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## SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

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The Womon's Ghristian Association of Quebec.

Incorporated by Act of Parliament, 39 Vic., Cap. 69.

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## OOINSTITUTION.

1st.-The Society shall be called The Women's Christian Association, of Quebec.

2nd. - The object of the Alssociation shall be to receive young women, who come as strangers to the city ; obtaining for them board and employment; attending generally to their temporal and moral welfape ; providing a reading room, and library for young women, and premises where meetings of ladies connected with different benevolent institutions may be held, and for other benevolent purposes of a like nature.

3rd.-The Society shall be strictly undenominational.
4th.-Any person on payment of one dollar annually shall be a Member, and be entitled to vote at the annual or general meeting. 4. !

5th.-The Officers of the Association shall consist of a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and an Assistant-Secretary. The Officers, with not less than thirty other ladies, who shall be elected for that purpose at the annnal meeting, shall form the Committee of Management of the Association.

6 th. -The said committee shall have power to form a code of laws for the general regulation and management of the Association, and to fill up vacancies in their own numbers during the year, provided that nothing shall be enacted which is inconsistent with the constitution.

7th.-A committee of six gentlemen shall be elected every year at the annual meeting, whose duty shall be to advise with the ladies' committee in all matters of importance.

8th. -There shall be an annual meeting of the members of the Society held in the month of March in each year, when the committee of ladies retiring shall present a report of their transactions during the past year, a cash statement of the affairs of the Association, as well as any matters of interest or importance that they may have to submit.

9th. The fiscal year of the Association shall close on the first of March.

10th.-The visits and religious instruction of the clergy of the city of all denominations shall be gladly welcomed by the Association.

11th.-All elections shall be made by ballot.
12th.-This constitution shall not be amended, nor repealed, nor any addition made to it except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at the annual meeting.

## Çommittee of Management.

1st.-The Committee of Management shall meet on the first Tuesday in each month for the transaction of business ; five shall form a quorum. At this meeting the ladies for duty during the month shall be appointed.

2nd.-The office-bearers of the Association, with four visiting ladies, shall form an acting Committee for the month, and shall meet every Tuesday, for the transaction of ordinary business. Threesshall form a quorum.

3rd.-General meetings of the Association may be called by the President, at the request of not less than nine members thereof, and special meetings of the Committee of Management, may be called by the President at the request of not less than five of its members. Special meetings of the acting committee may be called by the President at ber discretion.


1st.- The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings ; strictly preserve order, to appoint Committees, and to be arbitress in all debates.

2nd. -The first Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall act in her stead; in the absence of both, one of the other Vice-Presidents, in the absence of all these officers the Committee shall elect a President pro tem.

3rd, -The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive subscriptions and donations, and make all payments authorized by the


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Committee, she shall keep a list of the inmates, and, when absent, send her book for inspection.

4th. -The duty of the Secretary shall be to take minutes of and record the names of the members of the Committee present at each meeting, to read the reports of Committees and the minutes of the last meeting, and to prepare and read the annual report and correspondence.

5th.-The duty of the Assistant-Secretary shall be to notify all officers and members of the Committee of Management of their election, and members of sub-committees of their appointment, to answer all letters, and keep a list of members and their addresses.

## Order of Business.

1st.-The meetings shall open and close with prayer.
2nd.-The meeting shall be called to order, after which no person to speak, except on the subject onder discussion.

3rd.-Reading the minutes of last meeting.
4th.-Recording the names of the members of Committee present.

5th.-Reading correspondence.
6th.-Reading reports of Committees.
7th.-Resolutions, Propositions, Debates.
8th.-Reading minutes of the present meeting.

## Ladies on Duty.

Ist. -The four ladies on duty for the month shall arrange among themselves the division of their duties.

2nd.-One or more of them shall visit the rooms daily ; see that order and cleanliness exist throughout the establishment, take note of and report, for the information of the acting Committee, any matters of interest or importance in connection with the affairs of the Association to which their attention has been directed during the week.

- 1st. - The Matron will carry out all the rules of the establishment, and endeavor in every way to obey the orders of the ladies on duty.

2nd.-She will have prayers with the inmates every morning and evening.

3rd. -She will see that all meals are properly cooked and served, and promote in every way the health and comfort of the inmates.

4th. -She will examine the persons and boxes of inmates on first entering and on leaving, and superintend a thorough ablution.

5th. -She will be especially careful to see that no spirituous liquors are brought into the house, expect by the order of the attending physician.

6th.-At the end of each month she will report to the ladies on duty any luss or breakage of the house property that may have occurred during the month.

## SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

of

## The otumen's Christian gissociation.

During the past year this Association has continued to increase in prosperity and usefulness, and it is with a deep sense of gratitude that we are again permitted to record the confidence and support of the public, the comfort and well-being of the inmates, and the spirit of cordial harmony existing among the members.

