a Committee on Preaching Arrangements.

Rev. J. Wesley Clark, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report:

BROTHER MODERATOR AND DEAR BRETHREN:

Our Heavenly Father has kindly permitted us to meet again in our Annual Conference. The occasion calls for devout thanksgiving to Almighty God, who has abundantly vouchsafed to us His blessings.

Eleven years ago our denomination held its annual meeting

with this church. Reviewing those years brings to our minds the fact, that much of the Lord's favor has been with us, in that the labors of His servants and people have been divinely recognized in the salvation of hundreds of souls.

But we have also to notice that some unprayed for and unlooked for experiences have come to us. God has called several of His workmen home, among them some of the most useful and

fatherly of our ministers.

But sorer trial than this has been encountered, by the estrangement from the Conference of brethren who adopted beliefs different from those held by the Denomination (causing much weakness and harm to the churches), and from whom, after years of patient and prayerful, but unsuccessful, effort to effect union, it was deemed advisable at the annual session of last year to withdraw fellowship.

In assuming the responsibilities and duties which were upon us at the beginning of the year now passed, all hearts were uplifted to God in earnest prayer for heavenly wisdom and direction, and to-day it is our greatest pleasure to record the blessed and memorable fact that the Lord has answered our prayers. That which for years had been a struggle in the minds of many has been overcome, the cloud has been dispersed, light has shone, and less than anticipated difficulty has been realized.

It has been a year of more than usual interest and care for the ministers and churches; but from information at hand, all things considered, we believe it to have been a year of more than average success. God planted the Denomination, and our faith lays hold of the promise, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the

end of the world."

In submitting my report of the churches in the several Districts, Iask for the indulgence of all persons interested. If any omissions are made, attribute it to the scantiness of the information sert me.

FIRST DISTRICT.

This District held its annual session with the Church at Lower Perth. It was a season of much interest and strength. Of its eighten Churches, only nine of them reported. Rev. J. J. Barne, whose labors are highly appreciated by the people, has the patoral care of the Lower Perth, Perth Centre, Arthurette, and Ing Island Churches. These Churches are doing well. True, there have not been many conversions, but the good work is goig on, the seed is being sown, and we believe that ere long it wil spring up and bear fruit, even a hundred fold.

Bother Barnes has baptized three. Two of them were added

to the Long Island Church, and one to the Church at Arthurette.

The Wicklow Church has had no pastor; but have been encouraged by visite from Revs. J. Noble and C. F. Ridcout. They very much feel the loss of their senior deacon, the late Nathan B. Milbery, who for more than twenty years gave them sympathy and help.

The Church at Bath, though without a pastor, was considerably revived by the special meetings conducted by Rev. J. Noble. They also report visits from Rev. C. F. Rideout and Father

Sipperell.

Wright Settlement has had no pastor for two years, and is in a

low and scattered condition.

The Church at Bumfrau has had preaching by Rev. E. B. Gray, J. Noble and C. F. Rideout, who have visited them as they have had opportunity.

Bro. J. J. Barnes visited the Church at Mineral Springs, and

found them very much discouraged.

Of the other Churches we can say but little: many of them have not reported for years. But let us pray that God may call more men to labor among the destitute Churches of this District.

Only four of the Churches have had pastoral care. Eight sustain conference meetings, and six hold weekly prayer meetings. Three have been added by baptism; total decrease, seven; net decrease, 4.

SECOND DISTRICT.

The annual session of this District was held with the Church at Knowlesville. Of the twenty-eight churches enrolled, trentyfive reported, as follows:

The Woodstock Church, under Rev. C. T. Phillips, has had a year of peace and prosperity. Four have been added by etter.

Tracey's Mills and Knoxford Churches have had the pistoral care of Rev. J. W. Clark, Thirty-five have been added by baptism to the Tracey Mills Church, and one by letter.

Rev. T. S. VanWart has had pastoral care of the Ipwer

Brighton, Hartland, and Connell Churches. Three were added by baptism and three by letter to the second named church.

The Church at Charleston has enjoyed the pastoral labors of Rev. E. B. Gray. Brother Gray has also cared for the Church at Seventh Tier, to which were added seven by baptism and three by letter.

The Rockland and Coldstream Churches reported Rev. J. Perry as their pastor. These Churches have had the faithful preaching of Bro. Perry for years, and much good has been done.

Victoria Corner Church reports the labors of Rev. Thomas Connor and Licentiate A. McNintch, whose work have been enjoyed by the people, and blessed of God in the building up of the Church. Four have been added by letter.

The Somerville Church has had nine added to its membership by letter, and is prospering under the joint labors of Revs. T.

Connor and T. S. Van Wart.

The Third Tier Church reports the pastoral labor of Rev. C.

T. Phillips for one quarter of the time.

Upper Brighton Church has had Licentiate A. McNintch for its pastor during part of the year. It is being strengthened and encouraged.

Brother G. L. Slipp continues to extend faithful labor to the

Third Woodstock Church.

Knowlesville, Foreston, Windsor, River Bank, Gordonsville, Brookville, Palmer Settlement and Pembroke Churches report no pastor; but have received timely visits from Revs. J. Perry, T. S. VanWart, C. T. Phillips, and Licentiate A. McNintch.

Bristol, Lakeville, Upper Woodstock and Jacksonville Churches

did not report.

Revs. E. Sipprell, H. Hartt, and S. W. Shaw reside within the limits of this District. Father Sipprell is prevented from active service on account of age; but Brothers Hartt and Shaw have assisted as they have had opportunity.

The number added by baptism is 45; by letter, 24; total, 69;

less by decrease, 162; net decrease, 93.

