

### KITCHENER SATISFIED WITH WAR 200,000 MEN

Captures of Stock and Supplies Reported Constantly, and Boers Are Surrendering by Scores and Hundreds Every Week—  
No Talk of Reinforcing British Troops.

London, July 7. (Cable.)—A British army of 200,000 men is still employed in waiting and watching for a force of Boers ranging between 7000 and 10,000 men. The last incident of a railway station 50 miles from Johannesburg on the Natal Railway, with a final repulse of the raiders. It was even more insignificant than the wrecking of a train on the Pietersburg line. The largest Boer force which has been raiding or skirmishing during recent weeks does not exceed 400 men. The captures of stock and supplies are constantly reported by Gen. Kitchener, and the Boers are surrendering by scores or hundreds every week. It is evident that the Boer guerrilla warfare becomes month by month less venacious, and that Gen. Kitchener is gradually wearing down by processes of attrition the Dutch resources for resistance, narrowly efficient as these have proved. The bands of raiders have been reduced in strength, and their capacity for inflicting injury has been impaired. The loss of horses would be an insuperable obstacle to a continuance of guerrilla warfare if the fighting Boer when reduced to hard straits were not enabled to conceal his gun and masquerade as a native.

refugee farmer. The difficulty of ending the war has been increased by the fact that the Boers have been transformed into neutralists and British sympathizers at a moment's notice, and also by the systematic arrangements for feeding and protecting the women and children.

There is no longer any talk of reinforcing the British army. Gen. Kitchener does not ask for more troops, but is contented with the situation, and with the steady progress made in clearing the country.

**BELGIUM BRITAIN'S FRIEND.**

**BRITISH LOSE IS MEN.**  
London, July 7.—Lord Kitchener telegraphs the War Office under today's date, from Pretoria, that a train from Pietersburg was wrecked by the Boers yesterday, north of Naboomspruit. A lieutenant and nine men of the Gordon Highlanders were killed, besides one artilleryman, one engineer, one freeman, a guard and four natives.

### 60,000,000 OF MANITOBA WHEAT IS PREMIER ROBLIN'S ESTIMATE

Thinks Also That 20,000 Men Will Be Required to Harvest the Crop—Expects Province to Get \$111,000 Revenue From School Lands.

Winnipeg, July 7.—In a political address Premier Roblin said, with regard to the crop, that he had never seen or heard of such glowing prospects as at present. As Minister of Agriculture, he was sure that the yield would be nearer thirty bushels per acre than twenty-five, which would mean 60,000,000 bushels raised in the province. With regard to the additional labor required to handle the crop, he had formerly estimated it would require 15,000 men, but now he thought it would be quite 20,000 that would be required, and that would only mean one extra man to each two farmers.

The Premier gave the details of the Dominion school land question, by which the local government claimed \$111,000 from the Parliament at Ottawa. They had received a notice that the claim would not be allowed, but that the Manitoba government could appeal to the Exchequer Court of Canada, and he took the public opportunity of saying that it was the settled policy of the government to take the matter to that court, and he had no doubt that the province would secure the addition of the \$111,000 to the revenue of Manitoba.

### POPE REVIEWS FRANCE Letter to the Religious Orders Tells Them to Return Good for Evil.

Paris, July 7.—The Pope publishes a telegram stating that the Pope has sent a letter to the heads of the religious orders regretting the attacks made against them and the failure of his endeavors to protect their rights and checked in her work. He says the new law is contrary to natural, evangelical and ecclesiastical rights, and declares that the true cause of the persecution is the world's hatred of the Church. The extinction of the religious orders, he says, is an able manoeuvre to prepare for the apostasy of the nations. The world's malignity pretends work for the Church and not deny, and to imitate their forefathers, who passed their worse days with you are the Pope and the entire Church. Remember Christ's words: 'I have conquered the world.'

### TEMPERANCE PROFESSORS Founding of a Chair of Brewing at Birmingham Spurs Opposition to Action.

London, July 7.—English temperance leaders are heading their energies to establishing temperance professorships in the great universities of Great Britain and America. Spurred by the success of the British liquor trade in founding a chair of brewing in Birmingham University, an institution of which Mr. Chamberlain, the chancellor, the white ribbons seek to endow lectureships devoted to the gospel of total abstinence. ### SCORED MR. SUTHERLAND. Rev. Albert Walkley of Ottawa Wants Cabinet Ministers Who Have Larger Ideas.

