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SOLDIERS MUST PAY DUTY

Hon. Mr. Fielding Hears That Officers in Halifax Import their Supplies Duty Free and he says That it Must Stop.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 29.—(Special)—The opening session of the tariff commission was held at the board of trade rooms this morning, Hon. W. S. Fielding presiding. The attendance is large, there being quite a number of delegates present from outside the city.

The Farmers' Association asked that the duties on farming implements be reduced and no increase made in the tariff.

Other members of the board of trade rounded the commission with regard to the importance of the shipping industry in this part of Canada. It was extremely important, they said, that something should be done in this connection.

It was essential the government should come to the assistance of this industry. B. F. Pearson thought a bounty of 80 per cent registered ton would probably be an adequate assistance.

The tariff commission resumed at 2 o'clock, when J. A. Mowle, representing the fertilizer trade, presented a petition in opposition to the imposition of any duty on fertilizers.

Mr. Fielding said that the duty on fertilizer be removed, particularly on bone meal. He also requested that the tariff on fertilizer be reduced to the lowest possible rate.

Mr. Wood said that the difference of colored wool was not sufficient to warrant an extra ten per cent duty. The tariff on wool was not sufficient to warrant an extra ten per cent duty.

Mr. Wood objected to the fact that his military goods are imported for himself or wife free of duty. There is no doubt about this, he said.

Mr. Fielding said that if these parties received goods other than for military purposes the matter should certainly be looked into.

T. R. Gue, of the Acadia Powder Company, said that the manufacturers of explosives in Canada are not afforded the same protection as other industries in this Dominion.

An important representation made to the commission was the plea presented on behalf of the iron mining industry. The request was that the bounty should be paid direct to the miner.

The commission will meet again at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, when the whole matter will be discussed in detail.





ALL EUROPE MOURNS DEAD KING

Christian's Death Casts Gloom Over Most of the Royal Houses—Denmark's New King Almost as Popular as His Father.

London, Jan. 29.—The sudden death of King Christian, of Denmark, called (father-in-law of Europe), will place the majority of the royal houses of Europe in mourning. The rulers of Russia, Great Britain, Greece, Sweden and Norway are either personally or through their consorts, his sons and daughters were preparing for their annual trip to Copenhagen for the purpose of celebrating his eighty-eighth birthday.

The new king, who will succeed the throne, is his first year, and bears the weight of his years lightly and is almost as popular with the people of Denmark as his father. His parents he was brought up with great simplicity and his earlier education was obtained at the town of Copenhagen.

They established a demonstration plant in Halifax and operated it for two months, not only giving it careful scrutiny themselves, but calling in leather experts and many prominent business men to follow the various stages of the process and judge of its results.

SAFETY BOARD VOTES MORE POWER TO CIVIC OFFICIALS

Chief Kerr Can Now Appoint, Suspend or Dismiss Firemen --Director to Have Same Power in Other Branches of Safety Board Work--The Globe and Civic Reports.

The safety board yesterday adopted the principle of giving the executive officers of the departments full control over appointments, suspensions or dismissals and will recommend to the council that the chief of the new department and the director be given the authority and that the chairman have power to suspend an executive officer if he should consider it necessary.

The estimates were not taken up in detail and will be considered at an early date. Ald. MacRae occupied the chair and Ald. Lewis, Haman, Isidor, Tuley, MacRae, Spruel, Frink, Holter, Bullock and Vanwert were present with the director, L. H. Kerr and the common clerk.

Ald. Bullock thought they should be first dealt with by a special committee and after some discussion he moved that each member of the board be supplied with a copy of the estimates and that they should be taken up at the first meeting.

Ald. MacRae, referring to the annual deficit on the market, suggested making up the estimates the revenue should be made to equalize the expenditure. If the income from the stalls were not enough, he would raise it.



MAP SHOWING WHERE STEAMER WAS WRECKED.



Washington, Jan. 29.—The secretary of the treasury today received a telegram from Captain Kilgour, the revenue cutter's command, now at Seattle (Wash.), in which he says the cutter has just returned from the scene of the wreck of the steamship Valencia, about 40 miles from the Straits of Fuca, in British Columbia. He brought back with him two survivors of the wreck and three dead bodies. The vessel, he reported, was wholly submerged. Ten dead bodies, he reports, were thrown along the shore, one half to one mile apart. In answer to his request for instructions, the secretary has directed Captain Kilgour to communicate with the Pacific Coast Steamship Company, to whom the vessel belongs, and to recover the bodies provided the steamship company will bear the extra expense. This action is necessary in view of the fact that there is no appropriation available for this purpose. The Canadian authorities will be asked for permission to remove the bodies.

