RESOLUTIONS

PASSED AT THE SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE TORONTO EYE AND
EAR INFIRMARY, HELD AT THE INFIRMARY, ON FRIDAY EVENING,
THE 27TH OF NOVEMBER, 1874.

Mr. A. T. McCord, late City Chamberlain, occupied the Chair.

The report of the Directors was read by Mr. W. T. Mason, and that of
the Surgeons by Dr. Rosebrugh.

Moved by Rev. J. M. Cameron ; seconded by Rev. J. M. Laurent,—

“That the report just read be adopted, and that 2000 copies, with
the Constitution of the Infirmary and a List of the Subscribers, be
printed for circulation ; and that the following Officers and Directors
be appointed for the ensuing year, viz., Messrs. A. T. McCord, Presi-
dent ; A. Dredge, Vice-President ; W. T. Mason, Secretary and Treas-
urer ; and Messrs. William Elliot, Robert Wilkes, M.P., E. J. Palmer,
W. J. Macdonell, J. H. Mason, John McBean, Wm. McCabe, LL.B.,
Samuel Platt, and S. R. Briggs, Directors.”—Carried.

Moved by Samuel Platt ; seconded by Dr. N. Agnew,—

“That the thanks of this meeting are due to the Ontario Legisla-
ture for having passed, last session, a comprehensive general Act for
contributing towards the future maintenance of Hospitals and similar
charitable Institutions ; the scheme being wisely constructed on a basis
that is equitable, and calculated to stimulate private subscriptions and
donations from Municipalities, and at the same time placing the main-
tenance of these Institutions beyond the influence of party politics.”—
Carried.

Moved by Dr. W. C. Corson, Brantford; seconded by John McBean,—

Resolved,—"That whereas this meeting most heartily endorses the principle that public aid to charitable Institutions should be given with a view to stimulate rather than supersede private charity; in the case of a Provincial Institution of the special character of that of the Toronto Eye and Ear Infirmary, it is our opinion that the Ontario Legislature should provide premises necessary for the effective working of the charity."—Carried.

Moved by William Elliot; seconded by A. Dredge,—

"That whereas the amount of public aid towards the maintenance of charitable Institutions will, in future, be modified by the amount of private subscriptions, we commend the claims of the Toronto Eye and Ear Infirmary to the enlarged benevolence of the public."—Carried.

Hearty votes of thanks were then tendered to Mr. A. T. McCord, as President; Mr. W. T. Mason, as Secretary; and to the Surgeons, Drs. Rosebrugh, Coleman, and Agnew, for their valuable services, rendered gratuitously, during the year.

The meeting then adjourned.

At a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors, Messrs. W. T. Mason, A. Dredge, and W. J. Macdonell were re-appointed members of the Executive Committee; Dr. Rosebrugh was re-appointed Surgeon; Dr. Coleman, Assistant Surgeon; Mr. J. F. Hart, Superintendent; and Mrs. Hart, Matron. Dr. C. H. Lavell and Mr. G. S. Ryerson were appointed Clinical Assistants.

DIRECTORS' REPORT.

THE recurrence of another Annual Meeting affords the Directors the accustomed opportunity of furnishing to the subscribers a review of the operations of the Infirmary for the past year. While the Directors have pleasure in congratulating the friends of the Institution on the success which has attended the past year, they feel that the details which they are able to communicate must give a very inadequate idea of the work which has been accomplished.

Those who visit the Infirmary, and have witnessed the varied appearances of those who resort to it for relief, among whom are the young, the old, the infant in arms, men and women, some of them suffering from hereditary disease, others from disease contracted by vice and poverty, and others again resulting from accident, can form a more just appreciation of its value.

Many letters have been received from the friends of patients returned to their homes, testifying to the good resulting from the treatment at the Infirmary; an extract or two from which will be regarded with interest. The following is an extract from a letter dated 24th January, 1874, concerning William Sang, of Southampton:—

“We see a great change for the better in Billy’s eyes, and we again send our grateful thanks for the great kindness you have all shown to my son. May a kind Providence bless your institution, and all connected with it.”

Extract from a letter from St. Joseph’s Convent, Hamilton, dated 25th April, 1874:—

"We are all delighted with the improvement in Mary's sight. This, under God, we attribute to your kind care . . . We shall not soon forget the interest you have taken in our poor orphan child. Please to thank, for us, . . . and say how grateful the sisters are towards them for their kindness to poor Mary, who, but for their skill and attention, might, by this time, be hopelessly blind. As to yourself and Mrs. Hart, we know not how to express our gratitude. The fatherly and motherly interest you have both taken in Mary prove how well fitted you both are for the position which you hold."