Thirteen of the Churches report weekly prayer meetings; eighteen have regular Conference meetings.

The District license of Bro. A. McNintch was renewed at the last annual session.

THIRD DISTRICT.

This District comprises twenty-one Churches, of which twelve

reported by letter at its annual meeting.

Rev. Wm. Downey, the pastor of the Nashwaak, Marysville, and Douglas Churches has had a good year. The special services held at Douglas resulted in an addition to that Church of twenty-

three by baptism and four by letter.

Lower Queensbury, Bear Island, Lower Prince William, and Dumfries Churches have been cared for by Rev. Gideon Swim. Bro. Swim has been very much blessed in his labors among these Churches. God gave him to see the cause revived and sinners converted in counection with the Bear Island and Lower Prince William Churches. Nineteen were added by haptism and six by letter to the Bear Island Church. Seven were added by baptism to the Lower Prince William Church, and one by baptism and one by letter to the Lower Queensbury Church.

Rev. Dr. McLeod is still pastor of the Fredericton Church. The pastor baptized five, who, with three by letter, were added

to the Church.

The Upper Hainesville Church has been encouraged by occa-

sional visits from Rev. John Perry.

Middle Southampton, Stanley, and Lower Canterbury Churches

report no pastor. The District Clerk, in his report, makes no reference to any of the other Churches of this District. It is but fair to presume that they are low spiritually, and in need of earnest and regular ministerial care.

To the Churches in this District there have been added by baptism fifty-nine, and by letter thirteen; total, seventy-two; less

by decrease, seventy-seven; net decrease, five. Of the twelve Churches reported, ten have conference and seven weekly prayer meetings.

This District, at its last annual meeting, granted District Meeting license to Bro .Wm. Reud.

Rev. John Henderson resides in this District, and has en-

couraged such Churches as he has visited.

Rev. Jacob Gunter, beloved by many, and known for long for his faithful, earnest services in the Master's cause, lives within this District; but, on account of age and failing health, has not been actively engaged during the past year.

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FOURTH DISTRICT.

This District includes fifteen Churches, situated in the counties of Queens, Sunbury, and York, all but one of which reported at the last annual meeting.

The Churches at Blissville, Patterson Settlement, and Mill Settlement have had the constant and faithful pastoral labors of Rev. W. H. Perry. All of these Churches are doing well.

Rev. G. W. Foster has been successful in his pastoral labors with the Fredericton Junction, Tracey Station, and Little Lake Churches. The Fredericton Junction Church has had a good revival; was greatly encouraged and strengthened. Twelve were baptized by the pastor, and added to the Church. Two were added by baptism to the Church at Tracey Station.

The Church at Rusagornish report a month's labor by Rev. E.

Garrity; no conference nor weekly prayer meeting.

Since May last Dr. McLeod has extended care and preached

on alternate Sabbaths to the Church at Lincoln.

Licentiate Bonnell has held some meetings with the Churches at Waterville and Geary. Other brethren have visited them. They are both weak, especially Geary. From this Church three have been taken by death, and ten have gone out to join some other denomination. They send the Macedonian cry. some man among us see the vision, and, like Paul, immediately go, assured that "the Lord has called him to preach the gospel unto them."

The Upper Gagetown Church reports Licentiate F. A. Currier as their pastor. Rev. B. H Nobles visited this church last May, held several meetings, and baptized and added eight to the

Church.

The Waasis Station, Oromocto, Victoria, and Greenfield Churches have no pastor. The Clerk writes: "I am persuaded that these Churches would contribute to the support of the ministry according to their ability, if some of God's servants could but go and encourage them."

There have been added to this District by baptism twenty-two, by letter none; total, twenty-two; less by decrease, thirty; net

decrease, eight.

Bros. Frank A. Currier and Samuel Golding had their District licenses renewed.

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FIFTH DISTRICT.

This District reports sixteen Churches, with one branch Church, thirteen of which reported at its last meeting.

The First Greenwich and First Hampstead Churches have had the pastoral care of Rev. J. G. McKenzie, whose faithful labors have been greatly enjoyed.

Rev. O. N. Mott has cared for the Third and Fourth Hampstead Churches and the Second Church, Johnston. One was baptized by the pastor, and added to the former Church.

The Fourth Hampstead Church reports a decrease by death of six members, one of whom was their respected and senior deacon, the late Isaac Davis. The interest in this Church is good. Conference and prayer meetings regularly sustained and fairly well attended.

Twenty-two were baptized by the pastor, and added to the

Second Johnston Church.

Until the time of Conference last year, the First Johnston Church was cared for by Rev. W. H. Perry. Since then they have had no pastor; but have been visited by Revs. W. H. Perry and O. N. Mott. They report no prayer meetings and are therefore in a spiritually low condition.

The First Church, Kars, has had no pastor, but have been encouraged and cheered by visits from Revs. J. G. McKenzie, T. W. Carpenter, R. French, B. H. Nobles, and G. W. Foster. They report no increase, and the cause low for want of a pastor.

The Second Kars Church reports no pastor, but that they highly appreciate the labors of Rev. J. N. Barnes, who lives among them, and spends that part of his time with them which is not otherwise engaged. The District Clerk very pertinently remarks: "It might be well with the Church, but how is it with Brother Barnes?" They also had a visit from Licentiate F. C. Hartley.

The Church at Holderville reports as their pastor, Licentiate

W. P. Carpenter.

The paster of the First and Fourth Wickham Churches has been Rev. J. N. Barnes, who has spent a fourth of his time with each church, earnestly working and faithfully ministering to their wants.

their wants.

