TRACKING THE MEN HIGHER UP Private Detectives Employed by Whitman—Have Found Them ONLY A TRIO

Lawyer, Hotelman and Police Official—Had Business on Systematic Basis—Another Important Witness

(Canadian Press) New York, Aug. 12.—Blackmail extorted from gambling and disorderly houses in New York city, is said to find its way into the pockets of three men higher up, who are the real heads of the graft syndicate that provides police protection for a price, to the underworld.

Information has been placed in the hands of District Attorney Whitman by private detectives working with him on the Rosenthal case that three men higher up are a lawyer, a hotel proprietor who claims strong political affiliations, and a police official.

Two police inspectors are also said to be profiting richly from graft. District Attorney Whitman is now convinced that "Bald Jack" Rose told the truth when he said that at least \$2,400,000 was collected from gambling houses in one section of New York city alone. The states attorney is not willing to haphazard a guess on the total amount of blackmail extorted, but is convinced that it runs into millions.

The private investigation is still being continued into the police blackmailing system of which Mr. Whitman is learning more each day. It appears that for over a year a perfected system had been in operation which has been put under the microscope.

The investigation has already shown that there has always been police blackmail through intimidation which police officials fattened their bank accounts, but when it was recently organized better results were shown. District Attorney Whitman reported to the states attorney that under the present system of doing things the gamblers were punished for the complaints of the victims it being one of the boasts that one of the men higher up was influential enough to prevent trouble.

Whether or not such influence could be delivered is being investigated. District Attorney Whitman has a list of names of prominent persons who played in various gambling houses. It is said these persons may be subpoenaed to give information.

An important witness in the Rosenthal case has been found by District Attorney Whitman, and he will not be called upon to appear before him until the case is ready to go to trial. This man is said to be an eye witness of the killing.

"Bald Jack" Rose, Bridget Weeber and Harry Valton, are to be taken before the grand jury today and if the work of that body can be completed a blanket indictment charging seven men with the murder of Herman Rosenthal will be found.

DETROIT ALDERMEN ARRAIGNED TODAY ON BRIBERY CHARGE Alleged That Dine Actually Received Bribes and Equal Number Expressed Willingness to be Corrupted

(Canadian Press) Detroit, Mich., Aug. 13.—The arraignment in police court today of the eighteen members of the Detroit common council, charged with having accepted bribes or with "promises to accept bribes" was expected to forecast to some extent the further plans of prosecuting Attorney Hugh Shepley in his announced fight to break up an alleged council "graft ring."

All of the aldermen are charged with having been implicated in a plot to force the Wabash railroad to pay them various sums for their influence in putting through the council a resolution closing a city street for the benefit of the railroad company.

It is alleged that nine of the aldermen actually received bribes, not however, from a railroad official, but from a detective who had been bribed by the railroad company. The states attorney was charged, agreed to accept certain sums as failed to collect at an appointed time.

(Canadian Press) Mexico City, Aug. 13.—Two hundred dead were lying in the streets of Xicla, last night, after General De Laos band of Zapatistas halted on its march to Toluca, the capital of the state of Mexico, only 15 miles north. The town was garrisoned by about 100 rurales. Fighting occurred around Tenancingo earlier in the day and the six hundred rurales quartered there defeated the rebels. Daily Hints For the Cook

CURRIED EGGS. Melt one tablespoon of butter, blend in one tablespoon of flour mixed with one teaspoon of curry powder, add slowly one cup of white stock, season with half a teaspoon of onion juice and one-third of a teaspoon of salt, and stir until smooth and thick.

VEGETABLE SOUP. Get a piece of beef or a soup bone and start it in cold water. When the meat is done, take it out; then take two onions, two carrots, two parsnips, half a turnip, and three or four potatoes, peel and scrape them. Put them all through the coarse meat grinder. Put it all into the water the meat was boiled in, which should be strained. Some of the meat finely chopped may be added; also rice or barley. Season with salt and pepper.

