

cighteen in the private ward. No place one looking at statistics for the Burnside Hospital, Toronto, would be amazed to learn that no less than twenty-one hundred infants have been born there since its opening.

This hospital celebrated its third and the state of birth and sex, these babies receive the greatest care and attention. The weight

which shows the progress they are mak ing. The average increase in weight does not usually exceed one ounce per day, but one recently born infant ha

gained as much as four ounces.

These babies are all brought up on a scientific method. Great thought is given to feeding, regular hours, and fresh air, each child ring put out for so many hours a day if the weather is not too cold. This generally occurs after a period of four days has expired.

Long carriages which hold as many as eighteen babies are used for conveying them to and fro, so that the proud mothers may have a glimpse of their young offspring. Here, too, great care is taken to avoid any mistake being made. Bach child has a tiny tag attached to his or her wrist with name and date inlach child has a tiny tag attached to his or her wrist with name and date inscribed. This saves time and anxiety on the part of the parent, which was caused in another hospital at a very recent date. Here a tired nurse, worn with the care of such a large family, lined up her little ones to distribute them to their various mothers. As soon as they were quickly despatched she retired to her own quarters with a sigh of content as she thought of the few moments peace that were to be hers. An impatient ring broke the stillness, however, and as she responded to the call a real colored lady exclaimed indignantly: "I say, Miss, don' you know ma own haby?" "Oh!" said the nurse, "you're a queer mother; that's your baby all right." Whereas the exasperated mother

## AMERICA WOULD HELP TO FINISH EUROPE'S MAD DOG

T. P. O'Connor, in a Parable, Describes the Ultimate Effect of Washington's Action—"Settle Ireland" His Advice

London, Feb. 5—T. P. O'Connor, writing in The Chronicle today on the present war situation, says:

Meanwhile she prepared herself for the devil's work by poisoning her mind and the mind of all her peoples with the devil's gospel that might alone constituted right; that war was not marchine guns, and when the appropriate time was supposed to have come shourst on sleeping and unarmed Europe, foaming at the mouth with the fury of madness.

"At first the mad dog was able to bite and to infect everybody and everywhere until at last the whole world, or almost the whole world, is in full pursuit of the noxious beast and its end is near at hand.

America on other countries I look with confidence to its effect on the German people themselves. Be it remembered that there is not even a small village in Germany which is without relatives and correspondents in some part of the United States. Association between Germany and America is accordingly intimate and continuous, practically daily, through letter and newspaper and relatives. After all, with all their insane self-conceit, Germans are intelligent and educated people, and assuredly it must have some effect on their belief in either the justice of their cause or the chances of their armies to find that the greatest neutral countries, in spite of the millions of their blood among the citizens, has come out decisively against them.




