MINUTES

OF THE

BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH.

HELD IN THE TOWN OF LINDSAY, FROM JUNE 7TH TO JUNE 12TH, 1888.

THE FIFTH SESSION of the BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE was opened in the Cambridge Street Methodist Church, in the town of Lindsay, on Thursday, June 7th, 1888, at 9 a.m.

Rev. JOHN LEAROLD, President of the Conference, presided, and conducted the devotional exercises, which continued for one hour.

Rev. JOHN A. WILLIAMS, D.D., General Superintendent, then took the chair, and proceeded to organize the Conference.

The Secretary, Rev. WILLIAM BURNS, read the 35th chapter of Isaiah and the 1st chapter of Colossians. The 753rd hymn was sung; and Revs. Dr. WM. WILLIAMS and WM. BRIDEN led in prayer.

General Superintendent Rev. Dr. WILLIAMS delivered a brief, but most appropriate and timely address; after which

The roll was called by the Secretary, and 123 ministers and 61 laymen responded to their names.

The ballot for President resulted in the election of the Rev. MARMA DUKE L. PEARSON, who briefly addressed the Conference in acknowledgment of the honor conferred upon him.

The Rev. JAMES J. RICE was elected Secretary.

On nomination of the Secretary, Rev. WILLIAM J. YOUNG and Rev. WILLIAM JOHNSTON were appointed Assistant Secretaries; and Rev. C. W. WATCH, Journal Secretary.

On motion of Rev. J. CURRS, seconded by JAS. AYLWORTH, Esq., it was Resolved,—That we reaffirm the resolution of last year as to the appointment of a Nominating Committee, viz: "That one minister and one layman be appointed from each District, the said Committee to nominate all Committees not provided for in the Constitution."

The hours of Session were fixed as follows: Morning Session, 9 a.m. to 12 noon; afternoon, 2 to 5.30 p.m.

QUESTION.—What Ministers have died during the year?**SAMUEL SOBIESKI NELLES, D.D., LL.D.**

This name comes from our lips with feelings of unusual sorrow. A great man and a prince in Israel has fallen. The entire Church mourns the loss of so faithful a servant, so gifted a preacher, and so eminent a teacher.

Dr. Nelles was the son of the late Wm. Nelles and his wife Mary Hardy; and was born at Mount Pleasant, County Brant, Ontario, on the 17th of October, 1823, and on his natal day, sixty-four years afterwards, he passed away to the eternal reward of the righteous.

The early years of his life were spent in that cradle of sweetness and strength—a Christian country home. At the age of sixteen he attended the Lewiston Academy in the State of New York. The following year he went to the academy at Frederica, and in 1841 the Genessee Wesleyan Seminary at Lima received him as a student. The hallowed associations of the seminary helped to make this the memorable year of his young life. It was the turning point in his history. Two ways met. Conflicting sentiments and ambitions were claiming the ascendancy. But wise counsel prevailed, and he received the Lord Jesus by a penitent trust as his Saviour, and henceforth walked in the light and liberty of a son of God. Lasting and most important issues were produced by the new birth unto righteousness.

He returned to Canada in 1842, and soon after entered Victoria College, being one of the first two undergraduate students. After two years at Cobourg, and a year in study at home, he took his status in the Wesleyan University at Middleton, where, in 1846, the degree of Bachelor of Arts was obtained with honors. The year after his graduation he was master of the academy at Newburgh, Ontario, for a session, and entered the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in the summer of 1847. Three years were then spent in the pastoral work—one at Port Hope, and two in Toronto. In 1850 he was appointed to the Presidency of Victoria College.

This most important and honorable position our departed brother held, with great fidelity and marked success, for the long period of thirty-seven years. The year following his appointment to the College, he married Miss Mary B. Wood, daughter of the late Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D., who, with five children, mourn their irreparable loss.

The Church honored him as fraternal delegate to the Methodist Episcopal General Conference of the United States in 1864, to the New Brunswick Conference of 1866, and to the English Wesleyan Conference in 1873. The degree of D.D. was conferred upon him by the University of Queen's College in 1860, and that of LL.D. was received from Victoria in 1873.