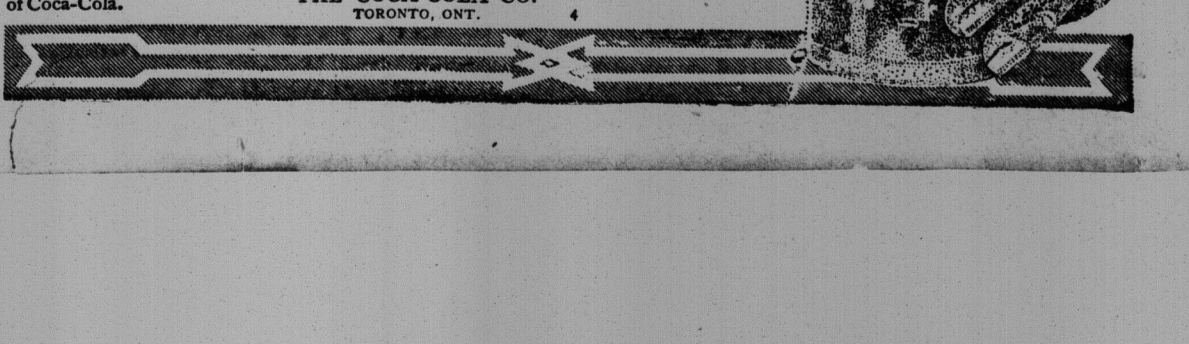

\$100,000,000 POLICE GRAFT PER ANNUM

Estimate of General Bingham, Former Commissioner of N. Y.

\$1,000,000 FOR HIM

Grafting and Blackmailing a Systematic Business Defying Detection—Some of the Officers He Refused

New York, Aug. 13—Jack Rose's story of \$2,400,000 in annual graft paid to four men identified with the police department for protection of gambling houses and other illegal resorts looks big in some quarters, but the accusing and informing gambler is modest with his figures as compared with others given some time ago.

A former New York police commissioner who was forced out of office by Mayor McClellan had already gone on record with his story of \$100,000,000 paid yearly in graft and blackmail, and his own admission that in the first year as head of police it would have been easy for him to have made \$500,000 a year in bribe money and that \$1,000,000 a year would not have been an excessive figure.

Of course when Gen. Bingham told this story of \$100,000,000 in graft in a September magazine of 1909 the country promptly picked up its ears and got ready to listen to more. Bingham after losing out up at headquarters got very busy with his pen and had a great deal to say of his experience with men who were willing to pay big money for protection.

Graft and Blackmail

The general attracted the attention of Jerome who was then district attorney, and the former commissioner was taken down to the criminal courts building to testify before the grand jury. Bingham went before the grand jury all right, and had something to say about big graft and blackmail, according to rumors at the time, but nothing tangible ever came of his alleged disclosures. It looked as if he would get the credit for his startling charges, or at least did not have enough knowledge of the "system," to make an investigation at that time expedient or even necessary.

But the story of millions in graft received by the police department, and there appeared to be no doubt that Bingham was in the main right and conservative when he charged that he could have \$500,000 at least a year for a benign countenance on the ancient and underworked system of collection.

Three years after Bingham had gone on record in a magazine—and he had to stand practically alone in his statements at that time—a gambler was shot and killed in front of the Metropole because he was on the eve of going before a grand jury with the inside story of grafted millions and had plenty of alleged corroborative facts and figures to prove his charges, such as the former police commissioner had spoken of.

Then a hurried and thorough inquiry by the district attorney and another gambler not only confirmed what Bingham said, but implicated men in the department and charges four men identified with the police got \$200,000 a year—figures mentioned by Bingham three years ago.

"I am asked to estimate the money value of graft and blackmail in New York each year," declared Gen. Bingham in his magazine article. "Of course, no one could make such an estimate with anything like complete accuracy, but my belief is that the total is not less than \$100,000,000 a year. In fact, this figure, astounding in itself, is an under rather than an over estimate of what is annually paid by criminals and crooked politicians for protection, votes and immunity in New York. In relation to this colossal brokerage in crime, the profits are proportionately large."

