Many who went short of the market, finding the phospects of recovery bright, covered freely. Generally speaking, there was a healthier sentiment all around. The greatest strength was noted near the close, a report of another cargo sold for shipment to Calcutta helping prices materially. December wheat opened from 72c to 72 5-8c, sold between 71 1-2c and 73 1-2c, closing at 73 1-8c, 2 5-8c higher than yesterday. Cash wheat was firm and 2c higher.

In 1887 the city proposed to construct the works necessary for the bridge and subway to carry King street under the tracks of the G.T.R., C. Canada Accident Assurance Co. 246 \$160,000, provided the railway companies paid their fair proportion. On applica-tion to the Railway Committee of the Privy Council the proportions payable by Privy Council the proportions payable by the railways were adjusted and the contribution of the city settled at \$80,000, or such other sum in excess or below that as might be necessary to cover the expenditure. The city passed bylaws providing for the works as local improvements and obtained from the C.P.R. a release from any claim they might have for damages owing to the frontage of their lands adjoining the works being cut off by the subway. The cost of the work, including necessary expenditure on the approaches, pavements, etc., considerably exceeded the estimate, but the C.P.R. paid only the \$15,000 apportioned by the Order-in-Council as their contributory share towards the expenses. The city assessed the C.P.R. Co. under the bylaws for a share of the extra cost as local improvement taxes, and the company took proceedings to have the bylaws quashed so far as they were concerned, claiming that they could not be called upon for any further contribution in the matter than the amount fixed by the Railway Committee, and that the ar-groaches and all other necessary works in connection with the subway and the bridges over it were covered by the original agreements, which had been submitted to the committee. The bylaws were quashed, as prayed, by Mr. Justice Macmahon, who heard the application, and his judgment was affirmed on appeal. The city now asks to have the judgments of both the lower courts reversed and the assessment maintained against the railway company. Judgment reserved. Robinson, O.C. and Caswell for appellants; Armour, Q.C. and MacMurchy for respondents.



The largest nugget found in California was the "Oliver Martin chunk," which weighed 151 pounds 6 ounces. The gold was mixed with white quartz and was sold as bullion for \$20,270. The nugget was found near Camp Corona, Tuolumne County, in Central California, Nov. 18, 1854. Oliver Martin, a poverty-stricken miner, and a companion named John Flower were tramping to new diggings. They camped one night in a mountain canyon, when a sudden and heavy rainstorm made the mountain stream into a flood. They attempted to climb the hill, but were carried away. Flower was drowned, but Martin escaped with severe injuries. Weak as he was, Martin attempted to bury his companion's body by the roots of an upturned tree. While digging he discovered the rich nugget.

Martin was too weak to move it. He attempted to reach some neighboring miners, but fainted from exhaustion and was found on the trail by the miners. Some weeks later Martin and the miners secured the nugget.