When Dr. Nelles assumed the Presidency of Victoria College, there was not much to preside over. Practically there was neither faculty nor students—only some buildings fast going to ruin. But as he had been called to this position, he set before himself the great life work of the safety and prosperity of the University. To this arduous undertaking he kept, with unchanging purpose. Trying emergencies, which threatened the destruction of everything, were more than once encountered and successfully overcome. While personal influence did much to make his administration successful, honor was always accorded by himself to his associates in academic labors.

The late Chancellor was not only the wise President, but the able Professor of Mental Philosophy and Logic; and at the time of his death he held the chair of Moral Philosophy and the Evidences of Religion. In both of these departments his lectures were marked by accuracy and breadth of learning, and he was always the inspiring and beloved teacher. His influence was chiefly felt in the stimulation of the powers of perception, the regulation of the judgment, and

the inspiration of an honest love of the truth. In his relation to the students, as the chief executive officer of the University, he was fatherly in his treatment. Sympathy and tenderness were beautifully blended with Christian firmness. He was also the powerful and ever ready advocate of the rights of the University to a more liberal endowment; for during his entire official life, he labored under the oppressive consciousness of having inadequate means to successfully accomplish his design for the full equipment of the University.

Moreover, the growth of the educational resources of the University under his care appears in the following manner: In 1854 a Faculty of Medicine was established for the first time. In 1862 was established a Faculty of Law, in 1872 a Faculty of Theology, in 1878 a Faculty of Science, and in the same year the new building, Faraday Hall, was erected for the department of Physical Science. At the close of the session of 1887-8 there was the largest graduating class that ever left the halls of Victoria, and at the opening of the last session the largest matriculation class has been enrolled. In all departments of the University there are over 600 students, and more than 2,000 alumni. The last financial statement was the most satisfactory that has ever been made, showing assets about \$250,000; and the University stands higher than ever in the confidence and affection of students, alumni and patrons of the Church and country, while her sons are to be found in usefulness and honor throughout the Dominion, and foremost in the foreign missionary work of our Church.

There was always before President Nelles two ideals, either of which would have been welcome to him in realization. "The one was, that of his own beloved University developed in wealth and strength and beauty, till, free from all ordinary vicissitudes of fortune, she could extend to the youth of our country advantages unexcelled and unequalled for the pursuit of all liberal and scientific culture—a great and free, but distinctly Christian University. The other was that of a group of co-ordinate University Colleges, in which all the Universities of the Province would be confederated under one great Provincial University on absolutely equal terms, each one maintaining its individuality, its traditions and methods, and entitled to gain and hold no advantage save by its own worth and works. This second ideal he at one time hoped to see realized in the recent scheme of University Federation. It was his destiny, however, to see that scheme take such a shape in its final form, that our sister Universities would not accept it, and so the bright vision was clouded over, and he passed away suddenly before the realization of his hope or of his fear."

The convocation addresses of Chancellor Nelles were distinguished for rare brilliance, ripe scholarship and profound wisdom. These eloquent and masterly appeals were adapted to awaken a greater interest in the work of higher education; and they have produced abundant fruit in the pulpits of our Church, as well as in other walks of professional life.

Besides his peculiar interest in educational matters, Dr. Nelles was actively engaged in all the great movements of the Church, such as the work of missions, and in that of the union of the various branches of Methodism. At the same time a high value must be placed upon the service he rendered throughout his life, on such important occasions as church openings and anniversaries.

Public testimony concedes to him a foremost place among the preachers of the times. While he adorned the pulpits of the Methodist Church throughout the Dominion, his sermons had a special charm for the more thoughtful and cultured of his hearers. As his life was mainly spent in the realm of the intellectual, his ministry was essentially analytic, marked by the discussion of philosophic principles, full of scientific allusions, and adorned by great beauty of illustration.

"Had he possessed in a greater measure the elocutionary graces of voice and gesture, he would have been numbered with the finest masters of oratory on his continent. As it was, there were times, when in compass of thought, in felicity of diction, in aptness of quotation, in universality of sympathy, and in a

certain giant majesty of movement, he reached an altitude and amplitude of power that placed him side by side with the noblest of his time."