Gen. Bingham then put this question and followed it up with an answer that may not hold good after the present grand jury has made its report:

"Systematic Business"

"Why not stop the evil?"

"Because grafting and blackmailing has become a systematic, scientific business absolutely defying detection and conviction save in the rarest instances."

"During my first year at the head of the police department it would have been an easy matter for me to have made \$500,000 in bribe money and \$1,000,000 would have been an excessive figure at all."

Right here Jack Rose corroborates the former police commissioner's statement of easy money.

The general illustrated how "the boys" try to get acquainted with men high in power as follows:

"A well known politician calls on the commissioner, ostensibly to pay his respects. Casually he mentions and guardedly condemns the activity of the police in raiding certain dives and east side dance halls. So and so, he ventures, is a good fellow, takes care of his constituents, is active and prominent in benevolence and never forgets a favor or a friend. What can the police commissioner do for him?"

The former police commissioner gave what purported to be a personal experience with such a line of callers. He wrote:

\$10,000 a Month

One day shortly after my arrival at police headquarters an acquaintance slipped into my office. "Commissioner," he said, "there's a house at West 32d street run very quietly. It will be worth \$10,000 a month to you—but the sentence was never finished to my knowledge."

"As a matter of fact the place had never been opened and the man had been used as an agent to feel out the department."

"A few months later I was offered \$5,000 in cash and \$500 a month merely to be seen shaking hands with the proprietor of an upper Broadway cafe."

"As an instance of one of these offenders running around wild in search of some one in power who would take his quarterly assessment for protection from the police the general told of an East side dance hall proprietor, who had been turned down by the patrolman, the captain and the inspector."

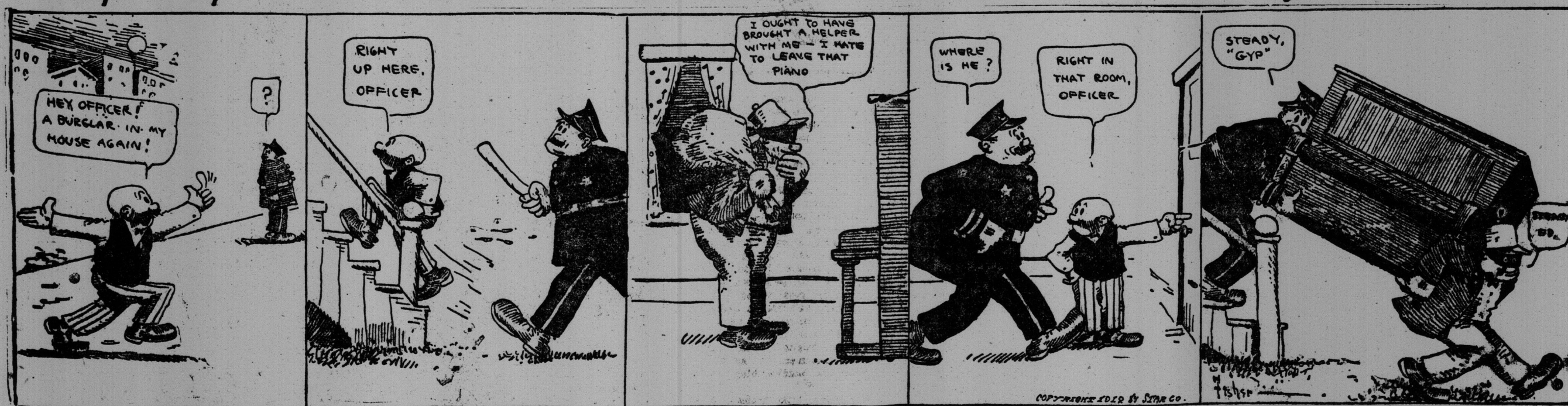

SOME OF JACK JOHNSON'S CHERISHED AMBITIONS

Wants to Retire as Only Undeclared Champion—Anxious to do Something For His Own Race

One day at Las Vegas I asked Jack Johnson if he was responsible for the published statement that he would quit the ring on Labor Day. "No," said the champion, "not exactly. I'm going to quit very soon. I'm willing to take on any match ready for me, provided I can make them pay; but I'm not going to fight for the purpose of giving somebody else a reputation or merely to keep my own."