Ottawa, July 7.—The Hon. James Sutherland came in for criticism by the Rev. Albert Walkley in the English temperance tonight, because of a statement attributed to Mr. Sutherland in regard to manual training. Mr. Walkley said that he did not know what manual training was, but that he believed in training young men to box so that they would learn self-reliance and be able to take hard knocks in life. Mr. Walkley said he supposed Mr. Sutherland had in mind such men as John L. Sullivan, James J. Corbett and others. The Rev. Walkley was not in the habit of praying that God would guide the hands of the men who had brought over a large number of passengers from "Old" to "New" Ontario.

### DEADLOCK IN CHINA. Leading Cause is That Committee Have Taken to Themselves Too Much Power.

Peking, July 7.—The minister of one of the great powers told the representative of the Associated Press today that a deadlock in the present apparent deadlock was the fact that the various committees had taken to themselves too much authority in dealing with the Chinese, and had made certain promises dependent upon the Chinese agreeing to certain conditions which other ministers afterwards found it impossible to accept. Another factor of commercial importance, he said, was the government's failure to give the right of commerce to make its own treaties with China, and the application of the most-favored-nation clause. In his opinion, the first difficulty can be overcome shortly, but the commercial issue must be eliminated or it is likely to prove a definite stumbling block.

### MENACE TO BRITISH. Paris, July 7.—The projected canal between the Atlantic and the Mediterranean, which has been under consideration by a parliamentary commission for some years, has made a step forward. A sub-committee, appointed to examine the Manchester Canal and then proceed to Kiel to examine the Baltic Canal, reports that the realization of the scheme would be of immense value strategically to France, as it would allow the Northern sea route to join the Mediterranean one.

### ROPE WAS CUT. Syracuse, N.Y., July 7.—While Prof. A. Smith was attempting "a sail for life" at Waterston on July 4 his apparatus broke, and he fell to the ground. It is impossible to say that the rope holding Phillips was cut. The officials are investigating.

**LIGHTNING'S ODD FREAK.**

The attendants fled panic-stricken and it was not until after dark that the sexton could return and fill the grave.

### BOERS EARN NAME OF "BUTCHERS" BY BRUTALLY SHOOTING WOUNDED

LONDON, July 8.—The Daily Mail gives sensational prominence this morning to the mail advices from Vlakfontein, which attribute to the Boers inhuman atrocities that the censor would not allow to be described by cable.

"A couple of Boers," says the Daily Mail's correspondent, "were armed with Martini, walking around among the dead and dying. Some they turned over to see if they were dead. If it were otherwise, then one or the other of the Boers shot them as you would shoot an ox. I saw four killed in this way. One youngster pleaded for his life. 'I heard him say: 'Oh, Christ, don't!' and then bang went the rifle. That is what happened."

The Daily Mail protests vigorously against the suppression by the censor of such details.

### WOMAN MAY SAVE THE PARTY ENGINEER HELD TO ENGINE. A PLAGUE OF SMALL FROGS

Lady Campbell-Bannerman Has Some Liberals on Good Terms With One Another.

London, July 7.—The Liberals have been saved from disruption by the timely services of Lady Campbell-Bannerman, who at a critical moment invited all her husband's supporters to an evening party. The Liberal Imperialists and the Radicals were so astonished to find that everybody on the Opposition side was on speaking terms with everybody else that they became genial and peaceable. Other Liberal houses will come to work for social amelioration during the next ten days. It is a large field for social missionary work. Lady Campbell-Bannerman has a reputation for the Liberal social and Conservative next week, and Lady Crewe, Lady Curzon, Lady Grey and Lady Minto are planning similar peace-making functions. West Enders are rubbing their eyes and wondering whether there will be a revival of the old-time Whig salon, once associated with the hospitable and unassuming in the Liberal ranks. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman will receive a vote of confidence from the Liberal caucus, and may possibly accept an invitation to the Asquith dinner. Lord Rosebery remains out of sight, but Mr. Asquith back; consequently there is no direct challenge of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman to the leadership of the party. The party will be patched up. It is not likely to be a permanent peace, however; Mr. Asquith and the Liberal Imperialists are too far removed from the Radical and the pro-Boer to remain idle spectators when the Liberal party is in the hands of a lack of patriotism and self-restraint. Gladstone's greatest sacrifice has been made by the Liberal party, and is following the tactics of guerrilla warfare like the scattered bands of Boers in the field.
