REPORT OF SESSION.

THE duty of reporting at the close of another year again devolves on the Session, and in doing so we thank and praise the Lord for his bountiful goodness to us as a congregation during the past and former years.

The call extended to the Rev. Robert Johnston of Lindsay having been declined, after some delay, a very largely signed call was presented to the Rev. D. C. Hossack of Orangeville to become our settled pastor. On his acceptance Mr. Hossack was inducted into the pastorate on Tuesday, April 18th, under the most favorable circumstances. A new era having thus been opened up in the history of the congregation, as might have been expected, it has gone on during the remainder of the year making rapid strides in the line of prosperity.

The various meetings of the church in all its branches together with the Sabbath attendance have increased largely, the weekly prayer meeting being well sustained throughout the various seasons.

We have to record, with deep thankfulness to our Heavenly Father, that an increasing number have united

themselves by profession in the full membership of the church; while an accession of new members by certificate is always a matter of gratification, yet the heart-felt desire of God's people is always for an awakening among those who have not hitherto taken an open stand on the Lord's side.

The Session desire to recognize the faithful work done in the Sunday-school and Bible classes and to note with joy that a large number of scholars have made open profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

A call having been made for an addition to the eldership, the congregation responded by electing six, of whom Mr. Alex. Fraiser, Mr. Gilbert Telfer, Mr. J. C. Shook and Mr. Thomas Leeming, accepted the responsibilities of the office. The districts have been re-arranged in such a way as to permit of a better oversight of the congregation than ever before.

The reporting and the welcoming of strangers to our church is a matter that every member ought to feel an interest in; a word of invitation to a new-comer or indifferent one, or a notification sent to pastor or elder often produces the happiest results. Let no one neglect the opportunity of sharing in the work of bringing wandering ones into the Master's kingdom.

A larger number than in any previous year have been removed by death from our midst. Their names we trust are written in the Lamb's Book of Life.

The congregation are reminded, as they were last year, that the Sunday-school is crowded far beyond its proper capacity. The teachers are very much hindered in their work and the growth of the school curtailed. The hope of the church is in its young people, and the work among them is the most important of all its enterprises. We trust that the congregation will take into serious consideration the necessity of more adequate accommodation.

The various branches of church work are heartily commended to the congregation, and the members are earnestly advised to unite themselves to some department of it as a means of spiritual good to others as well as themselves.

The services of the choir are gladly recognized, and the self-sacrificing labors of the officers and members of the various societies are deserving of the highest commendation.

MANAGERS' REPORT

THE Board of Managers in presenting this, their fifteenth Annual Report, beg leave to draw the attention of the congregation to their financial statement, which shows the revenue from envelope and open collections for the past year to be \$5,940.55.

The Board regrets that the envelope system of Sabbath offering is not being as universally adopted by the congregation as it ought to be, as the number now contributing by that system, 272, although an increase over last year, is still less than the number in 1891. The offering so contributed for the year is \$4,478.65, being \$58.68 less than for the year 1892, and \$228.68 less than for the year 1891.

The open collections have increased in both of the years 1892 and 1893, but that increase is not commensurate with the falling off in the envelope contributions, and the large increase in the membership; and the Board would again urge on the congregation the advisability of systematic giving by envelope. The open collection was \$1,461.90, an increase of \$279.92 over that of 1892. The average total collection per Sabbath was \$112.00 as against \$110.00 in 1892, and \$111.50 in 1891.

The Board would remind the congregation that before incurring further liability, an effort should be made to reduce the mortgage indebtedness on the church property.

The floating debt was reduced during the year \$670.32, while in 1892 it was reduced \$1051.22 and in 1891 \$1000.00.

PEW SECRETARY'S REPORT

The church is seated to accommodate 1023 persons ; 639 on the main floor and 384 in the gallery. Out of this number 934 are allocated, leaving 89 sittings vacant.

