



The order issued at Ottober 1918, no person in Canada shall without special permit manufacture for sale any icing sugar, icing powder or any preparation of sugar which is used largely for icing cakes or biscuits, the use of which is prohibited." This order has not been revoked.





### FOUNDRY WORK OF WOMEN IS PRAISED

Employers of Oregon Pleased With Results While Women Like New

(Christian Science Monitor.)
Whether or not shop work in box factories, foundries and other related industries is proper employment for women to engage in permanently is a question which the Oregon industrial welfare commission has set out to investigate and decide. A series of hearings on the subject has been inaugurated. At the initial hearing held here, employers who testified credited their women employes in box factories and foundries with doing better work and giving their employers. in box factories and foundries with doing better work and giving their employment closer attention than had the men and boys the women replaced as a war-time necessity. And women employes who testified all said that they liked their work and that they found their present duties less trying and the pay better than in other lines of employment that they had previously followed.

William F. Prier of the Oregon Brass Foundry told the commission that in a shop which he established last June all employes are women except three men shop which he established last June all employes are women except three men who attend the furnace and do the pouring. The foundry, he said, was established with the idea of opening the trade to women permanently. Women employes earn from \$2 to \$4 a day, and it is his expectation that they will complete in a year and a half the apprenticeship term which with an all-masculine force was four years. His criticism against the Poor Prisoners' Defense Act was that the Director of Public Prosecutions had the opportunity and means of getting information that were entirely denied to laymen, even lawyers, and, instead of the accused person being placed at an advantage at his trial the system had the effect of placing him at a disadvantage. If they could establish the office of public defender he considered a great step would be taken toward the perfection of justice in Great Britain.