In addition to the foregoing, it is gratifying to be able to submit the following official testimony to the value of the charity: it being premised that one of the patients referred to was from the Government Institution for the blind at Brantford.

From HON. A. MCKELLAR, and MR. J. W. LANGMUIR, Inspector of Hospitals.

"The undersigned, accompanied by the Hon. Mr. McKellar, Provincial Secretary, this day visited the Eye and Ear Infirmary, for the purpose of witnessing two most interesting operations performed . . . on two patients, residents in the Institution. The operations were most skilfully executed, and reflect the greatest credit on the skill and efficiency of these gentlemen in the medical specialty committed to their charge in this public Institution.

"They also have pleasure in testifying to the excellent condition in which the Establishment was found, and the great amount of good it is accomplishing.

"In conformity with the requirements of the "Charities Aid Act," of last Session, I this morning made an Inspection of the Toronto Eye and Ear Infirmary. Although the internal arrangement of the House is somewhat defective and limited, and its surroundings very objectionable and confined, it was found throughout in a very commendable state of cleanliness and order. The dormitories were neat and tidy, and free from vitiated air; the beds and bedding, of which fourteen were made up in the Infirmary, were clean and comfortable; and apparently everything was done that can be done to promote the domestic comfort of the inmates. But in view of the defects of location and accommodation, it is to be hoped that the financial prosperity of the Establishment will soon—as it deserves—be such as will warrant the Managers in obtaining more suitable premises for the purpose of the Charity. There were ten inmates in the Infirmary, viz: eight Males and two Females; two of this number were

received from the City of Toronto, seven from various parts of the Province, and one had just been received from England. Nine of these patients paid for their board in the house, and the remaining one was a free patient. From an examination of the Register, it would appear that eight has been the average of patients in residence during the year, and the total admissions from the 1st October last to the present day have been 71, and during that period no less than 398 persons have received medicine and medical treatment as external patients. These figures show very clearly the value of the Institution, and give an idea of the work it is performing.

"Mr. Hart, the Superintendent, reports a very large increase this year in the subscriptions towards the support of the Infirmary, the amount, so far, being treble the amount received in 1872, This improvement, doubtless is attributable in a large degree to the zeal and energy of Mr. Hart.

"Drs. Rosebrugh, Coleman, and Agnew, still give their valuable services to the Infirmary.

While desirous of carefully guarding the non-sectarian character of the Infirmary, the Directors felt they would be wanting in their duty to the patients, deprived as many of them are from attendance on public worship, did they not permit religious instruction to be given them by the different denominations with which they might be connected; and, accordingly, a resolution sanctioning this principle was adopted. The Young Men's Christian Association having applied, permission was granted; and since December, 1873, they have conducted a religious service weekly, with those who wish to attend it,

and it is remarked by the Superintendent, with beneficial result upon their conduct.

A regular system of registration is kept of the work of the Infirmary, from which the following statistics are summarized:—

Of the total number of 535 patients, 420 were Eye, and 115 Ear cases; 81 were In- and 454 Out-patients; 421 were from the City of Toronto, 33 from the County of York, 74 from other Counties in the Province of Ontario, 7 were from other Countries, including Immigrants, Foreigners and Aliens. 343 were Males (180 Bachelors and Boys, 121 Married Men, 42 Widowers), 192 were Females (114 Spinsters and Girls, 45 Married Women, 33 Widows).

The 535 were members or adherents of the following Churches: Church of England, 208; Roman Catholic, 164; Wesleyan Methodist, 78; Presbyterian, 47; Baptist, 21; Congregational, 8; Bible Christian, 2; Primitive Methodist, 2; Episcopal Methodist, 1; Catholic Apostolic, 1; New Jerusalem, 1; German Reformed, 1; Lutheran Church, 1.

They were natives of the following Countries: England, 190; Canada, 176; Ireland, 139; Scotland, 14; United States, 12; Continental Europe, 2; other Countries, 2.

In the first year there were 104 patients; in the second year, 120; in the third year, 187; in the fourth year, 260; in the fifth year, 274;

during the sixth period (comprising from 20th May, 1872, to 30th September, 1873), 514; and in the twelve months just closed, 535.

In accordance with a resolution passed at the last Annual Meeting, the Directors again memorialized the Ontario Government on the pressing need of more suitable buildings and premises; and during an interview with the Hon. the Attorney-General, with which the Board was honoured, it was shown that the Eye and Ear Infirmary was a Provincial, and not a Local Institution, and it would be wise policy for the Government to appropriate a sufficient sum of money for the purchase of premises adequate for the growing wants of the Institution. The Attorney-General expressed himself as being in deep sympathy with the objects and aims of the Institution, and the Directors have reason to believe that the necessary Governmental aid will be granted at as early a date as is consistent with the interests of the public service.

