A CHARGE OF MISREPRESENTATION REFUTED.

The Farmer complains that the *Gleaner* has maliciously misrepresented Mr. Wetmore's position in the question of biennial sessions. We would be sorry to misrepresent anybody, least of all the leader of the Opposition, whose course upon all political subjects is a great deal more inimical to his political success and the welfare of his party than anything which we could devise. The grounds of the Farmer's complaint is that we charged Mr. Wetmore with having favored biennial sessions only a week ago, and with subsequently receding from that position. Let us see what the record says, not our record, but Mr. Wetmore's own, the words being taken down from his lips by a short-hand reporter, corrected by himself and published in his own organ: "I therefore consider," said Mr. Wetmore, "it might and should be a grave matter for the consideration of the House whether we could not dispense with some of the sessions we are holding." We have italicized two words in the foregoing quotation, and we ask Mr. Wetmore candidly to say if he does not think that in using them he laid himself open to the charge of favoring biennial sessions. If Mr. Wetmore had simply said that the House might consider the question in view of the many demands upon the revenue, he could, perhaps, claim that he was only uttering a word of warning, although the language would scarcely warrant such a construction. But his language is that the decrease in the number of the sessions "should be a grave matter for the consideration of the House," not in the future, but now. There are no words of qualification, and the idea is perfectly consistent with what he went on to say. We again quote from the short-hand report:—

"As a matter of course, I feel the great necessity of at all times and under all circumstances bringing the government of the country as near to the people of the country as they can be brought. I see the necessity of frequently bringing the actions of the representatives of the people under the notice of the country as possible, but, sir, if after all said and done it should be the question whether we can afford it or not, though it might be advisable if we have not got the money to do so, and if with a view to retrenchment and economy, it would be advisable to limit and shorten the time when the Legislature meets, then, sir, it strikes me that it might be possible for the House to consider a question of that sort."

Here is a clear and distinct declaration on the part of Mr. Wetmore, in his general review of the financial situation, that the House might consider the question of biennial sessions. When Mr. Wetmore's leader declares that a reduction in the frequency of legislative sessions should be considered and that it strikes him "that it might be possible to consider it" with a view to retrenchment and economy, it does not lie in his mouth to say that he is not in favor of what he recommends. We think that we have made good our assertion that Mr. Wetmore favored biennial sessions a week ago. Now for the latter part of our charge, that he "took back water." In the first place Mr. Wetmore in speaking upon Mr. Popley's resolution favoring biennial sessions, misquoted himself. The Farmer tells us that in that speech, Mr. Wetmore in referring to what we have quoted above, said: "In speaking the other day, he had said that the finances of the province were in such a condition that it might have to become a question in the future to consider the necessity of holding biennial sessions." If we can understand the English language, the person who misrepresented Mr. Wetmore was Mr. Wetmore. In his speech on the budget there was nothing about considering the question in the future. It presented itself to Mr. Wetmore as a living issue which "should form a grave matter for consideration." The logical inference from Mr. Wetmore's first speech was that he would vote against it, notwithstanding his opinion that "it should form a grave matter for consideration," notwithstanding "it might be possible for the House to consider it," and notwithstanding the state of the finances which he professes

to think may make biennial sessions necessary. After all said and done, in what position does Mr. Wetmore stand to-day. His own organ tells us that he claims the financial condition of the province to be such that it may make biennial sessions necessary. We are not quite sure that we ought not to qualify our statement that Mr. Wetmore "took back water" by saying that he did so only so far as his vote was concerned, but that by his speech he gave the idea of biennial sessions all the impetus he could.

THE RIEL DEBATE.

Sir John Macdonald will, we suppose, be sustained by the vote on the Riel question. Most persons accepted that result as a foregone conclusion the moment the previous question was moved. No matter what may be said to the contrary or how Tory organs may repine about parliamentary rules, "the previous question" is a device to escape the full ventilation of a subject. It does not, under the rules of the Canadian Parliament, shut off discussion, but it prevents the moving of amendments giving effect to the views of the House as they may be developed during a debate. An amendment could easily have been framed which would have gained many votes which will not be given for Mr. Blake's motion, without losing any of the latter, and it was to prevent such an amendment that Sir Hector Langevin moved the previous question. The course is regular enough and as a piece of parliamentary tactics, is clever enough, but it is a confession of weakness; it is a confession on the part of the ministry that they fear at present to face any other resolution than that moved by Mr. Langevin. They expect, no doubt, that the Riel "bitter" will return to their allegiance after this vote, and that any motion which Mr. Blake may make will receive at most only a few supporters outside the regular opposition, some of whom will vote with the Government on the Riel resolution. This may be said of the previous question that it is usually a potent weapon before the people in the hands of those against whom it is employed.