The Branch Church of No. 2 Greenwich was organized by Rev. J. N. Barnes, Jan. 6th, 1889, with a membership of nine-

teen. Three have been added since. Bro. Barnes went to this locality early last winter to work for souls. God gave them to him, and blessed his efforts as above stated. There is an interesting and successful Sabbath-school in connection with this branch. It was received into the District Meeting at its last annual session.

Rev. B. H. Nobles was pastor of the Second and Sixth Wickham Churches until the time of last General Conference. The latter Church have had visits from Revs. J. N. Barnes and T. W. Carpenter. They report the conference and prayer meetings regularly held, with only a few to attend; also a good interest in the Sabbath-school.

The Fifth Wickham Church reports no pastor, no increase, no money.

The Clerk adds: "There are some lamentable deficiencies in the reports of this year, No remarks being forwarded with most of the reports makes it very difficult to give you much information that will assist you."

The Second Hampstead and Third Wickham Churches send no report.

There have been added by baptism twenty-six; by letter, twenty-three; total, forty-nine; total decrease, seventy-four; net decrease, twenty-five. The total membership is 855.

SIXTH DISTRICT.

This District has a membership of thirty-two Churches. Its annual meeting was held with the Church at Corn Hill, where a season of more than usual interest was enjoyed.

Twenty-six of the Churches reported, as follows:

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Penobsquis, Sussex, and Lower Millstream Churches were cared for by Licentiate F. Francis. Two were added by letter to the Lower Millstream Church.

Rev. Wm. DeWare has the pastoral care of the Apohaqui, Norton Station, Midland, and Long Point Churches. One was added by baptism and one by letter to the Apohaqui Church.

The Norton Church dedicated its new meeting-house in May last. It now worships in one of the prettiest and best church buildings in the Conference.

The Millstream Mountain Church has had the labors of Bro. Stults, a licentiate of the Church at Moncton. Special meetings were held by the pastor, which resulted in the conversion of several, five of whom were baptized and added to the Church.

Rev. A. H. McLeod continues to extend pastoral labor with the Taylor's Village, Dover, Lewis Mountain, and Third Moncton Churches. One was added by baptism to the Church at Dover.

Bro. McLeod conducted a series of special meetings with the Upper Millstream Church. The effort was especially blessed of God in the strengthening of the Church and the salvation of Eighteen were added by baptism and two by letter.

Petitcodiac, Corn Hill and Coverdale, Wheaton Settlement aud Rockland Churches, continue to enjoy the pastoral labors of Rev. A. C. Thompson. One has been added by baptism and one by letter to the Church at Coverdale, and one by letter to the Petitcodiac Church.

Rev. T. O. DeWitt has had the pastoral care of the Moncton Church. It is encouraged and hopeful. One has been added by

baptism and fifteen by letter.

Snider Mountain and Dutch Valley Churches have been cared for by Bro. E. Steeves, a licentiate of one of the Churches of this District.

The North River Church has had an addition of six by bap-

tism and four by letter. Bro. A. Perry is reported pastor.
Portage, Newtown, Lower Ridge, and Upper Millstream

Churches are without pastoral care.

Kingston, Erb Settlement, Lower Studholm, Canaan Forks, Steeves Settlement and Lutz Mountain Churches did not report. Of the nine Churches in this District withuot pastors, only three have reported—a fact which brings clearly to our minds that pastoral labor is requisite for the building up of the interests

of the Christian Church. Twenty-one of the Churches have regular monthly conference meetings, and thirteen have stated weekly prayer meetings.

There have been added by baptism thirty-three; by letter, twenty-six; total, fifty-nine; less by decrease, seventy-two; net decrease, thirteen.

SEVENDED DISTRICE.

Fourteen churches compose this District, an addition of one being made at the last annual session, which was held with the Waterloo Street Church, St. John.

Rev. J. T. Parsons continues to be the pastor of the Church on Waterloo Street, St. John. This Church, all things considered, has had a good year. The congregations are large, and the meetings increasingly interesting and spiritual. As a result of some special meetings held by the pastor, nine were baptized, and, with eighteen others, added to the Church.

Rev. G. A. Hartley, who for more than thirty years has faithfully ministered to the Church at Carleton, still continues to be their pastor. Five have been added by baptism and four by letter. This Church is prospering, and is in good condition.

The Church at Wilson's Beach, though they report no additions, is doing well under the care of its pastor, Rev. G. F.

Beaver Harbor Church has been cared for, for the last five

months of the year, by Rev. C. F. Rideout.

The Castalia and Northern Harbor Churches send no statistics, but are reported as holding on to the faith of the gospel.

Rev. Robert French, who resides within the limits of this District, has visited and encouraged a number of its Churches. Bro. F. has also visited Churches in other Districts.

Among the many questions which shall engage our attention at this session, none is of greater importance, we think, than that an earnest effort be made to devise and adopt means to the end that every Church, especially our weaker ones, may have ministerial care. Unless they get it, they will very soon be entirely lost to us. Many of them are struggling for life. They are crying for help. Do we hear them? Shall we help them? Do we not know that we are commanded "to bear one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ." The strong must help the weak.

And now, as we enter upon a new Conference year, may we forget not that "we can do all things through Christ which

While our churches gladly avail themselves of the services of the ministers who have not had the advantage of a liberal education, every careful observer must have noted how cordially, and even with what enthusiasm our young students are welcomed to the churches during their vacations, and the evident interest and pride taken in them by the oldest members of the church, as well as the youngest.

2. Your Committee, believing that there cannot be any reasonable excuse for young men in this day of Free Schools to be without the advantages of a good English education, would recommend that this Conference urge every young man, before asking or expecting license from it, to be able to pass any examination required by the Conference.

