WASHINGTON EXPECTS AN ANSWER ABOUT MIDDLE OF NEXT WEEK

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WASHINGTON, April 21.—Ambassador Gerard at Berlin cabled the state department today that he had delivered the American note on submarine warfare to the German foreign office at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

GERMANY WILL NOT SURRENDER OUTLOOK GRAVE

WASHINGTON, April 21.—As far as the Associated Press has been made acquainted with the sentiment in higher quarters, it would be wrong to regard the situation as anything but extremely grave. The note probably will be answered some time next week, after serious consideration has been given the American contention, but there is little hope that any answer can go to the length demanded by the Washington Government, despite the fact that the government desires to maintain good relations with the United States.

U. S. INTENT TO BAR JAPANESE REVISITS ISSUE

Immigration Bill Virtually Excludes Mikado's Subjects Along With Hindus.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Japan has renewed her objections to provisions in the pending immigration bill which are construed as virtually excluding into law the celebrated Root-Takahira agreement for the restriction of immigration to the United States and as including Japanese with Hindus in an excluded class.

ITALIANS SEIZE POINTS ALONG GREEK BORDER

Position at Thassos, Fagheen and Kiorka Heights Being Fortified.

ATHENS, Greece, April 21, via Paris, April 21.—Italian forces have occupied Thassos, Fagheen and Kiorka Heights in northern Epirus near the Greek-Albanian frontier. They are fortifying these positions with heavy artillery.

BRITISH DESPERE PARTY OF ENEMY AT ST. ELOI

Mining Activity, Trench Mortar Work and Artillery Duels Continue.

Special Cable to The Toronto World, LONDON, April 21.—The only infantry fighting reported from the British front tonight was the dispersing of a party of Germans who had left their trenches near St. Eloi. Mining activity raged near Pricourt, Souchez, Hulluch and Givenchy. Trench mortar fighting became quite extensive and intensive south of Arras, and rival artilleries fought duels between Souchez and La Bassée Canal and about Ypres.

COUNT VON HASSELER IS MADE SCAPEGOAT

His Recall to Berlin Is Sequel to Failure of Verdun Offensive.

LONDON, April 21.—A Morning Post despatch from Bern says: Field Marshal Count von Hasseker, who has been the crown prince's guide and inspiring spirit since the beginning of the war, has been recalled from the western front and has arrived in Berlin.

THREE THOUSAND TURKS FELL IN BIG ATTACK UPON BRITISH

Great Number Also Wounded When Enemy Blundered on Tigris River—Many German Leaders Killed in Charge.

LONDON, April 21.—The recent attack of the Turks on the British forces along the Tigris, in Mesopotamia, was made by about 10,000 men and cost them heavy losses. An official account of the battle, supplementing the earlier reports from the front of one of our brigades, was given out today as follows:

"The enemy made his attack on the 17th and 18th with some 10,000 men, comprising one whole division and portions of two others. They came on in dense formation and penetrated part of our front within 500 yards of the front of one of our brigades about 1200 to 1500 dead Turks were counted."

It is reported they are lying thick further out before the front on other portions of our lines. Their killed alone on the night of April 17-18 are estimated at more than 3000. In several instances attacks were led by Germans, some of whom were killed.

"Apparently the enemy supposed that part of our troops were isolated by floods, and that they had a chance of overwhelming it. As a matter of fact supports were moving up at the time.

"Our total casualties, killed, wounded and missing were very considerably less than the Turkish killed. "On the 18th stormy weather made aircraft reconnaissance very difficult. The floods are spreading and the river is still very high."

WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

FRENCH authorities at Marseilles allowed it to be known yesterday that possibly a quarter of a million Russian troops will be transported from the eastern to the western theatre of the war this spring. They decline to permit the mention of the number of Russian soldiers already in France, and they are also keeping secret the port of embarkation. The news of the safe arrival of these men in France was officially announced in Petrograd in the following words: "The war brotherhood of the French and Russian armies has been strengthened by the arrival of Russian troops at Marseilles."