At the beginning of the year there were eight boarders ; since then 59 have been admitted, making a total of 67 , of whom 13 remain. During the autumn the rooms were filled to overflowing, and considerable expense was incurred in adapting them to the necessities of the institution. Death has entered and released a patient sufferer; and a young girl, who had been a member of our household for over two years, has been transported to the realms beyond.

We have received 11 emigrants this year, one of whom came out under the auspices of the Women's Emigration Society, and is doing well. We would gladly do all in our power to facilitate the arrival and forwarding of domestic servants, and
pledge ourselves to obtain situations for any number who can be well recommended as to character and ability. It appears, however, from all accounts, and even from the constitution of the society, that there is no redundancy of servants in England, and the majority of those most desirous to emigrate are nnaccustomed to manual labor, and not qualified for governesses. The great difficulty seems to be in the want of practical training for any remunerative employment, and with all due respect to the promoters of emigration, we still adhere to the opinion that an influx of such a class would be more likely to retard than to adrance the progress of a new country. The vicissitudes of the last few years have shown the expediency of providing every girl, whatever her station, with a means of support, not necessarily for lucrative employment, but as something to fall back upon if thrown upon her own resources, or for the benefit of others. A very admirable work is being done by the New York Association in providing free classes for instruction in book-keeping, phonography, type writing and other useful occupations. and these classes are eagerly sought by young women whose deficiency of early education would otherwise prevent them earning a moderate competence. It is now generally admitted that women are not incapacitated by nature from pursuing high and noble attainments without departing from their natural sphere, and the exercise and development of the
talents God has given would do much to prevent the aimless drifting into hapless connexions, so often the precursor of endless misery and pauperism.

We received an invitation to send delegates to the International Conference held in St. Louis, last October, and we regret exceedingly that we were again obliged to deny ourselves this opportunity of taking sweet counsel together. Special meetings were held here for the discussion of subjects connected with the work, and we sent a telegram of greeting from 2nd Colossians, 5 th, 6 th, 7 th rerses. The reports of the Conference have just been received and from the various accounts, and also from the able and comprehensive paper on "Boarding Homes," we find that our Association is doing almost exactly the same work as the others, differing essentially only in one respect. In large cities where there are institutions for all sorts and conditions of people, the boarding homes are intended only for young women supporting themselves by their own exertions, while our doors are open to respectable women of all classes. No respectable applicantis refused admission when there is accommodation, and in cases of emergency this institution has proved a Refuge for the destitute, a Convalescent Home and an Asylum for the aged and infirm.

During the summer, when some of the regular boarders are always absent, many of the Associations have established the custom of receiving
ladies travelling alone, and desiring to remain a short time in the city. This plan was adopted here last summer, and the accommodation, though somewhat crude, appeared to give satisfaction to those who availed themselves of it, and next year we hope to be better prepared for travellers.

The reports of the boarding hoines which are kept exclusively for the one class, agree that when once the house is owned and furnished, the institution can be made selfsupporting, and they have been most successful in raising the necessary funds, some by steady and persistent effort, others by the exercise of faith alone. Stimulated by these examples and encouraged by the many manifestations of Divine approval on our own behalf, we resolved to lay the matter before our Great Counsellor, and a special prayer meeting for this purpose was held in October. Humbly and reverently, distrustful of our own powers, yet with perfect confidence in Him, whose "strength is made perfect in weakness," we besought the Lord to consider our petition. Before many days, we received a cheque for $\$ 200$ from the estate of the late Francis Laurie. Esq., and shortly afterwards Messrs. Dobell \& Beckett repeated their former generous donation of $\$ 100$. With these sums, together with the proceeds of the Harvest Concert, the Wax-Work Exhibition, the annual sale of work, and the balance of last year's account, we have been enabled to lay aside the sum of one thousand dollars towards a building fund. This

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leares us very bare of funds for running expenses, but wo believe that our Master, whose we are and whom we try to serve, requires an evidence of faith, and ours is well grounded, for in all our dealings with Him, we have realized that He is able to supply all our need. We have asked Him for a great thing and we doubt not His power to grant, but our own fitness to receive, for "If ye abide in me and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will and it shall be done unto you." All the Associations of this kind, which are doing so much good in almost every part of the world testify to the efficacy of prayer, and have been established and sustained "Not by might, nor by power, but by the Spirit of the Lord of Hosts." The way has not yet been opened to us for any special effort and without presuming to decide which of the methods of raising money is most efficacious, we have left the matter in the Lord's hands, desiring that He will grant us the necessary grace, whether it be patience to wait or diligence to work.

The expenditure this year has been very large, as many household requisites were needed. We have also been fortunate in receiving contributions of furniture, and through the kindness of Mrs. J. Fry and Mrs. W. Hossack, the dining-room, sittingroom and stairs have been carpetted.