In the character of the one whose loss we mourn there was a rare combination of qualities. His broad and generous sympathies gave him a loving nearness to everybody. He saw good in everything. Inspiration flowed with his kindness, which lifted the troubled into peace. The experiences of life seldom give a friend more noble and generous, more confiding and enduring. His acquisitions were most extensive in several departments; his general reading remarkable. "Often, too, he loved to roam those fields of literature and philosophy thought, whose broad tracts have been marred by no sectarian fences." Ruskin compares mind to a river which has a shallow side on which to shingle and sun itself, and a deep side through which the weight of waters flow with ever increasing power. Our departed brother enjoyed the double blessing of the sunny side for play, and the profound side for labor and achievement. There was a sparkling of humor which flashed on the surface, and obscured for the moment the depths of thought that lay beneath. His fancy made him a man of wit; his force of character a man of weight, and worth, and work. "Many could see the readiness with which he passed from grave to gay, but not so many seemed to know that he passed with even greater readiness from gay to grave, and that the fountain of his laughter was hard by the source of tears." Indeed, the keen insight which he had of truth, and that hush of spirit, as if the unseen was upon him, is the best evidence that his mind was habitually fixed upon high and sacred things.

The principles which enabled him to build up such a life stand out in clearer light than ever in his last short illness and death. How buoyant, how trustful, how loving. On his deathbed he said to his wife, "I have studied much and read many books, but there is no book like *The Book*, and there is no name like Jesus." When far down the valley his spirit was kindled for a little, and he sent a message to the students of his love, who were about to assemble for college prayers—"Give the boys my love, and thank them for having been so thoughtful and kind." He also asked them to sing Cowper's familiar hymn, "There is a fountain filled with blood." We may now remember this beautiful hymn as the dying *credo* of Chancellor Nelles.

"Amongst the requests he made in view of his departure was this one, that on his tomb should be inscribed nothing but these words, 'Now we see through a glass, darkly.' To us there is here no treason against Christian theology. Others may think they have in their divinity a clearer spirit of divination. Saint Paul had not. Our sainted friend and brother and father was of the school of Paul, and he is not ashamed to have it so marked where his body is to be laid to rest. But, be it noted well, he was not in the dark. He saw through the glass darkly, it is true, but he saw."

May we all look away from him to see what he saw through the glass darkly, and to have and hold his faith, his hope, his love!

His mortal remains rest in the Cobourg cemetery, awaiting the resurrection.

"Servant of God, well done;
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following :—

We are gratified to find an increase of members reported in each District, except one, in the entire Conference—the total increase being 1,584.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee feel that there is no ground for special alarm in recent defeats of the Scott Act in several counties, as we believe that the great heart of Methodism, and of Christians generally, throughout the country, remains true to its convictions on the great question of Prohibition.

As your Committee think there is little hope that either political party will give us Prohibition in the near future, therefore we would recommend that our people be advised to make Prohibition a prominent plank in their politico-religious platform, and strive by every legitimate means to bring about this most desirable end.

We also feel that the youth of our country is the great hope of the future, in regard to this important measure; and we would recommend that, as far as practicable, Bands of Hope be formed in all our Sabbath-schools, and that special prominence be given to the temperance lesson in the International Series.

We would also recommend a still wider diffusion of our Sunday-school papers, which so ably advocate general Prohibition. We are glad to recognize the fact that all the literature of our Church in Canada is fully in sympathy with this great movement.

Your Committee would recommend that a strong Prohibition paragraph be inserted in the Pastoral Address to our Societies; and that our ministers be advised to keep the subject of Prohibition prominently before their congregations.

We are pleased to learn that a great representative convention on the subject of general Prohibition is to meet in the city of Montreal in the early part of next month; and we would recommend that, if practicable, this Conference should send one or more delegates to such convention.

Your Committee feel confident that the people of this country will not be satisfied with anything less than the total suppression of the accursed liquor traffic. They never asked for half measures, and want no further compromises with a business that is ruinous to the best interests of the nation and of our race. We believe the Christian Church exists for the regeneration of the man, of governments, and nations. "The earth shall be renewed in righteousness." We base ourselves upon that assurance, and labor for its consummation. The signs of the times indicate its rapid approach.

The eternal forces are working out this great problem. Right shall triumph over selfishness and party interests; the great incubus of this ungodly traffic must be removed from the commerce of our nation, and thus the stream of social and national life be purified. We pledge ourselves to this end; and must prosecute this great conflict until the monster vice of intemperance is consigned to eternal oblivion.