REV. A. D. DEWDNEY GETS PURSE FROM CONGREGATION

Rector of St. James, Who Leaves for the West Tonight, Tendered a Farewell by His Congregation Last Night.

The vestry of St. James' church was crowded last evening by the congregation gathered to bid farewell to their rector, the Rev. A. D. Dewdney, who will leave tonight for the west. Mr. Dewdney was made the recipient of several handsome presents and an address from his congregation. At 9 o'clock C. H. Smith asked S. S. DeForest to take the chair. Mr. DeForest then called upon Mrs. Laird, honorary president of the Dorcas Society, to make a presentation to Mr. Dewdney. Mrs. Laird, on behalf of the society, then presented to the pastor a stole. John Kenney on behalf of the congregation then presented to him a purse of gold and an address, and to Mrs. Dewdney a silk umbrella, and to the rector of the church a pair of gold stick pins. Mr. Kenney said he would like to speak a few words with regard to the departure of their beloved pastor. Twelve years ago he was the first to meet Mr. Dewdney and to shake hands with him and ever since that time the strongest friendship had existed between them, and no one in the church or city would regret Mr. Dewdney's departure more than he. This was an occasion of joy, satisfaction, and regret; joy and satisfaction because of the success Mr. Dewdney has made; regret because he is leaving. Mr. Kenney then paid a glowing tribute to Mr. Dewdney's good work while pastor of St. James' church. He told of the improvements in the building and in the finances of the church, saying that these improvements were largely due to the work of the pastor. He then presented to him the following address:

laughing-stock of Canadian statesmanship. Moreover Mr. Fisher quite wrongly diagnosed the English political situation. Pretty well every authority agrees that the election has not turned on the rejection of a Canadian offer of a referendum. If the one question had been, shall Great Britain and Canada adopt a mutual preference? British and Canadian ministers agree the election would unquestionably have resulted in an overwhelming yes. Many minor factors, of course, work in general election, but the most important factor in creating Liberal labor majorities was the Taff-Vale and other legal decisions which exposed trade union funds to penalties for damages arising out of trade union picketing and boycotting. This split absolute paralyzes of boycotting. Unionists failed to enact remedial legislation. The Liberals now propose it, hence the enormous turnover to the Liberals of the working class vote, usually split between the two parties. The Liberal ministry, which is largely dominated by railway interests, rail manufacturers and other capitalists, have now to prove or disprove to satisfy the labor movement covering as it does many socialistic proposals.

SEVENTY-EIGHT AND CAN SKATE An Almost Octogenarian of the St. John River who Negotiates Fifty Miles in Four Hours. Age—Seventy-eight years. Distance—Fifty miles. Time—About four hours. They were a party of gentlemen up the main river, but Samuel Wilson, who dwells at the Narrows, is among the spryest of the spry. Monday morning he strapped on his skis and took a few preliminary runs. The hour was 10 o'clock. Then he sped away from this city, and by 2 o'clock had arrived and soon was cupping at his nephew's door in Durham street; not too bad, this for a man who will be eighty years of age in 1908. He encountered not a few air holes on the way down, and several times was compelled to slash his way through water. Once he went ashore, removed his boots, and wrung water from his socks. When he breakfasted along toward 9 o'clock, he had the remotest idea of going to town. But when he finally strolled out of doors, breathed the piping air, and looked at the growing river, he thought himself of the sport that he had forgotten for some seasons. The teachers were re-entranced. They had not been shattered, he says, for a generation, but that was a trifling drawback. Once on the ice, he determined to bear away for St. John. A few seasons back he had suffered keenly from rheumatism; unknown dangers lurked ahead, but he had all uncomfortable forebodings begone and laid a straight course for the mouth of the stream. In some places he found the river practically open from shore to shore, and most of the distance he skinned along close to the bank. A few times the route was so rough that it became necessary for him to crawl to a smoother stretch. The members of the congregation then shook hands in good bye with their beloved pastor and many expressions of regret as his departure were heard. Mr. Dewdney will leave this evening by the Montreal train for Prince Albert (Sask.). His family will follow later.

WHAT DOES ELECTRICITY DO TO THE SKIN?

It is a well-known fact that the hair has been placed upon the skin of the animal for the purpose of protecting it against the elements—wind, rain and snow.