Johnson has proved himself a good business man, and those who know him best say he is too shrewd to overlook the opportunity of retiring when he can do so with credit to himself and the possibility of engaging in a profitable business, such as his safe just opened in Chicago, and which will be a popular resort only so long as he remains a champion or retires under a liberal guarantee, "win, lose or draw."

Johnson's expressed determination to quit the ring in the near future and retire the only undefeated world's champion heavyweight pugilist, has not been taken seriously by many who believe the negro's love of notoriety will continue to lure him to the limelight of the prize ring until he meets defeat and is forced into retirement.

Personally, I do not share in this belief, but think it probable the champion will make good his declaration. Johnson is 34 years of age, and training has become for

Johnson is not as good now as he was two years ago, when he defeated Jim Jeffries at Reno, but at 34 years of age he is still a wonderful athlete, possessed of great strength and endurance and a marvellous boxing skill that has never been surpassed, perhaps equalled, by any heavyweight in the history of the ring. He has stood the wear and tear of training and fighting for a dozen years, and today his features are as unmarked as the day he

first entered the ring, no cauliflowered ears, hanging lips or eyelids, nor scars to show where gloves have ripped and torn. He has been hit hard and hurt, but twice in his career, once by Joe Choynick, and once by the late Stanley Ketchel, and recalls as his hardest fights those with Hank Griffin, that wonderful boxer and blocker of a decade ago, whom he twice boxed to a draw and then lost a decision in 20 rounds. Johnson's hands are as sound today as when he first began to box.

It is a natural conclusion that Johnson is not as good today as he was even two years ago, but in just what particular he has slipped back it is hard to say. He retains his cleverness and speed, his strength and confidence, and yet there is an indefinable something about him that makes one feel he is not taking the interest in his work he did before, a lack of spirit and vigor that has taken off the keen edge. Still, he remains better than anyone in his class, and if he adheres to his resolution to retire within another year, probably will do so an undefeated champion.

USED SIXTY MILLIONS OF LUMBER IN 1911. The value of the material used in the slack coopeage industry in Canada in 1911, according to figures prepared by the Forestry Branch, Department of the Interior, was \$1,465,702, or about \$100,000 less than the value in 1910. The amount of material consumed, outside of a large quantity of waste which cannot be accurately determined, is estimated at 62,880,100 feet.

Ontario leads in this industry, with the production of 64 per cent. of the total number of staves, 70 per cent. of the head-logs, and 76 per cent. of the hoops. Nova Scotia, with a large proportion of saw-logs, was next with 29 per cent., 24 per cent. and 20 per cent., respectively, of the total number of staves, headlogs and hoops. The other provinces produce very limited quantities.

Imports exceeded exports of \$125,463 by \$124,220. White oak staves form an important part of the imports, numbering, in all, 7,250,000, whereas only 2,768,000 were cut in Canada. The Canadian supply of oak, which also is suitable for the manufacture of containers for alcoholic beverages, is so nearly exhausted that this branch of the tight coopeage industry will practically cease in a few years.

The cost of materials for slack coopeage averaged as follows per thousand pieces: \$8.91; heading (sets) \$54.77; hoops \$7.62. Figures on the cost of tight coopeage materials were not available.

As a matter of fact, it is improbable that much interest will centre in the heavyweight match until after Johnson's voluntary retirement or his defeat by a white man, and at present none hangs up on the horizon able to take his law. A defeat by Sam Langford, Sam McVey or Joe Jeannette or any other member of his own race won't help matters, and it is even very doubtful if any one of this great trio could wrest the title from Johnson while he is in his present form.