In connection with the adoption of the above report, the following resolutions, adopted by the Conference of 1887, were ordered to be inserted again in the Minutes as an addendum to this year's report:—

Resolved, That whereas the vile traffic in intoxicating liquors still continues to exert its baneful influence throughout the length and breadth of the land, wasting the material resources of the country, entailing poverty and crime, and involving annually the destruction of many thousands of human lives; and

Whereas there is abundant evidence to show that prohibitory legislation, where it has been granted and even fairly well enforced, has invariably been followed by the diminution of drunkenness and crime, and an increase of temporal prosperity among the people; therefore be it

Resolved, That the members of this Conference view with alarm and indignation the efforts now being made to seriously impair, if not to repeal, the "Canada Temperance Act," accompanied as these efforts are by indiscretion on the part of professed friends, by thorough organization on the part of avowed enemies, and the unfriendly attitude of both the Dominion and Provincial Governments, as manifested by the recent appointment to the Senate of men in sympathy with the liquor traffic, and the retention of men in the position of inspectors, commissioners, and magistrates, who take every opportunity of frustrating the proper enforcement of the law.

Resolved also, that, believing the time to be fully come when party alliances and party predilections must be subordinated to the great cause of temperance reform, the members of this Conference do hereby pledge themselves, by every legitimate means in their power—in the pulpit, on the platform, in the press, and at the ballot-box—to oppose any government, or any party, or any individual member of Parliament, who, either by vote or influence, shall seek to destroy, or seriously impair, the existing prohibitory legislation.

Resolved, also, that we declare our readiness to unite with all other Conferences, Synods, Assemblies and Associations throughout the country, in educating and directing public sentiment to the point of demanding from the House of Commons an efficient prohibitory enactment for the whole Dominion.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee respectfully submit, that returns from the several districts show in all the lines of Sunday-school work that there has been success. The number of conversions reported is 1,713, being an increase over last year of 222. This feature is to us very cheering.

The figures given show an increase in the circulation of all the papers being issued from the press of our own Church, and also in the funds.

We continue to urge that the Catechism of our own Church be more largely and more persistently taught in our schools; and respectfully request teachers and superintendents to give this matter increased attention.

Your Committee believe that the success of our Sunday-school work

depends very largely upon the increased interest of our people in this department of our work, as evidenced by the fact, that in some places whole families are to be found in regular attendance upon the Sunday-school. Your Committee recommend the re-appointment of Rev. Wm. Jolliffe as Secretary-Treasurer of the Conference Sunday-school Fund.

REPORT OF SECRETARY-TREASURER OF SUNDAY-SCHOOL AID AND EXTENSION FUND, 1887-8.

It is gratifying to be able to report that the receipts from each of the districts are in advance of former years; and, moreover, that the advance covering the period of four years has reached upwards of forty per cent. While this is encouraging, yet it is to be regretted that there are schools on self supporting Circuits which year after year fail to make any returns, and some others, comparatively able, make very small returns.

It is hoped that this department of our benevolent work may largely share in the sympathy and support which are necessary to render it a blessing in the line of efficient aid in connection with our Sabbath-school work.

In reviewing the work of the Church for the past year, your Committee are pleased to be able to report progress in the religious, educational and financial departments of her work. Your Committee would express the most heartfelt gratitude to God for the great blessings He has bestowed upon us during the year. There have been many, and in some instances, extensive revivals of religion, resulting in the increase of membership, after accounting for deaths, etc., of 1,584.

The various Circuit and Connexional Funds have been generally well sustained. We regret, however, to have to report a slight decrease in the amount contributed to the Educational Fund.

We rejoice to report satisfactory progress in the grand work of our noble University, and also of Albert College, both of which are within the bounds of this Conference.

The reports from the different Missions are hopeful and encouraging, while there is a good increase in the amount contributed to this fund, viz., \$1,564.18.

It is a cause of devout thanksgiving, that the Sunday-schools under our fostering care as a Church are in so prosperous a condition. We note with pleasure a largely increased attendance, especially in the adult classes; and that our schools are becoming more and more a place where persons of all ages come together to study God's Word. No less than

1,713 conversions have taken place during the year in connection with our Sabbath-schools, and nearly a thousand more than last year are returned as meeting in class. The largely increased attendance brings with it the grave responsibility that rests upon us, of educating the youth of this Province in Christian principles.

Your Committee also rejoice in the marked success of evangelists employed under the direction of this Conference; and we would recommend, if possible, the continuance of this agency.

