A vote of thanks was passed to Dr. Murray, the retiring president. The steamship service between Campbellton and Gaspe has been occupying the attention of the Board for some time. A committee was appointed at a previous meeting to get information on this matter, and this committee had sent out circulars to the business firms doing business along the route. Many replies had been received and all with the exception of one or two had condemned the service as rendered last season, and were in favor of going back to the twice a week service between Campbellton and Gaspe.
The committee, which is composed of Messrs. John Harquail, P. M. Shannon and F. M. Anderson, were authorized to have a strong memorial drafted and sent to the Department of Trade and Commerce, and to the county representatives and Mr. W. S. Montgomery.
After passing a number of accounts, the meeting adjourned.

ANNIVERSARY OF POPULAR PASTOR

Rev. E. P. Wallace Celebrates His Twenty Fifth Anniversary of Ordination

Tuesday, January 26th, was a red letter day among our Roman Catholic brethren, marking as it did the twenty fifth anniversary of the Rev. Fr. Wallace's ordination to the priesthood.
Rev. E. P. Wallace was ordained priest on January 26th, 1890, and was appointed pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Snows in September 1894, succeeding Rev. Fr. MacDonald, so that nearly 22 years of his priesthood have been spent in Campbellton. Many changes have taken place during the years that the Rev. Father has been in charge of this parish. At the time of his appointment, the little church that the congregation worshipped in had a seating capacity of about three hundred, and although a school and hospital were in operation, the property was heavily burdened with debt. During the course of the years under the present pastor the church was enlarged to double the seating capacity, and the debt on the hospital was cleared off. In July 1908 the corner-stone of a large and splendidly equipped hospital was laid, the prop-

erty representing an expenditure of \$30,000, but this in common with the rest of the town was swept away in the great conflagration of 1910. At a conservative estimate it is computed that property to the value of \$75,000, belonging to the congregation was destroyed at that time.
Undaunted by this great reverse, Father Wallace, supported by the loyal help of his people replaced the church with a temporary building, and rebuilt the present hospital and school. So well was the work arranged that those in charge were enabled to carry on the services of the Hospital, the school and the church almost without intermission.
The next important movement affecting the welfare of the parish was the procuring of the present church site at the corner of Central and Patterson Streets, including the present presbytery and outbuildings, involving an outlay of upwards of \$15,000. This site is one of the best in town for the purpose of erecting a church, overlooking the river and being in the heart of the town. Owing to the present unsettled business conditions, nothing has been definitely agreed upon as to the construction of an edifice, adequate to the requirements of the parish at the present date.
To meet the growing needs of this large parish the same services are held twice each Sunday, and this considering the need of two languages entails an immense amount of work and labour on the part of the incumbent, hence the enthusiasm with which this spontaneous movement to celebrate the 25th anniversary of this popular pastor and preacher was taken up.
At ten o'clock on Tuesday morning Solemn High Mass was celebrated at the church before a crowded congregation. The Rev. jubilarian was the celebrant and he was assisted by Rev. Fr. Sormany of Robertsville, a former classmate and dear friend, as Deacon, and Rev. Fr. M. J. Wallace of Louisbourg, C. B. a brother of the pastors, as Sub-Deacon. The masters of ceremonies were Rev. Jos. Cormier, formerly of Campbellton now of Douglas-town, and Rev. R. Hawkes of Bartibogue. His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, Auxiliary of Chatham, assisted in the Sanctuary, the following clergymen also participating in the celebration, Rev. A. A. Boucher of Dalhousie, Rev. Mary le Beau, Superior of Carquet College, Rev. Fr. Finnegan of St. Thomas' College, Chatham, Rev. Fr. Pacificque, O. M. C. of St. Anne de Restigouche, Rev. Fr. Crumley of Blackville, Rev. E. S. LIQUOR STORE IS BURGLARIZED HERE

N. Bernatchez's Store Broken Into Early Wednesday Morning. Goods and Cash Stolen

Early on Wednesday morning the wholesale liquor store of Mr. N. Bernatchez on Water Street was broken into and a quantity of liquor as well as cash stolen.
The thieves gained entrance by smashing the plate glass in the front door, and made a choice selection of four or five cases of gin, scotch whiskey, brandy and champagne, as well as ransacking the register and removing about \$18 in cash.
Information was conveyed to the police and yesterday afternoon they arrested two men on the charge of breaking and entering. A quantity of the liquor was found at the homes of the two men involved, and they appeared this morning before Police Judge Matheson, when the case was adjourned till tomorrow.