The most important feature of the Riel debate is that the House really is talking and will vote in the dark. Mr. Blake, speaking at London, declared that this question ought not to be discussed until all the papers were before Parliament. He took the first opportunity of moving for them, but they have not been brought down. In the meantime Mr. Langevin put up in the Government interest to bring on a vote, and we have the sorry spectacle of a Parliament discussing a question involving many considerations without any of the papers relating to it being upon the table of the House. This is proper, in the German Reichstag or the Spanish Cortes, where the constitutional right of the people's representatives to information is not recognized, but such a suppression of facts, such a policy of concealment on the part of a ministry would not be tolerated in England. If Mr. Gladstone were to intrude to precipitate a vote upon any great question while he held back all papers throwing light upon it, public opinion would drive him out of office. In Canada it seems that all constitutional principles can be set at defiance. People seem to have grown hardened to abuses, but we are not without a hope that underlying this seeming indifference a strong undercurrent is setting in favor of honest, constitutional government, and that at the next appeal to the people this will be vindicated and the reins of power be taken out of the hands of those who have so basely misused them.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The local opposition in Sunbury have given their old time leader, Mr. W. E. Perley, the cold shoulder in rather a cruel fashion. They have declined to nominate him again in the Assembly. Of course he could not be elected, but they might have left their old champion die on the battlefield.

"Plant majority," "servile following," "mere puppets," these are the terms which the Opposition press applies to the Government supporters in the Assembly. It would strike most observers that a party could not be more independent than are the gentlemen who usually vote with the Government. They are unanimous upon one point, however, and that is that the present Opposition must stay out.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Discussion on Landry's Motion—Other Business.
OTTAWA, March 16.—In the house of commons this afternoon, after routine, Mr. Royal introduced a bill to incorporate Ontario, Minnesota and Manitoba Railway Company; Mr. Tupper a bill in respect to Pictou Bank; Mr. Kinney to incorporate Nova Scotia Steamship Company; Mr. Sain to incorporate Canadian Bank of Halifax; Mr. Small to incorporate the Medicine Hat Railway Company.

Mr. Allen moved the second reading of an act to extend the jurisdiction of the maritime court of Ontario, when Sir Hector Langevin moved in amendment that the house resume the debate on the proposed motion of Landry of Montmagny.

Mr. Blake asked if this would have effect of the bill being dropped. Mr. Speaker replied that it would. The minister of public works, therefore, agreed that if the hon member withdrew his motion they could proceed to the discussion mentioned without altering the position on the order paper referred to. This was assented to.

Mr. Rykert then resumed the debate on Landry's motion respecting Riel. He wore the house for hours by a ceaseless tirade against the Liberal government, presented a whole mass of irrelevant matter. He quoted extracts from Ontario Liberal organs of a quarter of a century ago to prove a charge of bigotry, and finally closed with an appeal to the holding Riel to come back to their old love.

Mr. Richard, an independent Liberal, followed, and said that it must not be forgotten that after all these extracts from the Toronto Globe attacking the Catholic religion—published years ago—had appeared, the publisher, Geo. Brown, was taken into the cabinet as a colleague of Sir John Macdonald, Sir George Cartier and Sir Hector Langevin. (Cheers) With that remark to the left Mr. Rykert to the meditations which a remembrance of such an unholy alliance would inspire. (Laughter) He then entered into an argument in support of Landry's resolution.

Mr. Laurier, Liberal leader of Quebec, who followed, was received with cheers. He proceeded eloquently to defend the French Canadian race from the gross calumnies cast upon it by the Toronto Mail, the organ of the present Government. The people of Quebec believed that the extension of Riel should not have taken place, because the rebellion was due to misadministration of the Government. It was that belief that gave force to the agitation in Quebec. If white settlers were responsible for the rebellion how comes it that no white settlers have been indicted? The minister of justice had instructed counsel to prosecute the white settlers but none had been connected. The immediate result of the rebellion was that the government granted to the half-breeds the claims they had previously neglected to even consider. He showed that the premier had denied the claims of half-breeds as such in his speech before the rebellion, but nine days after the first shot was fired he granted that which he had before refused. The criminals are not the men who fought, bled and died for their rights, but the men who at upon those treasury benches. He argued that Riel was hanged because of the murder of Scott, a murder which was as evidence of Riel's insanity. If Riel deserved the punishment of death for that indefensible murder why did not the Conservative government punish Riel from 1870 to the close of 1873, instead of sending him money and cheering him on? Mr. Chapleau's speech of a few weeks since calling the murder of Scott a great atrocity was in 1874, when he said this execution of Scott was "a great atrocity with political events as to make it impossible to assimilate it with murder." (Opposition laughter and cheers) Clearness should have been practiced in the case of Riel, for it was not possible to build up the case against him by shedding blood.

