(Continued from page 1) seen only one drunken woman and that was in the West End. SOLDIERS AND SOBRIETY.

As for soldiers, you see them everywhere, and they are not now as they were at one time, deprived of their right to have a drink if they want it. I have seen a few soldiers who were evidently exhilarated; but I have not yet seen a man in uniform who could be considered real ly drunk. That may be due to an exceptionally efficient police force, I don't know. But remember there are probably a thousand, or two thousand, or more soldiers in London to every man in uniform you see ir St. John; possibly the ratio may be 10,000 to 1. And the publicans and sinners here are no better than anywhere else. Distillers and brewers have a patriotic regard for dividends; to get decent whiskey or be you have to pay quite as much as you would in Canada.

A NEW ORDER OF THINGS.

But the most of the world is in the melting pot. The old order has broken down; a new order is emerging. Social, political and religious shibboleths are going by the board; politicians, pedagogues and persons no longer matter greatly. The fighting man has the right of way; the soldier, not so long ago refused admittance to first class theatres, is the man of the hour. Ubiquitous and invincible he is on the whole rather modest. A good many of the proprieties, dear to the heart of Puritanism are no more; life is franker and freer, and youth asserts itself, gallant and debonnair. On the surface it is a merrier England than before the war, and a kinder.



My officers are fine chaps; I'd do anything in reason or the way of duty for them, but I did not join the service to shine their shoes or kow-tow to anybody. I have a tidy ranch in Alberta; I could buy out many of my officers. I left Canada to do my little bit. I have been offered a job that would keep me out of the trenches. I don't want it.