Falzer, Stewart, Kennedy, Kaufman, Morris and McCarry, all "white hopes," are unequal to the job and they are the best we have, exclusive of Jim Flynn, whose championship aspirations withered at Las Vegas.

WHITE CASE AGAIN BEFORE MAGISTRATE

Further Evidence of Arrest And Cubbing

THOSE RULES

Prisoner Takes the Stand and Pleads Innocent of all Charges Except Drunkenness.

Hearing in the William White case was continued in the police court this morning, and the court room was again packed to the doors with interested spectators. Commissioner McLellan was in court and called several of the policemen to the stand to ascertain if they had ever seen or read a copy of the regulations of the police department. All of them said that they had heard there were rules and regulations, but they had never seen them. The case was practically closed this morning, but at noon it was decided to adjourn until tomorrow morning when argument will be heard.

The first witness called this morning was Policeman S. D. Hamm, who assisted Policeman Linton and the other officers in arresting White. His evidence was as follows: "I was in Main street on the night in question and was informed that there was some trouble up in Rockland road. I went up and found Linton arresting White. The latter was resisting. I helped to make the arrest. White resisted all the way to the North End lock-up. It took four of us to carry him to the station." To Commissioner McLellan, witness said: "I have been on the force twenty-one years. I received instructions from the Chief to always see that the rules and regulations were read to every one who was arrested. Commissioner McLellan asked permission to recall Policeman Linton. When the witness was taking the stand the commissioner remarked: "Of course we all know that you carry a baton." In answer to a question witness replied: "I received instructions from Chief Clark to handle the baton discreetly; I never saw or read any rules or regulations." In reply to Mr. Alward witness said: "White kicked me before and after I struck him on the head with my baton. I did not know if there was anyone around when I struck him."

Lillian Crawford, the next witness, did not throw much light on the matter. She admitted having seen White and Linton wrestling about in the street. She went to the North End Police Station to telephone for the patrol wagon. The witness was asked by the counsel for the defense if she knew anyone who was around when the trouble first started. Witness said that she had heard people talking about it but refused to give their names to the court. She told the court that nobody had asked her not to tell the names.

Sarah Windle, her evidence stated that she was in White's apartment but did not see him struck. She saw blood on the prisoner's face at the time. Margaret White gave evidence along the same lines. She heard White calling out: "You did hit me on the head and drew the blood."

James McAnnally, the next witness, stated that he was on his way home on Wednesday night last when he saw White being arrested. "There were over two hundred people around when the tussle was going on. White was being held down by Linton who was kneeling on top of him. The prisoner's face was badly cut and covered with blood. I did not see Linton strike White, but saw him with his baton in the air. I did not hear Linton calling on me to assist him. I told White to go along with the policeman."

Prisoner Sworn

William White, the defendant, was next sworn. He said "I was drinking quite heavily on the day I was arrested. I do not remember Linton telling me to go home while I was in Main street, neither do I remember being with any other men that night. Shortly after 10 o'clock I started up Morgan's alley on my way home to Rockland Road. On reaching Moore street I turned around and saw Linton following me. I had not gone far until he caught hold of me. I told him that I was all right and to let me go. The first thing I knew I was struck on the head with the baton. Linton put one handcuff on me but could not get the other one on. As soon as he got me out to Rockland Road I was struck on the head again. The second crack I got stunned me considerably. I did not kick or bite Linton, in fact I did not do anything to him that I know of. After I was struck I remember saying 'Harry you are pretty dirty.' I did not see anyone around when he struck me."

In answer to Mr. Alward witness said "I was pretty drunk at the time as I had been drinking quite heavily all day. I might have had about thirty drinks all day. I am not generally nervous, although I am pretty nervous now since I got such a beating. I was not shooting or holiering in Moore street when I was arrested." To the court the witness said that he received all his cuts when he was being arrested.

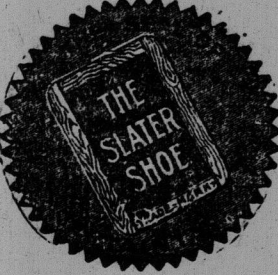