3. That a Committee be struck, to report at the next Annual Session the best means of carrying out section 2 of this

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4. Your Committee is glad to know that the outlook for the "Union Baptist Seminary" seems so prosperous. Seventy students are now enrolled, and this number will be increased. this institution is not second in building, teachers, and appliances to any other seminary in the Maritime Provinces, cannot be questioned. We would therefore earnestly urge upon Free Baptist families the importance of being loyal to their denominational school, and when their children are sent away from home to school, to give preference to their own.

Your Board has carried out the instructions given by Resolution 53, of last year's Minutes, and settled with the late Treasurer. The amount realized from the Insurance Policy is \$2,166.20.

We have renewed, for three years, the Insurance on the Parsonage property, at Petitoodiac. The Policy being issued by the British American Assurance Company, of Toronto.

During the year, two deeds of meeting house properties have come into our hands. One, the deed of the Church property at Fair Haven, Deer Island. The other, an old deed of an old Church property, in Studholm, K. Co. For years anxiety had been felt about the title of this house, and just at the time when much needed, the deed was forthcoming.

BROTHER MODERATOR: - Your Committee on Denominational

Literature begs leave to submit the following Report:

1. Remarking, in the first place, that we regard it as regretable that we have not yet attained to a well furnished Denominational Book Room, where supplies suitable to our constantly growing needs, in this direction, could be obtained, also, at the same time placing before our young men who are looking to the Ministry, some standard of literary qualification, and we hope that this matter will receive due consideration by this General Conference.

2. We are very thankful, however, that we have a Denominational Organ of such high character and standing as our Religious Intelligencer, and we must heartily affirm and reiterate all that previous Conferences have said in its commendation, and we feel that each of our Ministers who so fully realize its worth and value as a yoke-fellow in their work, will continue to give it their hearty commendation, and will not rest satisfied until they have secured its weekly visits to every home in their respective fields of labor; and we sincerely hope that every loyal Free Baptist will see to it that not only is he a patron of the paper, but that by commendation and other efforts he seeks to bring other Free Baptist homes under its healthy influence; and we feel that this Conference cannot too strongly emphasize this section of our Report.

3. Your Committee would also call especial attention to the recently published Hand Book; it being not only a careful revision of the one previously published, but it also contains much additional matter of especial value to Pastors, Deacons, Church Clerks, and to every one who wishes to be an intelligent Free Baptist. The price, which barely covers the cost of publication, brings it within the reach of all.

4. As to the abridged publication in pamphlet form from said hand book, containing "Treatise of Faith," Church Covenant and Church Directory, your committee would reconfine d that each Pastor use due dilligence in placing in every Free Baptist home a copy of the same, that all our people may become established in the Faith, Doctrines and practices as held by us as a Denomination.

5. As to our Hymnal, your Committee express the hope that all our people may see the importance of using only those books and those hymna which express the sentiments embodied in the doctrines we accept and teach, and we believe carefulness on this point will enable us to avoid much error.

6. Your committee would also call the attention of our people to the need of exercising proper care in the selection of the various helps used in our Sunday Schools, that we may not use those that teach doctrines and usages we do not believe and accept.

7. And we also feel that in the selection books for the Sunday School we should use greater care, as not every book used as a Sunday School book is worthy or fit for a place in our Sunday School libraries, too many of them being religious novels of a questionable kind.

Report of the Executive for Foreign Missions.

BROTHER MODERATOR :- The Church of Christ is obeying, as never before, the command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature;" and the work of evangelizing all nations is being prosecuted with steadily increasing vigour, and is being attended with most cheering success. The extent of the werk being done is shown in these figures :- "There are to-day thirty-four missionary societies at work in Africa, and all its 200,000,000 souls are practically within the reach of Christian missions. Thirty-three societies have begun work in China, and

all its 350,000,000 souls may be visited with the message of the More than fifty societies have entered India, and the light is rapidly dawning on its 250,000,000. Turkey and Persia, and Japan are being filled with mission Churches and schools. Practically the whole world is open, and the grandest day of opportunity for the Kingdom of Christ that has ever been seen has .

fully dawned."

Of the work in the India field occupied by Free Baptists, the report for the year is fairly encouraging. The health of the missionaries has been fairly good. The missionaries number twentyone, besides eighteen native preachers and teachers, and some Bible women and other workers. Of the work of the mission in general the report says, that while nothing very wonderful has been accomplished, there is much that is encouraging. There has been but little interruption on account of ill health, and the several branches of the work have been steadily prosecuted, and with good effect. The field is better manned than ever before, and one new station-Bhudruck-has been opened. Other places are open to the missionaries, and tney are being invited to plant the gospel standard in several centres of large population. There is everywhere an enquiring spirit, and a readiness-even eagerness-to hear the gospel. More men and money are needed to rightly meet the demands made on the Mission.

The reports of the native preachers are an interesting feature. It is cheering to note how apparently devoted they are to the The fact that the churches of native converts are doing more and more towards the support of native pastors is significant; it is one of the best signs of a well-instructed and genuine

The missionaries of this Conference have been doing their full share of work, and have done it with good effect. The report of

Bro. Boyer is appended. Last year the Executive asked the Churches for \$1,200 for the work of the year. The receipts are within a few dollars of the amount asked. The Treasurer's Report will give the exact figures,

both of receipts and disbursements.

The Secretary's estimate for this year is the same as last-That our Churches are able easily to raise this amount there can be no doubt. The District Meetings have all very readily adopted the plan of apportionment suggested to the Conference last year. This is regarded as a promising sign. Each Church has, it is presumed, already been notified of the amount asked of it, and we are hoping that no Church will neglect to contribute at least the sum designated.