Mr. Caen moved the adjournment of the debate and the house rose at 12:35 a.m.

OTTAWA, March 17.—A short but eventful session was held in the Commons yesterday afternoon. Upon a vote being taken in a house of 191 members the division stood for the government 116; against, 75; majority 41. Thirteen ministers have been voted for their party as follows:—

Peter Mitchell, Guibault, Giroud, of Jacques Cartier; Gaudet, Desmarais, of Assiniboia; Desjardins, Council, McMillan, of Val d'Or; Landry, of Montmagny; Bergeron, Amyot, Giguat and Dupont.

In honor of St. Patrick's day the house adjourned at 6 o'clock. Sir Adolphe Caron will resume the debate on Riel this afternoon.

GENERAL NEWS.

Eleven thousand women have petitioned the Dominion Parliament in favor of Mr. Charlton's bill making seduction a crime.

The Quebec Legislature have been summoned to meet on the 8th of April.

The annual income of the Salvation Army in England is quoted at \$400,000.

Miss Susan B. Anthony asserts that twenty-six members of the United States Senate are in favor of woman suffrage.

There are 18,000 lady students in the colleges of the United States.

The Chinese should be a very polite people. They have 563 books on behavior.

The American Catholics are to establish a university at Washington.

Mr. Lytle, of Oregon, who is said to be 100 years old, not long ago carried a burden of fifty pounds weight a distance of two miles.

It is said that previous to its conversion into a coal hulk the Great Eastern will be used as a hotel during the Shipping Exhibition which is to be held in Liverpool in the coming summer.

THE LEGISLATURE.

Summary of Proceedings for the Last Two Days.

The Franchise Act—Other Business.

The Government bill relating to the Court of Equity, which has been passed two previous sessions and met with defeat up stairs, was agreed to on Tuesday in the house, after a straight party division of 21 to 6. The York County Council bill relating to coroners, which Mr. Wilson had in charge, passed in committee, with an amendment relating to the number of coroners in St. John. The principal discussion of Tuesday was over the franchise bill. This bill is much the same as that passed last year, the most important change being in the manner of appointing the revising commission, who are to be appointed by the Chief Justice instead of by the Governor, as in the old bill. Mr. Ellis moved a bill with a resolution to the effect that any change in the franchise should be based upon the idea of universal suffrage. He supported the resolution in a short speech, and was backed up by Messrs. Adams, Nockton and Park. The Attorney General defended the measure as it was claiming that an examination of the provisions would show that it gave the vote to all who could reasonably be deemed worthy of the franchise. He favored a wide extension of the franchise, but did not think a vote ought to be given to the floating element of the population. He thought that every industrious resident of the province would be enfranchised by the bill. The Solicitor General showed up the inconsistency in Mr. Adams' course, pointing out that a few years ago that gentleman had opposed the extension of the franchise. He made out a strong case for the appointment of revising commissioners. Mr. Killam thought that the rental qualification should be reduced to \$20. Discussions on the bill were resumed yesterday and Mr. Ellis' resolution was defeated on the following vote:

Section three, which fixes the qualification of voters, was held over by the Attorney General for further consideration. It will probably be worked so as to meet every reasonable requirement. There was a long discussion yesterday over a bill which St. John gas light company seek to get power to introduce the electric light. This bill meets with a very lively opposition, the principal ground for which appears to be that the gas company is charged with aiming to crush out the electric light companies. Progress was reported.

Mr. Pugley's bill to give widows and spinners a right to vote at school meetings was disposed of by the statement of the Attorney General that they could do so under the law as it stands. Routine business occupied the remainder of the afternoon, and committee work engaged the attention of members all this morning.

William T. Standen, the well-known insurance expert of New York, speaking of the system of the Dominion Safety Fund Life Association, St. John, N. B., says: "I do not think I ever saw so perfect a plan, adapted in every way to the wants of those who look for a cheap and reliable form of life insurance. I examined it with the intention of finding some fault with it, if possible; but I was unable to lay my hands upon any element of weakness." Messrs. Morris and Fresse are the city agents.

The Missing Registered Letters.
Post Office Inspector McMillan went to Chatham on Tuesday night to make investigations in the matter of the missing registered letters. The letters were mailed at Chatham a week ago for St. John, but as yet have failed to reach their destination. All efforts so far to find the missing letters have proved unavailing.

A Grand Hindu Festival.
The ladies of the Free Baptist Church are arranging for a grand Hindu festival to be given in the vestry of the church on Thursday evening, 25th inst. Refreshments will be served in oriental style during the evening. Among the attractive novelties to be presented during the evening a number of the Hindu gods and goddesses and other India curiosities will be exhibited by Miss Jessie Hooper, who will also deliver an address during the evening. A programme of music, recitations, readings, &c., is also being prepared.