We are glad to note an improvement in the support of the ministry of the Church; still nearly one-half of the married men in the Conference receive less than \$600 per annum—an amount quite insufficient to meet the reasonable necessities of themselves and their families. These brethren have our sympathy; and we would suggest that efforts be made to so re-arrange the work on the Districts as to lessen, if possible, the number of small Missions, and thus strengthen the fields of labor, so that all may have a more liberal support.

9. Thomasburg is recommended to take charge of Bethesda, from Tweed Circuit.

10. That Huntingdon Circuit be divided as follows: Bethesda, Bethlehem, Salem and Crookston to be called Ivanhoe; West Huntingdon, Mount Zion, Eggleton's and Fuller's, to be called West Huntingdon.

11. That the name of Warriston Mission be changed to Malone.

12. We recommend that Brother J. Davies be recommended for superannuation.

13. That Brother M. J. Bates be appointed Conference Evangelist.

14. That permission be given, as requested, to Chairmen of Districts to employ the following as their services may be required: J. E. Kennedy, W. P. Heron, R. Snider, A. Mallet, Hamilton Magahie, and Charles Adams.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL FROM THE BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE.

Resolved, That the members of this Conference, having heard read the memorial from the British Columbia Conference, are convinced of the manifest injustice done to our missionaries and people, and the peril threatening our missions among the Indians in British Columbia.

We endorse the recommendations of the British Columbia Conference, that a Commission be appointed by the General Board of Missions to thoroughly investigate and report upon the matter, with a view of having such representation made to the Governments concerned and the public as that justice will be done to our Indians, our missionaries exonerated, and the aspersions cast upon our Church removed. And we further recommend that the General Superintendents and Missionary Secretary take immediate steps to bring the matter before the Indian Department at Ottawa, and ask for such an investigation on their part as will secure the object sought by the memorialists.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

Report of the Treasurer for the year ending August 31st, 1887, for publication in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences.

As Treasurer of the above Fund, I think it important that a Report of the Fund should appear in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences, for the information of those concerned in its management and success.

An interim Report was sent to the Conferences last year, but as the year closes on the 31st August, this is the first regular Annual Report that could be published in the Minutes since the last General Conference.

The following are the Receipts and Expenditure, as they stood on the 31st August, 1887:—

According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference, it will require \$7,500 to meet the claims on the Fund. This, I think, is a moderate estimate in view of the expenses of the past year.

The actual amount received from the Conferences during the year is only \$1,552.33. I am aware that some of the Conferences had paid a large proportion of the collections of the then current year just before the General Conference, but the collections for the following year should have been paid in before the 31st August. After making all due allowances, the amounts paid by the Conferences during the year were shamefully small.

If this state of things should continue till the close of the quadrennium, there will be no funds to pay the expenses of the delegates to the General Conference of 1890. The officers appointed by the General Conference are forbidden to "disburse more than the amount in hand." The question, therefore, is assuming a serious aspect, and it becomes my duty to lay the facts before the parties interested at this early date, that they may govern themselves accordingly.

The Fund, at the close of the year, was indebted to the Treasurer \$7,921.70. It is scarcely necessary to say that this state of things cannot be continued. Some provision must evidently be made at an early date to meet the expenses of the Fund. I know of no available method of doing this, unless the Conferences provide in some way for the prompt payment annually of the amounts allotted to them by the Financial Committee of the General Conference.

GENERAL TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

In presenting this Report for the consideration of the Board, the Treasurer has pleasure in stating:—

1. That there has been an increase in the Permanent Fund amounting to \$4,244.23.
2. The estimates for the year, which were made with great care, were sufficient to meet the expenditure, and the debt has been considerably reduced. It was the desire of the Treasurer to make these estimates as close as possible, in order to keep the assessments to Circuits down to the lowest possible amounts.
3. The annual income from all sources has fully met the expectations of the Treasurer. Notwithstanding the low rates of interest, there has been an increase realized from this source of \$1,679.29. A part of this increase, however, should have been paid in and accounted for in last year's Report. The Book Room has paid \$6,000 to the Fund, an increase of \$2,000. The several Annual Conferences have paid the amounts in full apportioned to them, with very trifling exceptions, which are very easily explained.
4. The claimants have been paid in full, and the debt, with which we commenced the year, has been reduced \$1,667.25, leaving only a balance of \$1,044.95.
5. On the whole, the working of the new law has been an encouraging success during this, the first year of its existence, and augurs well for

the future. I do not claim for it, absolute perfection, but it cannot be changed till the next General Conference. As we cannot "mend" it till then, let us, as ministers and laymen, "keep it," and, with the improvements that may be made at the next General Conference, it will be a lasting blessing to the Church in all times to come.

