

IRISH HISTORY IS BEING MADE IN I.ONDON

Recent Events Fail to Ob-scure the Movement To-ward Mediation Daily Gaining Momentum.

London, July 18.—Two events reported in the sham war in Ireland Frilay night—the robbing of the Dublin post office and the fight with stones in Belfast—fall to obscure the movement toward mediation, which is gaining momentum daily in London. In July 1918 the Canadian roads were threatened with a general strike. To prevent this public catastrophe they ed to follow the American scale of wage increases. The Government of Canada mean-time allowed freight rate-increases intended to make up the cost of these new wage

Leaving aside all question of increased cost of material, the new wages cost the railways of Canada an extra eighty million dollars for the first year alone.

The new rates yielded them an additional forty-three

The annual deficit on wages alone was thirty-seven millions and is constantly growing!




