The Resolution.

Resolved: That in the opinion of this meeting, representing municipalities, it is desirable that a system of electric railways, including street railways, be owned by the municipalities, be established and built, and further, that the Hydro-Elecand further, that the Hydro-Electric Power Commission be requested to look into the advisability and practicability of building such a system and to furnish a report thereon to this association.

In order that the request to the Hydro-Electric Power Commission be made definite, it is further suggested that the initial report should refer only to road following the hydro transmission lines of the commission at present existing and contemplated, in the Niagara power zone, extending thruout Western Ontario and the Midland district. It is desired that the report shall cover cost of construction, cost of operation and probable revenue in each case.

Ontario is to be the possessor of a Ontario is to be the possessor of a comprehensive railway system, owned in its entirety by the municipalities of the province, within the next few years, if the Ontario Municipal Electric Association can instil the same degree of enthusiasm in the two governments as it now possesses itself.

A NOVEL GERMAN FERRYBOAT.

An unusual type of car ferryboat has just been completed for the Port of Hamburg, Germany. As a sister ship is being constructed, it is evident that the authorities are satisfied with the type of vessel that has been developed.
The essential feature of the new vessel The essential feature of the new vessel is a movable deck, with a lifting power sufficient to provide for an elevation of 16.4 feet with a load of six freight cars three on each side. The vessel itself is of 470 tons gross measurement, and is 116.47 feet long, 50.85 feet in breadth, and 12.46 feet deep. It has two triple expansion engines of 640 indicated horsepower. The lifting of the deck is made possible by a high steel superstructure, on the top of which is the officers' bridge, from which point all the operations of loading, unloading, and navigation can be carried on.

The movable deck feature is indispensable in Hamburg, as there is a tidal variation in the water level of about 6.56 feet in normal times, but which is considerably more than that exceptionally, and sometimes less in dry weather. The distances between the various sections of the port are considerable and the use of movable bridges is, in most localities, out of the question.