In order to the better instruction of the people in the Christian

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duty of being "workers together with God" for the world's evangelization, and to stimulate them to generous and systematic cooperation, the Executive suggests:

1. That more frequent reference be made to the subject by the pulpits of the denomination.

2. That it be kept before the people as a subject of prayer in the prayer meetings and in the homes.

3. That more attention be given to the circulation of mission-

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4. That there be a well-arranged plan of soliciting contributions in every congregation.

Thankful to God that He has permitted us to share in this great work, we should do well and faithfully our part, to the end that our Lord may soon have the heathen for His inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for His possession.

Report of Rev. A. B. Boyer to the N. B. Free Baptist F. M. Executive for 1888-89.

DEAR BRETHREN :- My work for the past year has not differed materially from that of former years. The bazaar and village preaching have been kept up regularly throughout the year, books have been distributed, and many personal efforts made to win these lost ones to Christ The bazaar work was never so interesting or so well attended as it has been during the past twelve months. I believe that upwards of fifty thousand people have in that period heard the gospel in this bazaar. A concertina, which I have bought to accompany the singing, has been of great help in drawing the people to our stand. Our party consists of Daniel Nayak, the native preacher, Natoo Singh, lay-assistant, and myself. Daniel and I preach in turns for about one-and-ahalf hours, each turn being usually prefaced with a hymn At the close we spend half an hour in explaining our books and persuading the people to buy. Book, or rather tract, selling is always an important branch of our work. We have disposed of, during the year, upwards of five thousand Christian tracts and gospels.

Perhaps the most interesting event during the year has been the return of Gunga Dhara Rath, the converted Brahman. He was baptized in June, 1888, and just a month afterwards was forcibly taken from the Mission school here to his home, 125 miles away. He was gone eight months, and none of us knew what had become of him until one morning he sprang in upon

us, his face shining with happiness. His people had taken his Bible away from him and had persecuted him in many ways. His eldest brother (an elder brother's authority over the younger is as absolute as that of a father) had held a cane over his head, and threatened his life if he persisted in asking a blessing over his food. The boy averted the punishment by asking his blessing silently. His people had made great preparations to take him back into caste. Large sums of money had been spent, thousands of Brahmins had been invited, and by a disgusting ceremony he was to be made a Brahmin again. But he had been too well converted to submit to such nonsense, and just one week before the day appointed he made his escape, being compelled that morning to walk twenty-five miles to Cullack without food. He is now in the Bible school at Midnapore, and if he continues faithful, will undoubtedly be a very useful preacher of the gospel.

The Balasore Sabbath-school, the largest in the mission, came into my hands in January last. Since that time it has, I have reason to believe, increased both in numbers and interest. There are now 217 names on the roll, representing 200 scholars and 17 teachers. The average attendance is 166. Oriza lesson leaves, following the series of the International S. S. Union, have been prepared by myself, and printed at the Midnapore press. During the last three months there has been great improvement in the contributions, so that our Sunday school alone hopes in a few

months to be able to support a native missionary.

Mrs. Boyer's health and my own have been fair during the year. Bessie, I am sorry to have to report, has been sick much of the time. Two weeks ago Dr. Zorab, the English civil surgeon of this place, ordered a change for her, and Mrs. Boyer took her to Midnapore, where they both are now. Bessie has now had malarial fever for two and a half months, and recent letters from Mrs. Boyer say that she is not improving. It is hard for the little one, and hard for us too; but we have given ourselves to this work together with its consequences, whatever they may be. If Bessie should live until another cold season, we will try to send her to America, away from this malarial climate.

Our work is hard and sometimes discouraging, but we are sure to win with Jesus on our side. We want-yes, we need-the prayers of all the Free Baptists in New Brunswick. Brethren,

pray fervently for us and our work.

Report of the Executive for Home Missions:

BROTHER MODERATOR: In making the report of the Home Mission work, we can only say that, with the men and the means at the disposal of the Executive, we have done what we could. Not that we have, by any means, reached our ideal of what might be done, or come up to the measure of what we believe God requires of us as a people; but we have endeavored to use our best judgment in giving every assistance in our power to Churches needing help, both in sending missionaries to labor among them for their encouragement and strength, and in supplementing the salaries of pastors with such amounts as we were able to give, that our weaker interests might have regular care. Your Executive realize that there was never a time in our Denominational history when greater attention should be paid, and a larger outlay of money devoted, to our home interests, to encourage and strengthen our languishing churches. Many of them have been depleted in numbers and weakened in ability to sustain themselves, by deaths and removals. Others of them have suffered from church-dividing schismatics and proselytes, and others, from a lack of ministerial labor and pastoral oversight, are weak and discouraged, and are looking to us for help.

It is to be hoped that the Conference will at this session succeed in grouping the weaker churches in such convenient pastorates as to make it possible that all receive stated labor. We believe that all our churches that God has blessed with the ability to sustain themselves, when they thoughtfully and prayerfully consider the needs of the weaker churches, will cheerfully respond by organizing a permanent fund to enable your Executive to supply this need.

During the past year your Executive have made engagements for ten months of mission labor, and are glad to know that in nearly all the cases where missionaries have been sent, the churches receiving their labors have called them to the pastorate before their term of service for which we had appointed them had expired. We secured the labors of Rev. T. O. DeWitt for

The church at Moncton being left without a pastor, and weakened in numbers and financial ability to sustain itself by the defection of a number of its members, we sent Bro. DeWitt there. His visit was timely and helpful, and was joyfully received. After one month's labor there, the church was so encouraged that it believed it possible, if a little assistance were given by this Executive, to sustain Bro. DeWitt as pastor. He was accordingly called. Believing that our interest in this growing town is too important to be allowed to suffer for want of help in this crisis of their experience, your Executive made the church a grant of one hundred dollars to enable them to retain the services of Bro. DeWitt for the remainder of the year. Bro. DeWitt also extended regular care to the church at Lutz Mountain.

