount of money appropriations made to the various boards, the fixing of the rate of taxation, and the collection of taxes, are in the hands of the City Council, a representative body, consisting of Mayor, four Controllers, and sixteen Aldermen, elected annually by the people. The Mayor and Controllers form a Board of Control, and no money appropriation or Council expenditure can be made without their approval except by a two-third vote of the Council. So that Hamilton practically enjoys the advantages of both an independent and representative government, graft and extravagant expenditures being almost unknown.
