





Of course when Gen. Bingham told this story of \$100,000,000 in graft in a September magazine of 1998 the town and country promptly pricked up ears and got ready to listen to more. Bingham after losing out up at headquarters got very busy with his pen and had a great deal to say of his experience with men who were willing to pay big money for protection.