A quarter of a million men is too large a force to be transferred from the east to the west out of sentiment; its transportation involves too many difficulties, risks and expense to be undertaken lightly as a mere demonstration of allied solidarity. Of course, it is in a general measure, a great vindication of the fact that the allies will stand or fall together. The troops are intended to bring the allied strength in France and Flanders up to a certain maximum. That is, the allied general staffs estimate that they require a certain reserve of men to prevent defeat or to administer a knock-out to the Germans. But, as it is reckoned that the allies now have an ample number of men for the defensive, this prospective ample reinforcement can only signify that they are planning to take the offensive.

The increase in allied strength brought about in the western theatre of the war by the arrival of these Russians and the prospective arrival of many more, furnishes a renewed problem to the German general staff. What if the allies should bring round a million Russians by mid-summer? It would be positively dangerous for the Germans to permit the forces of the allies to exceed their own forces by fifty per cent. in the west. Here is Turkey clamoring for assistance. If help is sent to her, with these additional Russians—found men, because equipped and munitioned by the allies—menacing the German position in Belgium, how can the Germans spare men from the west to help Turkey or to help Bulgaria and Austria in their hours of need? As Russia can easily mobilize, all told, ten or twelve million men, provided that there is equipment for them, the Germans have a great

U. S. SWORD IS WOODEN

GENEVA, via London, April 21.—Commenting on the American note on submarine warfare, the Deutsche Tages Zeitung of Berlin says: "Germany will never yield to America, because of Wilson's bluff. The attitude of the American press is in comical contrast to the really effective power of that country. The best methods of advertisement of which Wilson is a master wear thin in time. "STAND BY WILSON" IS EXHORTATION OF TAFT

Germany Must Yield or War is Inevitable in His Opinion.

CHICAGO, April 21.—War with Germany seems unavoidable unless Germany recedes from its position in the submarine controversy, is the opinion of ex-President Taft.

In a speech today Mr. Taft asked his audience to stand by President Wilson in the present crisis. He expressed the hope that diplomatic interchanges would avert war. "This is a terribly trying hour for the United States," he said. "President Wilson is the president of all of us, and I am a citizen of the United States."

INFANTRY FIGHTS GAIN ITALIAN PRISONERS

Successful Air Raid Against Trieste Hydroplane Station.

LONDON, April 21.—Small infantry engagements in the upper Astico and Sugana valleys and on the upper Cordevole fought by the Italians gained today. Several Italian Caproni aeroplanes raided the Austrian hydroplane station at Trieste and dropped bombs, causing visible disaster to their target.

GERMANY WILL NOT MAKE A SURRENDER

All Indications Point to Severance of Relations With the United States.

Note Has Not Been Given Out for Publication in Papers.

nage, received into today from Mr. Gerard, was closely guarded. It is understood that the ambassador informed the department he had been assured immediate consideration would be given to the note.

Cables From Gerard.

It became known tonight that several messages have been received from Ambassador Gerard during the past day or so. It was stated authoritatively, however, that they transmitted only expressions of editorial opinion from German newspapers. These editorial excerpts were closely examined by officials in an attempt to gain some understanding of the state of German public opinion.

Despatches from the ambassador are looked for momentarily to give definite information regarding the views of German officials, the manner in which the note was received and forecasts of the action which will be taken by the German Government in response to the demand of the United States that it declare and effect an abandonment of the present methods of conducting submarine warfare.

Bernstorff Away.

Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, writes in Washington today. He left early this morning on a week-end trip. He is not expected to return to the capital until Monday, unless despatches of an important nature bearing on the submarine issue should be received before then.

Presentation of Note

BERLIN, Thursday, April 20, via London, April 21, 4:30 p.m.—The American note in regard to submarine warfare is now in the hands of the German Government. It was delivered this evening to Foreign Minister Von Jagow in the case that there are no attendant circumstances to mark the unusual importance of the occasion.

Owing to the length of the note and the appendix to the delayed arrival of one section of the note, it was not ready for presentation until late in the afternoon. Ambassador Gerard then rolled the document in a magazine to protect it from a light rain which was falling and ran across the square to the foreign office.

The ambassador was received immediately. The foreign minister read the note and a short general conversation followed.

The note probably will not be published here before Sunday, and no comment by the German press is expected before that time.

many additional worries, and the prospect of greater troubles looming ahead will make them more desperate than ever.

