POTATO INQUIRY OPENED TODAY

Rev. J. B. Daggett First Witness-Commissioner McQueen Decides Against Postponement Asked For

After a lapse of almost four years an inquiry which opened this morning in the council chamber in the court house is expected to bring before the public the full story of the famous patriotic potato transactions of the old government. The inquiry was opened at 11 o'clock by James McQueen, K. C., of Shediac, with P. J. Hughes of Fredericton appearing for the government and F. R. Taylor, K. C., for Hon. J. A. Murray, former minister of agriculture.

In an effort to secure further delay in the proceedings, Mr. Taylor asked that the inquiry should be postponed until after the Victory Loan campaign completed, some time in November, giving as his grounds for the request the fact that Hon. Mr. Murray was acting as chairman of the loan organization in Kings county and would not have time to attend the sessions.