We have on our books at the present time applications for 60 sittings, and as there has been a very large increase in the membership of the congregation during the past year there must be a large number of both members and adherents who have not yet put in their applications.

The majority of the vacant sittings are, of course, not in the most desirable part of the church, but in the rear end of the gallery and the rear seats of the main floor.

At the beginning of the year

174 families occupied 593 sittings on main floor.
82 " " 239 " in the gallery.

And at the present time

193 families occupy 619 sittings on main floor.
101 " " 315 " in the gallery.

or a total increase of 38 families and 102 sittings.

During the year we have asked 22 persons or families to give up, if possible, some of the sittings which they held, and we have received from 19 of these, 30 sittings—23 on main floor and 7 in gallery.

We must thank the members and adherents for their patience and hope that they will extend to the Pew Secretary of 1894 the same consideration and kindness that they have extended to us.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The year 1893 has been a progressive one in the history of our school. A larger number than in any previous year have declared themselves to be on the Lord's side by publicly uniting themselves with the church. We thank God for this manifestation of His love and mercy.

As an adjunct to Sunday-school work, a temperance society has been organized among the scholars, under the name of the "Parkdale Presbyterian Temperance Circle." Already a large number have joined the Circle and great interest is taken in the meetings. These are being conducted by Mr. Torrance Jack, assisted by Misses Pennal, Stanners and Spence.

In point of numbers our school is larger than ever, consequently the classes are more crowded than ever before, especially in the primary department. We are unable to increase the number of our classes owing to lack of space and can only make room by increasing the size of these classes, which in most cases are now too large and too close together. We stand in sore need of an enlarged or new building, and it is hoped that the congregation will, at no distant day, provide increased accommodation. The teachers have been most faithful in the discharge of their duties but the success of their work has been greatly hindered by the inadequacy of the building. Notwithstanding this drawback we have to acknowledge God's goodness in permitting us to engage in so hopeful and important work, and in sealing our labors with tokens of His recognition.

MISSION FIELDS

Indians—In the Dominion 109,000. We have 14 stations and 26 missionaries employed. There are 9 boarding schools and 4 day schools, 250 pupils in all.

Formosa—Dr. G. L. MacKay has labored there for 22 years, Rev Wm. Gauld now assisting him. There are now 60 churches ministered to by 60 native preachers, with 1800 communicants and 2800 baptized members. Oxford College with 22 students preparing for the ministry. A Girls' School with 36 in attendance. The MacKay Hospital (named after Mrs. MacKay, of Windsor, who gave the funds for its erection) in

which about 18,000 were treated last year. There are 25 Bible Women who devote their time to the ministry of the Word, and 8 day schools with about 250 children.

Central India—This whole province has a population of about 10,000,000. In the southern half of the province our church has been working since 1877. There are 5 cities occupied.

Indore—A city of 83,000. There Mr. Wilkie is the ordained missionary. The lady missionaries in Indore are Dr. O'Hara, Dr. Turnbull, Miss Sinclair, Miss Greir, Miss White, Miss Dougan. Mr. Wilkie is in charge of a college, which is only half completed for want of funds. Doctors O'Hara and Turnbull are in charge of the hospital. Miss Sinclair is in charge of the girls' boarding school. The other three ladies who went to India in 1893 will give themselves to zenana and educational work.

Mhow—Population, 27,000. Two ordained missionaries labor here, Rev. N. H. Russell and Rev. F. H. Russell. The lady missionaries are Dr. Fraser, Miss Ross and Miss Calder.

Neemuch—Population, 18,000 or 20,000. Rev. W. A. Wilson and Rev. W. J. Jamieson are the two ordained missionaries and Dr. Maggie McKellar, Miss Jamieson and Miss Duncan the lady missionaries.

Rutlam—Population, 31,000. Rev. J. Fraser Campbell and Mrs. Campbell have been alone in this city since the mission was started. Besides the many other agencies at work Mr. Campbell publishes a small monthly journal called the *Gyan Patrika* and also publishes the *Indian Standard* which represents the Indian Presbyterian Alliance.