It was confirmed yesterday by the British general staff which now has the Mesopotamian campaign under its control, having taken it over from the Indian office a short time ago, that 3,000 Turks were killed during their recent retreat from the British Tigris corps. The British Tigris corps, which also suffered heavily in wounded, and of the 10,000 men who took part in the charge, it is not improbable that 9,000 were put out of action. Many German officers led the Turkish charge and fell before the British fire. The assault of the Turks on the British, it seems, was owing to blunder. They believed that part of the British forces had been cut off from their supports by the floods, but in reality these supports were moving up to the front at the time. The Turks charged the British line in dense formations as their German schoolmasters had taught them, and they went down before the scientifically trained Britons like nineties. The British losses in killed, wounded and missing, were under 3,000.

Germany has officially received the strong demand from President Wilson that submarine warfare against merchantmen cease, and the outcome is obscure. The only guidance for a prediction is found in what recently happened. It will be remembered that the new piracy campaign had been slated to begin on the first of May. The United States Congress, before that date, backed the president in his anti-piracy policy, and Germany, which had first intended to disregard the United States, made a volte face, kept her boats in harbor and then dismissed Von Tirpitz, partly because he lost a great many submarines and partly because his dismissal was intended to signify to President Wilson that the sinking of merchant ships would be abandoned as rapidly as the enemy if Roumania was moving about by the failure of the Germans to take Verdun. Then came the unforeseen factor. The dismissal of Von Tirpitz was taken by the German people as a backdown to the United States, and Maximilian Harden led a popular agitation for a continuance of piracy. The German Government was cowed by the clamor of the hungry Germans and it was forced to disregard the American stand and to carry its program of sinking at sight. The German general staff does not desire a break with the United States and it may consent to back down. But against this recession is always the prospect of a demand for a misled public, drunk with weird stories of German victories, of India in revolt and lost to Britain, and other idiotic reports industriously spread by the Wolff press bureau.

So the future relations between Germany and the United States continue to hang by a thread.

This new found ability of the allies to shift men from the east to the west, and, if needed, from the west to the east, negates the former advantage that the Germans and Austrians had in their central position. The Germans have been able to move from one theatre to another, men at the rate of an army corps every ten days or so. By reason of the sea transport and the carrying capacity of shipping, it is probable that the allies, by the use of Kola and Ekaterinograd, will be able to transfer men backwards and forwards as rapidly as the enemy. If Roumania is sent to France, Roumania can be sent to Saloniki and in this way the continued neutrality of Roumania will not be an obstacle to the allies in their campaign to redeem Serbia and to invade the central powers on their flank.

On the British front the Germans have, evidently, been given enough of the fighting about Ypres and St. Eloi to last them for several days, for they did not advance to the attack yesterday. The bulk of the operations on the British front yesterday consisted of mining activity near Fricourt, Souchez, Hulluch and GivENCHY; of trench-mortar fighting south of Arras, and of artillery duels between Souchez and La Bassée Canal and in the neighborhood of Ypres.

In the Balkans the allies are steadily going on with their preparations for an offensive, and the Italians have extended their front in this theatre by occupying Thanasi, Fasgion, and the Klorika heights in northern Epirus, near the Greek-Albanian frontier. When the allied advance does come, it will be in two columns at least, moving from Avlona and Saloniki.

THIRTY PERSONS KILLED IN BORDEAUX EXPLOSION

Powder Branch of Grenade Factory Blew Up, Causing Havoc.

BORDEAUX, April 22, 12:05 a.m.—Thirty persons are believed to have been killed in the explosion of the powder branch of a grenade factory here today. Already 28 bodies have been taken out of the debris.

The cause of the explosion has not yet been established, but the theory is that a spark from the electrical machinery set off powder while it was in process of being mixed. A number of other persons were injured.

COLONEL ALLISON FIRM IN DENIAL

He is on His Way to Ottawa to Meet the Charges.

want me. I desire to tell them all I know."

"Why have you not answered the summons sent you from the public accounts committee and the Davidson Commission in the past?"

"The only request for my appearance which I received was from the Davidson Commission, answered by wire saying I would go to Ottawa when I was wanted."