In conclusion, the Directors do not hesitate to commend to their successors in office, to the subscribers and to the general public, an Institution which, during the few years of its existence, has done so much for the alleviation of human suffering.

SURGEONS' REPORT.

The total number of *extern* and *intern* patients admitted as new patients during the year ending 30th September is 505, being nine less than the number admitted during the previous sixteen months, which was the period included in the Directors' Report for 1873. This shows an increase of about 33 per cent. for twelve months. The medical statistics may be epitomised as follows:—

In the Annual Report for 1872, the Surgeons report as follows:—

“The Surgeons of the Toronto Eye and Ear Infirmary, in presenting their Fifth Annual Report, desire specially to call the attention of the Board of Directors to the need of ampler facilities for the effective working of the Institution. The Infirmary is conveniently situated, but the accommodation it affords is quite inadequate to meet the requirements of the Charity, and its position is not at all adapted to promote the efficacy of medical treatment. The Surgeons would therefore strongly recommend the Board to secure a suitable isolated building in a central, healthy locality, with premises large enough to enable patients to take sufficient out-door exercise.”

This was written more than two years ago; since that time the attendance of patients at the Infirmary has increased more than 80 per cent., and at the present time there are 14 *intern* or in-patients, although the Institution can not accommodate more than 12 patients comfortably. One of these patients has been residing in the building for about five months, during which time he has been nearly cured

three times, and has had as many relapses, which we can only attribute to his unhealthy surroundings. There occur, from time to time, also, cases of fever and diarrhœa, which would be less likely to occur if the surroundings of the building were more salubrious. These facts should speak for themselves.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY.

ARTICLE I.

This Institution shall be called "THE TORONTO EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY."

ARTICLE II.

All Annual Subscribers of One Dollar and upwards shall be Members, and entitled to Vote at General Meetings and Elections.

ARTICLE III.

Any person subscribing and paying at one time Fifty Dollars, shall be a Member for life, and entitled to the same privileges as Annual Subscribers.

ARTICLE IV.

The Annual Meeting shall be held in October in each year, or as soon thereafter as practicable, to receive the Report of the Directors for the previous year (ending on the 30th September), and to appoint a President, a Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, and Nine Directors, and to transact any other business which may be necessary.

ARTICLE V.

Regular Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held in January, April, July, and October. Special Meetings of the Directors shall be called at other times by the Secretary, at the request of the President or any three of the Directors. Five Directors shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VI.

An executive Committee of three shall be annually chosen by the Directors from their own number, who shall, in conjunction with the Surgeon, make such arrangements and regulations for the management of the Infirmary as shall by them be deemed best adapted to

.

promote the objects of the charity;—the President to be an *ex-officio* member of this Committee. These arrangements and regulations to be reported to the Board of Directors at their stated meetings, and to be adopted or rejected at their discretion.

ARTICLE VII.

The medical staff shall consist of a Surgeon, an Assistant Surgeon, and one or more Clinical Assistants.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Surgeon of the Infirmary shall be an *ex-officio* Director. He shall have control of the admission and treatment of patients and of the general management of the Institute.

The Assistant Surgeon shall assist the Surgeon in the treatment of patients, and, in his absence, shall act in his place.

The Clinical Assistant or Assistants shall perform such duties as may be directed by the Surgeon or the Assistant Surgeon.

ARTICLE IX.

The Surgeon, Assistant Surgeon, and the Superintendent and Matron shall be appointed annually by the Board of Directors, and the Clinical Assistant or Assistants shall be appointed by the Executive Committee on the nomination of the Surgeon; such appointment to be subject to the approval of the Board.

ARTICLE X.

The Surgeon, or the Assistant Surgeon, shall be present at the Infirmary every day (Sundays excepted), at 9.30 A.M., to examine the patients, to prescribe for them, and to perform such operations as may be considered necessary.

ARTICLE XI.

Students of Medicine attending the Infirmary shall be subject to such regulations as the Surgeons shall from time to time direct and prescribe, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution may be revised or altered at an Annual Meeting, on the recommendation of the Directors.

FORM OF BEQUEST.

I give and bequeath unto the TORONTO EYE AND
EAR INFIRMARY the sum of

out of such part of my personal estate as shall not
consist of money to be obtained from the sale of lands,
or money charged upon land or secured on mortgage of
lands or tenements, or to be laid out in lands or tene-

real.

witnesses, present at the same time, who must subscribe
in the presence of the testator.)