Ujjain—Population, 33,000. Dr. Buchanan and Mrs. Buchanan, who is also a doctor, have been laboring about three years in this field. It is one of the sacred cities of India, and is therefore much under Brahmin influence and difficult to work.

These five cities are all connected by railroad and the extremes only 160 miles apart. Every point needs reinforcements.

Honan—This large province in Inland Northern China has a population of about 23,000,000. We have ten missionaries employed there, laboring at two points that are about 50 miles apart.

Chu Wang—Rev. D. MacGillivray, Rev. J. Goforth, Dr. McClure, Dr. Malcolm, Rev. W. Grant.

Hsin Cheng—Dr. Smith, Rev. M. McKenzie, Dr. Lucinda Graham and Miss McIntosh. Rev. K. McLennan is on the way to Honan, and Rev. J. MacVicar is at home on account of his wife's health. Mr. J. A. Slimmon is appointed and will go next fall. Already 6 have been baptized and 30 others are interested and enquiring about the way. The natives have been exceedingly hostile—in every possible way trying to drive our missionaries away, but they have held their ground in spite of opposition, and we believe will be in the future rewarded with a harvest of souls.

Chinese, Victoria, B.C.—There are in the Dominion 8,000 or 9,000 Chinese, of these about 3,000 are in Victoria. For their sake and our own it is important that these foreigners should be brought under gospel influences. Hence the appointment of Rev. A. B. Winchester, who is assisted by Mr. C. A. Colman.

Haifa, Palestine—Dr. Webster is now definitely at work in Haifa, a city of about 6,000 with 1,500 Jews, at the foot of Mt. Carmel, on the Plain of Acre.

New Hebrides—This is our oldest mission, started in 1848 by Dr. Geddie. It is under the control of the Eastern Church. We have three missionaries there, Rev. H. A. Robertson in Erromanga; Rev. J. W. McKenzie in Efate and Rev. Jos. Amand in Santo. Besides these 8 other churches are represented in the New Hebrides group. There are in all about 14,000 church members.

Trinidad—This is the most southern island of the West Indies. It has a population of about 220,000 and of these 75,000 are coolies from India, brought over to labor on the sugar and cocoa plantations. It is amongst these our missionaries are laboring. There are 7 ordained missionaries and 4 lady teachers. There are 51 schools with about 6,000 pupils. There are 55 native students and preachers, and about 600 in the full membership of the church. This mission is also under the care of the eastern section of our church.

THE eight years' work of this auxiliary is now numbered with the past, and from its report may we all as Christian women learn to be more faithful, that this Society may abound in grace and liberality.

We are sorry to report a decrease in membership, having only fifty-nine on the roll—twenty-one being members of the general society, and four life members—with an average attendance of thirty-four. The contributions are also less, probably owing to the lowering of the fee, which is now twenty-five cents; but we believe there has been an increase of spiritual life in our meetings, more being ready to offer

prayer, also more scripture texts on a given subject were repeated at roll-call. At several meetings Bible study was taken up in connection with the devotional exercises, and members have given extracts from the leaflets instead of reading the letters.

In May the members were pleased to welcome Mrs. Hossack, the pastor's wife, and we believe her coming among us has proved a blessing to the Society.

The annual thank-offering service was held as an open meeting on the evening of Wednesday, October 18. While it was full of interest and attended by many, the offering, amounting to \$74.50, was less than last year.

The members presented a handsomely framed life-membership certificate to the secretary, as a token of their appreciation of her services since the organization of the Society.

A larger quantity of clothing than usual was prepared for the Indians of the Northwest. Sewing meetings were held weekly for two months. Nine quilts and a number of warm woollen garments, to the value of \$111.25, were made for women and children, and a scripture text card was attached to each article.

In closing we earnestly invite all to join us in this service of love, that the W.F.M.S. may more efficiently aid in winning the "World for Christ."


