Event Just Passed which Occurs
Only Once in a Century. Ash Wednesday, just passed, was ren-lered remarkable by the fact that it ccurred on the 10th of March, the lates day on which it can possibly fall. Such a case has not happened this century and will not again occur in it. Such a late date for Ash Wednesday occurs only once in each century, that is, going backwards, in the years 1734, 1666, 1546, 1451, (it did not occur in the 14th century), 1204, 1109, 1014, and 919. This remarkable fact can be understood only by an explanation of the meaning of Ash Wednesday and its relation to Easter, which fixes the date of all the great moveable feasts of the ecclesiastical great moveable feasts of the ecclesiastical year. The earlier churches did not commence Lent till the first Sunday after Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is always 45 days before Easter. The ecclesiastical calendar, which is adopted in the Catholic and most of the Protestant countries of Europe, is lunar solar, being regulated partly by the solar and partly by the lunar year, and this gives rise to the distinction between moveable and mmoveable feasts. Easter governs all moveable feasts. From the beginning of the second cen-tury of the Christian era great disputes arose among the Christians about the oper time of celebrating Easter. The Jews celebrated their passover on the fourteenth day of every month, that is to say the lunar month of which the four-

teenth day either falls on or next follows the day of the vernal equinox. Most Christian sects agree that Easter should be celebrated on a Sunday. the moon, and were called heretic ere producing scandal in the church se council of Nice, 325 A.