One month's mission was given to Rev. J. Noble, which was expended in profitable visits to Brown's Flat, Stanley, Glencoe, Dutch Valley, and Portage. Bro. Noble's profitable gifts and rich experience peculiarly qualify him to encourage the faint, strengthen the weak, and confirm the loyalty of the churches, so that wherever he went his labors were gladly received and were

profitable.

Three months' mission was given to Rev. John A. Robertson. He visited the church at Erb Settlement, which was greatly blessed under his labors. Six professed faith in Christ, two of He labored to good acceptance with the whom he baptized. churches at Chocolate Cove, Fair Haven, and Lambert's Cove, Deer Island. He baptized three, and added four to the churches. At the expiration of two months, he effected an engagement with these churches till this Conference.

Two months' mission was given to Rev. C. F. Rideout. Executive sent him to visit the church at Beaver Harbor one month's labor with them, he, too, engaged to be their pastor until Conference. Bro. Rideout did faithful work with that

church, which has resulted in good.

To enable Rev. J. J. Barnes to spend his whole time with the churches in the First District, the Executive made a grant of one hundred dollars to supplement the amount contributed by the churches. This field is an extensive and important one, embracing the churches at Lower Perth, Perth Centre, Arthurette, Birch Ridge, Long Island, and Riley Brook. Other settlements are rapidly filling up with intelligent people, a large majority of whom are the sons and daughters of Free Baptist families, who naturally look to us for religious instruction and care. Bro. Barnes is doing his best to supply labor and care to this extensive field. He feels the responsibilities that rest upon him, and has thrown himself into the work with his whole soul, and God

has given him the hearts of the people in his large field.

Your Executive is more than ever convinced that money expended in assisting churches to maintain regular pastoral oversight, having the ordinances administered and the Word faithfully preached, even though it be but a part of the time, gives the largest and most permanent good results.

A grant of forty dollars was made the weak churches on the pastorate of Rev. J. N. Barnes, to give them stated ministerial labor. This has been timely assistance, and has afforded spiritual

help to a large number of God's people.

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Five dollars per month, for four months, was granted the church in Castalia, to enable Bro. Babcock to give to them regular care.

Your Executive feels the importance of something definite being done at this Conference to bring our Home Mission interests more prominently before our people. While we recognize the fact that one of the objects of our organization is to extend the principles and teachings of gospel truth as we understand it, into "the regions beyond," and while we see whitened fields around us on every side waiting for the sickle, we are compelled to the conclusion that permanent success in outside work will be measured by our strength at home; and we cannot hope to do our best work in gathering in this harvest for God while any number of churches are weak and languishing.

We decline making recommendations as to how this should be done; but ask the Conference, in its wisdom, to suggest how the weaker churches can be reached and helped, and how the necessary means can be raised to defray the expenses attending this work.

The Public Meeting of the Society was held on Monday, at 3 p. m., in the church. The devotional exercises consisted of singing, reading of Scripture by the President, and prayer by Mrs. J. T. Parsons.

Mrs. C. W. Weyman, Corresponding Secretary, read the

following Report:

Report of the Corresponding Secretary of the W. F. M. Society. Mrs. President and Sisters :- Another year has passed away, and we meet to-day, by the blessing of God, under favorable circumstances. Our lives and the lives of our dear missionaries have been spared; for all of which we should render devout

thanksgiving to God. Eleven years ago to-day, in this church, I presented to you my first annual report. but an infant three years old; our missionary had just started on Our Society then was her way to India for the first time. and knew but little of the work before us. We had but few Societies,

During these eleven years we have been constantly learning of the needs of those we wish to help, and more effective ways of doing so. To-day we have Societies in each District, and every year we come nearer our ideal-a Society in every church in our Denomination.

In the field we have one missionary equipped for the work, a native preacher, Biblewomen and schools, all doing good work. We feel to-day like humbling ourselves before the Lord, thanking Him for all His gracious kindnesses in the past, and imploring His help and guidance for the future.

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In the annual report that comes from the Free Baptist mission field, we find that all the different departments of the work are being vigorously and effectively carried on; and the most pleasing feature to us is, that some at least of the churches are becoming self-supporting. The health of the missionaries during the year has been fair. There are now 21 missionaries in the field. The reports from each one are interesting and cheerful, yet they need more means and workers to carry on the work. Of the 21 missionaries at present in the field, 13 are ladies, seven of these working as wives of missionaries. In the Woman's department, we find that the Bible-women are doing a blessed work. "My word shall not return to Me void." The day schools, Sabbath schools, and industrial schools are doing a work that otherwise could not be done. The Zenana work is being carried on as usual, and the wives and daughters of India are learning the way of salvation. Dr. Nellie Phillips is shedding an influence that is widespread, from the dispensary and other medical work.

Our own work at Balasore has been somewhat hindered by the ill-health of our missionary, Sister Hooper, who has for seven months of the year suffered more or less from a form of cholera. At times it was thought the disease might prove fatal, but by the blessing of God her health and strength has very much improved, and we earnestly pray that during the cold season she may be fully restored. Miss Hooper has charge of four schools, besides superintending her Bible women, Oma and Kokoi, who are efficient workers, besides doing other evangelistic work. When our sister was too ill to go out, she had the children come to her, and she enjoyed having them, as well as making it interesting

The report of Oma, one of your Bible-women, will be laid be-

fore you, also Miss Hooper's report of schools, &c.; so that I

need not speak further of her work.