We desire to urge all the people under our influence to discourage, in every way, Sunday traffic on railroads and boats, and to guard against any continuance of social visiting and recreation on the Lord's Day.

We ask our people to avoid arranging for the burial of their dead on the Lord's Day, where it is possible; but where that day must be so employed, we suggest that the minister in charge be consulted at an early date, so that his regular work may not be needlessly interrupted.

Your Committee is profoundly impressed that this matter is one of extraordinary importance; that it is so vital and fundamental to the interests of the cause of Christ in the world, that every effort should be made to arouse the attention of the whole Church to the subject, and never cease until the Scriptural principle and practice of proportionate and systematic giving receive general adoption.

2. We recommend that a sermon on this subject be preached, on the first Sabbath of December next, in all our churches throughout the bounds of the Conference.

3. That our people be encouraged and stimulated to procure and read the best literature on "Systematic Giving" that can be found. We gladly welcome the teaching frequently given in our Connexional periodicals on this theme, and hope that these excellent and influential publications may be, even more frequently, the vehicles of the most earnest advocacy of this cause.

4. We recommend that all our people teach their children to adopt, from early life, this principle as one of the best elements in the formation of Christian character, and one of the safest guarantees against the growth of covetousness, and many other evils. Also that arrangements be made to have this subject properly taught in all our Sabbath-schools.

ANNIVERSARY SERVICES IN CONNECTION WITH

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST
CHURCH TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHERN,—Once again, through the tender mercy of our God, we send you, from our Annual Conference, our greetings and counsels. Receive them as a renewed assurance of the unfeigned love which we cherish for your souls, and of our earnest solicitude that you should always increase “with the increase of God.” The pastoral office which has been committed to us by “the Great Shepherd of the sheep,” is invested with unspeakable importance, and surrounded with the gravest responsibilities. We cannot forget that we are successors of men who were pre-eminent for holiness, and for the unexampled success of their labors; and we are deeply anxious lest in any wise we dishonor their memories, or betray the deposit of holy privileges which they have bequeathed to us. Brethren, pray for us, that the Word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified, as it was in the days of our fathers. Our holiest and best interests are inseparably blended with yours: “For what is our hope or joy, or crown of rejoicing? Are not even ye in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at His coming: for ye are our glory and joy?”

We devoutly acknowledge the tokens of the Divine presence with us during the past year. The revival spirit has been blessedly enjoyed in our hearts and churches. “Showers of blessing” have been experienced in nearly all our charges; and, as a result of this increased activity and zeal, a net increase of 1,568 members has been reported from the various Districts. If this work is to continue, we must remember that the means which originated Methodism are the only means which, under God’s blessing, will perpetuate Methodism; the existence and prosperity of the Church depends on the personal godliness of its members. No congregation of unconverted men can ever constitute a true Church. Vital union with the Head is essential to organic growth in the members. Our fathers welcomed to their fellowship all who had “a sincere desire to flee from the wrath to come,” but were not satisfied unless the people of their charges were living in the enjoyment of the witness of the Spirit, and were panting after the maturity of Christian love. The great want of the day is an intelligent, ardent, uniform, and practical godliness in all the members of the Church,—a godliness which is nourished by devout and habitual fellowship with God. “But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and, when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret, shall reward thee openly.” The claims of the family, of the world, or even of the Church, must not be allowed to interfere with the claims of the closet. Men of prayer are men of power. Emulate the examples of holy men presented in Scripture history and religious biography, and you will not only advance the life of God in your souls, but become the instruments of much good to others also.

missionary operations of the Church. Methodism has always disclaimed all circumscribing bounds, and taken for its motto: "The World for Christ." Never were the nations of the world so open for Christianizing and evangelistic operations as at the present time; and never since the apostolic days have such trophies been won for the blessed Jesus. The gates of distant lands have been opened to us, and through them has come, over and over again, the deep imploring wail of those who are sitting in the shadow of death, asking for the light that has so blest and illuminated our lives. Can we, without criminal recreancy to God, to truth, and to our history, close our ears to these calls, or fail to give the suppliants the bread of life? God has given us any number we require of cultured, godly and efficient men and women, who are prepared to go to these distant lands as messengers of the glad evangel; but they lack the means for necessary outfit and adequate support; will you not dedicate a larger amount of your means for this great work? It will repay you abundantly in the reflex benefits imparted to your own life and experience. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in Mine house; and prove Me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