TURKISH INVASION OF EGYPT HAS BEGUN

German Survivors Say Kolberg Was Sunk as Well as Blucher. Air Craft Mistake

(Special to Graphic)
London, Jan. 28th.—The Turkish invasion of Egypt has begun. An engagement was fought on Tuesday, the place not mentioned and the Turks were driven back.
An official report was given out in Paris of a fierce sudden attack by the Germans on Tuesday night to the North east of Soissons. The Germans after a violent fusillade exploded a number of mines, destroying the Allies trenches. The enemy gained a foothold at LeCreute, but the French advanced at other points making satisfactory gains.
London, Jan. 28th.—German survivors of Sunday's battle arriving here say that the cruiser Kolberg was sunk along with the Blucher. The statement is also made that German air-craft mistook the sinking Blucher for a British ship and dropped bombs on her. This may account for the German report that one British vessel was sunk.
When sighted by Vice-Admiral Beatty's squadron, the enemy's ships were only thirty miles from the English coast.
London, Jan. 28th.—Negotiations were today concluded whereby Roumania borrows \$25,000,000 from England.
A confirmation of the recent forecasts that the Canadian parliament will be asked to agree to a war vote of \$1,000,000,000 at next session of parliament was made by Sir Geo. E. Foster at the Canadian Club, Montreal yesterday.
The Germans made a fierce effort near Soissons and gained some ground at great sacrifice of life, on the other hand the allies make corresponding gains winning ground from the Germans.
Petrograd reports minor successes over Germans and Turks, but no decisive engagement.

CANADIAN EXPRESS CO. ABOUT TO CELEBRATE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

Within a few days, the Canadian Express Company as such, will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary, letters patent having been granted to the forwarding company under this name by the Federal Government early in February, 1865. The original name of the company was the British American Express, established in the early '50's, when it operated stage lines during the winter months, supplementing these with steamboat connections during the months when water navigation was possible.
 The Canadian Express is therefore actually older than the Grand Trunk Railway System, on which it operates to-day, although the Grand Trunk was the second railway opened on this continent. As early as 1858 a branch office had been opened in Liverpool, and for many years this was the only express company with headquarters in America having offices in Great Britain. WOOD ASHES AS A POTASSIC FERTILIZER