Our sewing meetings are pleasant and helpful reunions, free from the formality of business meetings and yet serving as auxiliaries to them
for discussing the best means of adrancing the cause so dear to our hearts. The directors of the Y. M. C. A. have kindly offered the use of the gymnasium, should it be ready by December, for our next sale, and with this incentive added to that of raising the building fund, the Committee hope to make the sale more extensive and attractive than heretofore, and would earnestly solicit contributions for the purpose. This work especially commends itself to ladies with time and means at their disposal, to devote a portion of these gifts on behalf of those who may once have known the richest blessings of home and affluence. This is not a charity in the ordinary acceptance of the word, any more than a College or University endowed by public grants and bequests, the great object of the Association being to help those who are able and willing to help themselves, and to prevent voluntary dependence by promoting industry and self-reliance.

The Matron, Mrs. Cochrane, continues to discharge her duties with zeal and discretion, and by her tact and kindness contributes in no small degree to the serenity and cheerfulness of the Home.

Through the kindness of Miss Oliver, the Committee of the late Coffee-Room and other friends, the library has been greatly enlarged and now boasts of some 200 or 300 volumes, affording much pleasure and profit to the inmates.

The Association has become affiliated with the

Young Women's Christian Association of Great Britain, exchanging reports and items of interest.

The annual entertainment to the poor took place last week; and the usual sum of money has been voted to Miss Latimer for out-door relief.

Visits continue to be paid to the Jeffery Hale, the Hotel Dien, and the Marine Hospitals : also, to the jail and the different districts.

The collection for the rent has again been very successful, and our best thanks are due to all who responded so liberally. Owing to illness and other causes, the collection in the St. Louis ward has not yet been completed, but will be taken up at the earliest opportunity.

The Government grant of $\$ 200$ was received last month, and is thankfully acknowledged; also, the services of T. H. Oliver, Esq., in obtaining the same.

Our rooms are much in request for women's work of all kinds, and the following is a list of the regular meetings :-

Monday afternoon, sewing meeting of the Indore Mission.

Tuesday afternoon, Association prayer and business meetings.

Second Wednesday in the month, meeting of the Band of Hope.

Thursday afternoon, Asssociation sewing meeting.

Friday afternoon, sewing meeting of the Cathedral Guild.

Friday evening, Bible Reading, open to all.
The room is occupied by the Kindergarten during the morning.

A Painting Olass was held for a few weeks, which was terminated suddenly by the untimely death of the teacher.

The rooms were used for distributing clothing sent by the Relief Committee to the sufferers by the late fire ; and for many other incidental purposes.

In addition to the favors already mentionned, we are indebted for many others: To Messrs. Allans, Rae \& Co., for half the proceeds of the exhibition of the steamer "Parisian," last May; to John J. Foote, Esq, in, continuing to reduce the rent of the house occupied by the Association; to Dr. Marsden, for medical attendance ; to Mr. W. F Lemesurier, for a cord of hardwood last winter; to an unknown friend, for a copy of the last directory ; to the St. Andrew's Society, for assisting to furnish a ticket for a poor wayfarer to Cape Breton ; to Mr. Stanley, for a large supply of stationery ; to Miss Latimer, for disposing of a number of articles on board the "Miramichi" last summer ; to the Editors of the Morning Chronicle and Faith and Works, for regular editions of those papers; to Mr. Thom, for plumber's work free of charge ; for a barrel of flour, a clock, an ice-pitcher, vegetables, milk, furniture, parcels of clothing, Christmas donations, and contributions to the Flower Mission and the several entertainments, from various kind friends.

To these and to all who have rendered assistance in any way, we beg to tender our grateful acknowledgments.

This is a very brief and imperfect outline, for while we rejoice to tell how great things the Lord hath done for us, yet in all home and missionary life, much must necessarily remain unrecorded. The failures and errors which have occurred from "leaning to our own understanding," as well as the success which has been vouchsafed, illustrate the necessity of "continuing instant in prayer," and we desire in the coming year to submit ourselves more entirel ${ }^{\prime}$ to the guidance of Him who has said "I will instruct thee and teach thee the way which thou shalt go ; I will guide thee with mine eye."

## Secretary-Ireasurer of the Sewing Committee.

During the past year, the sewing meetings were held regularly, with the exception of the summer months, when owing to the heat, and the absence of many of the members in the country, they were discontinued.

While the interest, and industry displayed by the few who attend, have contributed largely to the success of this branch of the Association's work, still the Committee cannot help regretting that the general attendance has always been so small, for as a means of making the members better acquainted with each other, for promoting social converse, and also for discussing different phases of Christian work, these weekly reunions have been found very interesting and profitable. The reading of some instructive book has usually formed a part of these meetings, but this is not always practicable, owing to the noise made by the sewing machine.

We are also glad to report, that to the energy and zeal of two of our members, Mrs. Fyfe and Mrs. Jacobs, a good sewing machine has lately been purchased. The sum of $\$ 16$, and the old machines were given in exchange ; this amount

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was not taken from the general fund of the Association, but made up by subscription among the members of the sewing society.

A number of our useful and fancy articles were given to Miss Latimer, who with her usual kindness undertook the disposal of them during the summer months on board the S. S. Miramichi.