The Educational work is the right arm of the Church; and nowhere in our country can the sons and daughters of our people obtain a better education than our own University at Cobourg, our College at Belleville, or the Ladies' Colleges under the auspices of the various Conferences offer; while no restraints, safeguards, and incentives to duty, obtaining in other institutions, surpass those which surround the pupils attending our own. Be more anxious to give to your sons and daughters a liberal education, than to leave them material wealth—it is the best legacy you can give them; and be sure that sound learning and vital piety be happily blended together. We have mourned over the great loss we have sustained in the death of the gifted and eloquent Dr. Nelles, who was justly looked up to as one of the most successful educators of our times; but we have recognized the goodness of God in giving to Victoria University so wise and judicious a successor to him, in the person of Chancellor Burwash. The Rev. John Potts, D.D., Secretary of Education, will spend a good part of this year in our Conference, arranging for the building and endowment of the new Victoria College in Toronto. We bespeak for him, and those actively co-operating with him, your hearty sympathy and best financial assistance.

There is another interest which is vitally connected with the prosperity and extension of the Church of Christ. We refer to the religious training and claims of the young. While the Sabbath-schools have been doing a noble work for God, and the superintendents and officers require your sympathy and support, we would earnestly remind you that our home lessons possess a charm and power altogether their own; and while they are the earliest, they are the most gentle in their influence, and most lasting and salutary in their results. Be satisfied with nothing less than the conversion of your children in early life. Let all your purposes, plans and efforts have direct reference to this. Guard them as far as possible from the temptations of gaiety, of doubtful companionship, of questionable recreations, and especially of pernicious reading. The mind, chameleon-

like, assumes the hue of that on which it feeds. It is as much the duty of Christian parents to provide wholesome food for the minds as for the bodies of their families. The best way to exclude pernicious reading is to supply them with that which is good. Your Church supplies this important want as fully as it can be met in any other quarter, and at a smaller cost, and infinitely more valuable than can be secured elsewhere. If we use wisely these precautions, we may claim the fulfilment of the promises of God: "And I will establish my covenant between me and thee, and thy seed after thee in their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be a God unto thee and to thy seed after thee;" "I will pour My spirit upon thy seed, and my blessing upon thine offspring; and they shall spring up as among the grass, as willows by the water-courses."

We should utterly fail in the discharge of our duty if we did not urge you to deep and constant interest in the great question of Temperance. We need not tell you of the evils growing out of the licensed liquor traffic. It has not only darkened the homes and blighted the prospects of thousands of our country and the world, but is seeking to entrench itself in high places, and control the legislation of our land, as it never did before. Let all our Methodist people be true in the testimony they bear on this question. For the sake of your families, for the sake of your brethren who are weak, for the sake of suffering humanity, for the sake of the cause of God, be (1) total abstainers yourselves, and (2) give your full sympathy and support to every effort made to secure the entire prohibition of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors; for this, we believe, our country is prepared; and this, we also believe, our rulers would give us, if we were consistent with our principles in all respects.

Finally, brethren, pray for us. The great want of the Church is spiritual power—that the ministers, office-bearers, and membership serve the Lord in the beauty of holiness; "that holiness to the Lord shall be written upon the bells of the horses;" then, and only then, shall we be prepared to fulfil our original mission, and "spread scriptural holiness through the land." We challenge you, beloved in the Lord, to this service of united, earnest, believing prayer, for a more abundant effusion of the Holy Ghost. Why should Pentecost be an event of the past and not a perpetual fact? The wise and weighty words of our founder are worthy of our remembrance: "Let others do as they will, what is that to you?" Act as Christian men—as those who fear nothing but sin; seek nothing but heaven, and desire nothing but the glory of God. Join us in this resolve, and in this service; then the year upon which we enter will surpass in spiritual-blessings all the years of our history. This is blessedly possible. Our God is a covenant-keeping God, and He will not deny us. "The kingdom of heaven suffereth violence, and the violent take it by force."

Now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all we can ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us; unto Him be glory in the Church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, world without end. Amen."