Besides Miss Hooper's Bible-women and schools, we have supported a native preacher, under Rev. A. B. Boyer's direction. I refer to Daniel Naik. Speaking of him Mr. Boyer says: "Daniel is doing nicely. I hardly know how I could do without him." Basudeb is now in the Bible school at Midnapore, and Dr. Bachelor says he is getting along nicely. In four years, if all

goes well, he will probably be a preacher.

Mrs. Boyer's Bible-women are also doing good work. In her report she says, "Just yesterday a widow and her two children came to be Christians through their efforts." In her annual report she says: "The high caste girls' school, which I reported last year, continued in a fairly prosperous condition until the poojah vacation last October. After the poojahs, owing to the removal of the Babus to other stations, the school was deprived of every Hindu pupil, and it became necessary to close it. The work was not without results. The girls who attended regularly discontinued idol worship. I have employed two Bible-women since last July. That they were called of God to the work I have no doubt. One is the wife of Joseph Fullonton, our native pastor. She is an efficient worker. Her companion in the work is, like her, a devoted Christian. They make regular visits to certain villages, and we have reason to be thankful for the spirit of interest and inquiry that prevails among the women. In one village a prayer-meeting is held, which is attended by twelve or more Hindu women. Most of them have left off idolatry, refuse to take part in the Hindu festivals, and declare their faith in the true God. In another village a prayer-meeting is held in the house of one of our Hindu servants. The first time we went there his wife was very shy, almost afraid to show herself. However, at our request, she called together a few of her neighbors to hear the singing and listen to the Word. From that time the women visited her every week, and when I went there a few months after I found that she was not only a hearer but a Little by little she is learning the Lord's Prayer. Having never learned to read, it is difficult for her to commit to memory. I am glad to know that she is using her influence for good over her Hindu neighbors. She and her daughter are willing to break caste. Her husband, too, is almost persuaded; but he lacks what so many of his people lack-moral courage." Mrs. Boyer adds: "There are such cases of particular interest in many, if not all, the villages visited."

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The mothers here will be interested to know that another dear little girl has come to gladden their home. Little Bessie is ill, and by the doctor's order Mrs. Boyer has taken her to Midnapore. God bless the dear children, and may they grow up to be

zealous workers for the Master in that heathen land !

I cannot close my report without referring to the death of our dear Sister Ida Phillips, one whom we knew and loved for her While our hearts were made exceedingly sad to hear of her death, she has entered into that rest that remains for the people of God.

In looking over the past eleven years, while much has been done, much more might have been done. May we each ask our own consciences to day, Have we done all we could? And, if not, may we on bended knees ask the Lord, What wilt thou have

Sister Hooper's report is as follows:

My Dear Sister Weyman: - With sorrow like a pall over us to-day, because of the sad and unexpected news of Miss Ida Phillips' death, it seems difficult to write a report of the year's As you have so many reports to glean from, I will be as brief as possible.

Four schools in the villages of Swaraswatipur, Janguiy, Brahmonia, Bonapardia, or Chunpur rather, an adjacent village to which it seemed advisable to remove the school. These four schools are supported by New Brunswick. In April the District

Board granted five rupees each for two schools.

There are only one hundred and thirty-three pupils, but when we remember that these are all girls, and that no girls' schools have ever been in these villages heretofore, we think the attendance is greater in proportion than in the schools of Balasore city, where prejudice against the education of girls has been wearing

At Swaraswatipur one of the pupils, a granddaughter of the old man in whose courtyard the school is, has passed in the lower primary standard. This, after one year's attendance, seems to speak well for the teacher and also for Boodhi's capacity to receive instruction. Boodhi has left school this year to marrythe fate of all Hindoo girls. If our object were only secular education, we might well feel discouraged. Boodhi's grandfather is the old man of whom I have told you previously as a pilgrim to Gya. There are twelve or thirteen "Bows" or daughters-inlaw in this house. The shadow of death has fallen heavily upon it this year, taking away a son and a daughter, the latter the

mother of Boodhi. The son and the daughter received religious teachings more readily than the other members of the household. We have the comforting thought that they had saving faith in Jesus. The poor old mother told me one day that her son ridiculed the worshipping of idols, and had lost faith in them. With tears streaming down her cheeks, she asked me the last time I saw her, "O tell me, shall I ever see my son again?" In the bitterness of her grief, the thought that there may be a resurrection such as Christians believe in has come to her. Giving her a gospel of John with marked passages, I said, "Boodhi can read to you the beautiful words of Jesus about the resurrection." It does seem worth while after all to keep up a few schools as aids to the Bible work.

The Bible work has kept up with more than usual steadiness during the year. Twenty-five villages have been visited. In the greater number of these the work has been regular, while in others only occasional visits have been made. In two of these villages regular weekly prayer-meetings are held; in the village of Parduapada on Monday, and Ajuabad on Tuesday. Remember these meetings in your prayers. To give you a statistical idea of the work: In six months four hundred and nintey-nine houses have been visited, and eight thousand nine hundred and seventy people have listened to the Word of God read and explained by

your Bible-women.