The ashes of wood have long been recognized as a fertilizer of very considerable value, indeed they are in agriculture—Canada, practicing agriculture they have been highly prized, especially for clover, grapes and fruit trees and leafy crops generally, on sandy and light loams and it was only with the advent of the German potash salts that their use fell off, though, of course, their production in decreasing quantities of late years, owing to the disappearance of our forests, has been an important factor in making it more and more difficult for the farmer in the older settled districts to obtain them.
 They are essentially a potassic fertilizer, ashes of good quality, that is, dry, unmixd with sand, etc., and leached, containing between 4 per cent and 6 1/2 per cent potash—the average potash content being about 5 1/2 per cent. This potash is in a soluble form and hence immediately available for crop use; moreover the writer considers that it exists in these ashes in a condition (the carbonate) much more favourable for the nutrition of plants than that in the German compounds and should be worth at least 1 cent per pound more than in the latter. There is in fact no better potassic fertilizer.
 In addition to their potash they contain some 2 per cent phosphoric acid and from 20 to 30 per cent carbonate of lime, enhancing their fertilizing value and making them, in a sense, an all-round fertilizer required by crops. And, further, their correct acid condition is detrimental to the thrif of most farm crops. The German potash salts are of no value for neutralizing acidity.
 Naturally, genuine wood ashes are somewhat variable in composition, depending partly on the nature of the wood producing them and partly on the care with which they have been collected and stored. Willful adulteration of a gross character has been occasionally detected in connection with the addition of sand and other inert matter and teaching being the most common forms of adulteration.
 There is a general belief that ashes from hardwoods, as a class, are richer in potash than those from soft woods but our analyses scarcely confirm this impression. As might be expected, woods differ very considerably in their potash content and the ashes of twigs and boughs are much richer than those of trunk woods. Pine and other soft woods as a rule contain less ash than the hardwoods and are much lighter in character and it is this latter quality of property we think that has given rise to the common belief mentioned. According to our results we can not find that weight for weight the ashes of soft wood are much, if any, poorer than those from hard woods.
 Our advice in these time must, therefore, be to conserve more carefully the home source of potash, not merely collecting the ashes from the house stoves but burning such brush piles, old roots, etc., as may result from the clearing of land, pruning of orchards, etc., and saving the resulting ashes. Storage in a shed or receptacle protected from the weather is essential to prevent deterioration. Their application is best deferred till spring, broadcasting, preferably on a quiet damp day, on the ploughed land and incorporating with a thorough harrowing.
 For clover, corn and mangels, they will be found very valuable. Especially are they beneficial for orchards and for grapes on sandy loams. For turnips, mixed with one-third to one-half their weight of bone meal, they have similarly proved advantageous. But indeed there are few crops on light and gravelly soils, as also on vegetable loams inclined to be sour, for which wood ashes cannot be employed with profit.

THINKING OF OTHERS
 By Mrs. E. Blackhall.
 Read at the W. C. T. U. meeting, Jan. 12th, 1915.
 A wonderful subject with unlimited possibilities and with a world wide scope. We have only to look through the pages of history to understand how it has inspired men and women through all the ages. It is both a national and individual characteristic. For centuries it has been a constant source of dispute among logicians and psychologists whether it is possible to think, without the aid of language.
 There is indeed a habit, for which we are concerned with this argument, as we have one of the most versatile of languages to aid us. Capel Loft, says; in his curious book on self-formation, that no person has ever written on the "Art of Meditation", he goes further than this, and says that not one man in twenty ever does it, but he thinks which he means that very few men think to any purpose or with any system. Most of the people in the world, take their opinions ready made from the newspapers or their neighbours, or in general from the fashion.
 There is indeed a habit, for which two causes could be found of taking it for granted, that men cannot control their thoughts. It is said squarely, that the thoughts come or go wholly without the choice or power of the man. But this is not the theory of the great men, of the real leaders. They bid us control our thoughts, that is to learn to think, just as we control any other appetites. Paul tells us what we are to think of, and he goes on to the other matter, which is more dangerous and tells us what we are to think of. There are things which are not even to be spoken of, and with an allowable paradox, Paul tells us what they are. It is only writers of a lower grade who seem to take for granted that you must let thoughts go or come at their reckless pleasure, or by the mere chance of what may be the condition of the circulation of blood upon their heads. Such writers if they were pressed would have to say that you are not to undertake any control of bodily appetites, any more than you undertake the control of mental processes. But the truth is that man is master of mind, and of body. This is the privilege of a child of God, and a true man asserts his empire and uses it. It would be impossible for him to begin all of a sudden in such control, if he had never used it before. But he can learn how to gain such control. He can have more today than he had last Tuesday, and he can have more next Tuesday than he has today. This is what is meant by learning to think. Thus a woman may train her memory to do better work for her this year than it did last year.
 Thousands of women have first been inspired to think of others through their church sewing circle and missionary societies. Also the widely spread Women's Christian Temperance Union organizations, have had much to do with enabling her to find herself. Women of today, because they have been persistently thinking of the needs of others, have learned to write papers, address audiences, to preside over meetings, to organize committees, and it has developed in them a distinct responsibility in a great many branches of endeavor. And as our responsibility toward others develops within us, so will our capacities mature, and our field of usefulness be enlarged.
 "Within thyself some dormant seedling lies just waiting for the tillage of thy will to aid its growth."