"Are you going on to Ottawa this afternoon?"

"No, I shall remain in Osgoensburg today and until I am wanted in Ottawa."

"Your absence and failure to appear have given rise to a good deal of talk in Canada."

Has Been Very Ill.

"To this Col. Allison made no reply, but rather shrugged his shoulders. There is there no pause, he said: "I could not have come sooner in any event, I have been pretty sick."

"Do you contemplate modifying the statement which you made before Sir Charles Davidson that you would not realize a cent from any business done for Canada?"

"No, I do not intend to modify that statement. I did not make a cent out of what I did for Canada."

"What about profits from business which you placed for the Russian or the French Governments?"

Mr. Henderson intervened with the statement that he had promised Mr. Hellmuth that Col. Allison should not discuss with anyone matters which were to be enquired into by the Merdell-Durk commission, and Col. Allison did not directly answer the question.

"You stated to the Davidson commission that you made nothing from the purchase of pistols or revolvers from the Colt Company for Canada, and afterwards Mr. Stone of the Colt Company stated that you were given a commission or gratuity and that you had taken half of it. It is fair to say that you were given a commission or gratuity for services which you had given the company in England and France, but he did not make it clear that it was not also to compensate you for what you had done in getting Canadian business for the Colt Company," asked the interviewer.

"That was the sum you accepted from the Colts? Mr. Stone did not say."

"I do not remember. I could not state precisely. What I took from the Colt Company was less than half what they tendered me. I did not understand that any part of it was for what I had done in Canada."

"It has been said that you paid the Colts money for pistols and revolvers which they could have been obtained by dealers and by other governments."

"That is not correct. Canada got these arms at a price because I am certain of that."

"How did you come to get into this business?" asked the interviewer.

"I was contacted for Canada in purchasing war supplies from the United States."

"At the opening of the war General Hughes sent for me and asked me to go to the United States and see what could be obtained and especially to see that prices were kept down. I did this work for General Hughes, and I would do anything for him. He thought I could do the work and I tried to do it."

Knew of No Pact.

"In the house of commons a contract was read for a large issue order agreement. It stated that you, Liegnant and Cadwell might be dividing the \$475,000 which was the share of Yorkton."

"No."

"Mr. Henderson interrupted, but Col. Allison said he had never seen the contract or the agreement and that he knew nothing of them."

"There was another memorandum of agreement indicating that you, Liegnant and Cadwell might be dividing the \$475,000 which was the share of Yorkton."

"I never heard of it."

"Have you received any profits out of the issue contracts?"

"No."

"Are you to receive any?"

"I have received a profit realized from the contract. So far I have received nothing. I am going to find out if there is anything coming to me."

All that I was authorized to do was to ascertain where supplies, which were badly needed, could be obtained, and to see that the prices were reasonable. When I would report to General Hughes he would send me to the shell commission and they would accept or reject the offers as they chose. I also undertook at the opening of the war to get supplies from the United States by cable wire. There was fear of an embargo which might prevent this."

"What have you to say of Liegnant, the musician, and your relations with him?"

"I did not know Liegnant as a musician but as a business man. Before the war he had relations with me concerning a fuel saving device, for which he controlled the patent. After the war began I received from him offers to supply steel munitions and war materials of various kinds. I think that I got most of these offers by cable wire. I was in England, and he was in Canada. The authorities submitted them to the authorities for their acceptance or rejection."

"Were any of them accepted? Did any business result from Liegnant's?"

"I do not think so. I never heard



BIG OIL CORPORATION UNDER ORGANIZATION

Capitalization Is Fifty Million Dollars — Not Competitor of Standard Oil.

TULSA, Okla., April 21.—Harry F. Sinclair, multi-millionaire, on his return from New York today, announced that he has practically succeeded in organizing a company capitalized at \$50,000,000 for the producing and refining of crude oil. The new concern will be known as the Sinclair Oil and Refining Co., and headquarters will be established in this city.

Mr. Sinclair denied the report that the new company is being organized to compete with the Standard Oil Co. It will conduct its affairs without bias toward any of the existing oil refining companies, he said. The large refineries to be combined, with a pipe line connection to them all, which will insure ample production.

