They rajoice that there is a visible increase and prosperity in Sabbath Schools in connection with our Churches, over any other year reported, and they recommend that religious instruction to the Young be prosecuted by all the Churches with vigour, having the promise of God, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." The instrument which Sabbath Schools employ is the BIBLE, that very word which he bedeared shall act return to him word, but shall accomplish the which he please and prosper is the thing whereante he sends it. We recommend that every Cherch, if possible, secure the co-operation of the heads of families in the neighbourhood where an attempt is made to establish a Sabbath School, and that the Minister be called upon to exert his influence in gathering together the children into these unreseries of the Church of God. An important appendage to the Sabbath School is a good Library; such can now had at the Depository of the Colportent Society in St. John, varying in price from two dollars fifty cents to ton dollars.