There seems to be no opposition to the teaching of the Bible among the women. A little persecution would no doubt bring to light the results we long to see. I have noticed that in places where the women had not heard of the way before, the Spirit of the Lord seemed to have gone before and revealed to them that "this religion" was what they needed and were hungering for. In every Hindoo household there is one woman who seems to be the ruling spirit and spokeswoman for the crowd of listeners. One of these, in the village of Brahmoonia, said to us when she had heard the story of Jesus' love for the first time, "Had we heard of this before, do you suppose we would have worshipped idols till now? No." Another noticeable fact is that the men who hear the gospel preached in the bazaars seldom tell about it to the women in their homes. So we must not rest till every hungering, thirsting soul in zenana and hut has heard of Jesus.

Oma and Kokoi send their love and namaskars, and ask you to still pray for them and the work. Since the yearly meeting in January last, a class for Bible study has been formed for the native workers. Oma and Kokoi are greatly interested in it, and I feel it has been and still is a great benefit to them. Mrs.

Smith has charge of the class.

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To myself the year has been one of much physical suffering. The fall from the garrie and dislocation of my elbow in October caused quite a break in my work. Then the attack of cholera in March, succeeded by dysentery, was so serious that for several months it seemed doubtful if I would ever be able to endure fatigue again. Now, although I am very careful of my strength, I am able to drive ten miles over a rough road and walk two or three over the rice fields, all in one afternoon. This does not seem so bad after all for one who so recently was thought to have ended her work in India. In looking back I can only say, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits."

In the absence of Mrs. Babcock, the Home Secretary's Report was read by Mrs. Weyman, as follows:

Report of the Home Secretary of the F. C. B. W. F. M. Society of New Brunswick, for 1889.

Dear Sisters:—The great wheel of Time, in its never-ceasing velocity, has again brought us to the time and place of another annual meeting of our Society. At this meeting I make my first report as Home Secretary. Before proceeding I wish to offer a tribute of gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His loving kindness in sparing us all alive; although we have sustained losses and separations which have been very affecting, and often cause our hearts to ache; yet thank the dear Lord we all live, and the opportunity of working for the Master is still afforded us.

First Bistrict.

The Secretary of the First District writes:—"Our Report this year is not so encouraging as last year. The amount collected is about twelve dollars less. The amounts received from the different churches on the District are as follows. No lists of names were sent. Bath sends \$5. Wicklow, \$7.50. Upper Kent, \$1. Lower Perth, \$2. Long Island, 50 cents. Perth Centre and Arthurette, \$4. Collection at public meeting, \$4.86. Total, \$24.86."

Second District.

The Secretary of this District writes: "We have much to encourage us. The interest is steadily increasing. We have exceeded our most sanguine expectations, and we hope the day is not far distant when we can raise money enough in this District alone to support a Missionary. We appointed visiting committees and have found that wherever they have done their duty good results have followed." The Churches and Societies are reported as follows: No lists of names. Hartland Society was organized in 1879; they have had a hard struggle, but are holding on their way nobly; they send \$11. Knowlesville Society is working among the children; they send \$9.70. Lower Brighton, 21 members, raised \$19.15. They do not sustain monthly meetings. Society at Connell, sends \$11.36. They do not sustain monthly meetings. Tracy Mills Society is doing a good work, has a membership of 30, and sustains monthly prayer meetings, raised \$41.15. At Lindsay, the interest is increasing, they sustain their monthly prayer meetings, and raised \$7.74. At Third Tier it is difficult to hold monthly meetings, yet they are trying to do what they can to keep the interest alive. There are six members and thirteen coutributors. They send \$11.74. Waterville contributes \$6. Knoxford, \$5. Windsor, \$4.24. Charleston, \$2. Brookville, \$2.12. Gordonsville, \$2.98. Victoria Corner, \$8.25. Upper Brighton, \$1. Beaufort, \$1. Woodstock sustains a Union Society, with a membership of 23. They raised \$42.64; of this amount \$15.64 was given to Home Missions, leaving for foreign work, \$27. Total amount, \$171.43.

Third District.

The Secretary writes:—"In making our second Annual Report, I regret that more has not been done during the past year, but we hope yet to organize some new societies this fall, mentioning Marysville and Peniac, where the District meeting was held. The attendance was reported small, very few of the members present. Only three Societies reported at the Annual Meeting. Keswick reports in a thriving condition. They hold interesting monthly meetings and send \$18. Fredericton holds monthly meetings, has twenty-four members, sends \$34. Upper Caverhill is reported as still living, though not very flourishing. Lost some members during the year. Holds no monthly meetings. They raised \$8. The Society at Southampton did not report. They sent \$6. Marysville, no society, sends \$4. Peniac \$1.

Fourth District.

Bible women.

Resolved, That \$50 be appropriated for the payment of two Bible women employed by Miss Hooper.

Resolved, That \$100 be appropriated for the payment of the salary of Mr. Boyer's native preacher, Daniel Raik.

Resolved, That \$50 per quarter be appropriated to Miss Hooper's personal expenses.

Mrs. C. T. Phillips gave quite a lengthy address, concerning the work in Second District, and the advance that had been made both in numbers of workers, and money raised, in spite of every adverse circumstances. Miss Jane Weyman also gave cheering words in the same connection. Mrs. Hartley gove an interesting recount account of

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methods of work in local societies, &c. in Seventh District. Mention was made of the necessity for a greater know-ledge of missions, and it was thought the *Intelligencer* would be the best medium through which to reach the people and advise them of their duty in this respect. The following ladies decided to take advantage of the reduced rate of subscription, and send the paper to a number in First District, who are without it, and who, they hoped would, by becoming acquainted with it, be induced to be regular subscribers, and so be well informed as to mission work:—Mrs. Hartley, Mrs. C. W. Weyman, Mrs. Peters, Mrs. J. J. Barnes, Mrs. T. Robinson, and Mrs. J. McLeod.
