



There was but one way of dealing with Senator Watson's charge of indiscriminate hangings of presumably innocent men practiced by officers of the A. E. F. in France during the war, and that was to give Watson the investigating committee he demanded. Not that we believe the Senator from Georgia has any basis for his accusations other than that vivid imagination which he has so notably displayed in his past career. But the poisonous story is one that must be speedily and completely destroyed before it makes its way into the cycle of legend about the war, to be brought up every little while in public debate or to be whispered about behind the scenes by professional politicians or private malice and ignorance.

Against the official records, which show that less than one-half as many men were executed in France during the entire war period as Senator Watson has seen hanged upon a single gallows; against the sharp repudiation of the charge by well known commanding officers printed today in the press; against the fact that so stout an enemy of militarism as Senator Borah looked into the matter and decided that there was no basis for an investigation, we have the assertion of a politican notorious in the past for his violent hates and his violent words. Senator Watson is the man who only a few days ago made a public demonstration of his faith in the tenets and tactics of the Ku Klux Klan. And if it is a question of illegal hangings, memory will go back to the role played by Watson in helping to create that state of public feeling in Georgia some years ago which expressed itself in the lynching of Leo Frank.