Mr. Sinclair said that the company had already taken over the Cudahy Refining Co. and a number of other independent companies.

ENGINE BOILER EXPLODED.

STEWARTVILLE, Mo., April 21.—Fireman Frank Cook was killed and Engineer H. W. Anderson was badly injured when they jumped from a Chicago, Burlington and Quincy train, eastbound from St. Joseph to Chicago, after the boiler exploded one mile east of here last night. Anderson remained with the engine long enough to set the brakes, probably saving the lives of many passengers. The cause of the explosion was not known.

STUDENTS ESCAPED FLAMES.

IOWA CITY, Ia., April 21.—Fire which broke out early today in the Iowa Union, a dormitory building for men students of the University of Iowa, destroyed that structure and spread to the business district, causing a total loss of \$250,000. Only a few of the rooms in the union were occupied, as vacation is in progress. Those in the building had barely time to make their way down the fire escapes after they were awakened by the flames.

Weigh into three-ounce pieces, roll round under the hands, then roll them out to about six inches in length like a stick, not with the rolling-pin, but under the hand, hold one end, then twist and form a ring, place on greased tin—see that the ends join firmly—prove for 15 minutes, wet with milk and bake in a hot oven; these can be dredged if desired after baking.

These eggs can be left out and extra milk added to give a soft custard.

This is an old recipe for a real rice cake, and is sure to give satisfaction.

Tokio Rice Cakes.

Twelve ounces of flour, a quarter of a pound of ground rice, a quarter of an ounce of yeast, six ounces of sugar, six ounces of butter, one egg and a half a pint of milk.

Another French Bun.

These are also made from the same dough with a pound of almonds, raisins and four ounces of finely-cut peel added to it.

Fruit Cake. Take one pound of flour, a quarter of a pound of butter, a quarter of a pound of sugar, a quarter of a pound of stoned and chopped raisins, a quarter of a pound of currants, a quarter of a pint of fresh yeast, one small teaspoonful of mixed spice, two eggs and a little warm milk.

When they are done put a knife under them to lift on to plates.

For Tokio coconuts substitute a quarter a pound of coconut for the ground rice, and proceed exactly the same, keeping them close together in the tin and dredging with coconut.

Warm one pint of milk to about 95 degrees, put it into a bowl, dissolve one ounce of yeast and one ounce of sugar in it, then stir half a pound of flour in, cover it up and let it stand for 45 minutes to rise and fall; meanwhile rub 15 ounces of butter into two pounds of flour. Then add the liquor two pounds of sugar, three beaten eggs, a little grated nutmeg and a little drop of rum.

Next to a rough knotty pine floor, requiring vigorous, back-breaking scrubbing, and leaving its mark on a reddened, vein-distended hand, the most objectionable of kitchen floors is an oiled floor. Why? Because the kitchen surfaces—floor, tables, walls—should always be impervious to spots of grease or moisture of any kind.

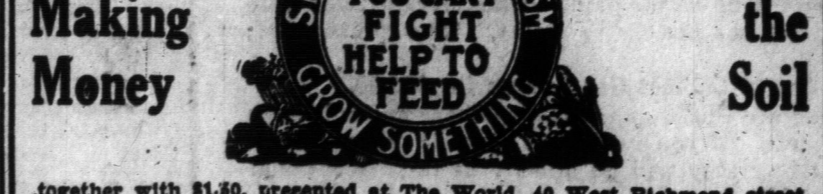

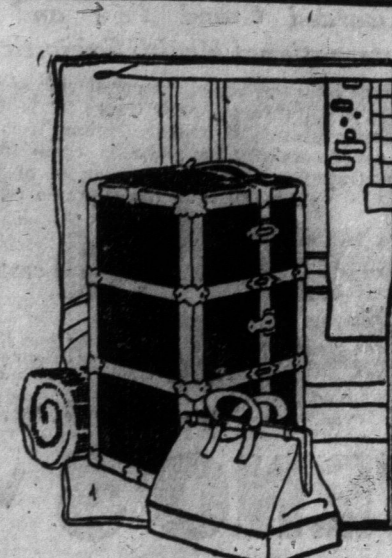
