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**ELECTRIC THAWING MACHINE ORDERED**

Many Water Services Reported Frozen in Recent Cold Weather.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present: Councillors Ingram, Devereaux, Bissett and Campbell. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. The Clerk read a communication from the Canadian Reconstruction Association as follows:—

Toronto, Ont., January 29th, 1920.

The City Clerk, Campbellton, N. B.

Dear Sir:—

The heavy discount on Canadian exchange is a symptom of an unhealthy national condition. Apparently the only permanently effective remedies are an increase in production in the Dominion and the development of export trade, curtailment of unnecessary imports, and substitution, to the largest possible extent, of Canadian products for imported commodities. In the national interest Canada must attain a larger measure of economic independence. It can do so by developing the home market. A pronounced demand for made in Canada goods would constitute a guarantee of sales which would encourage factory expansion. By such expansion, new wealth would be created through increased production, and steady and profitable employment would be provided for new industrial populations. Any substantial increase in industrial workers would create bigger and better markets for all kinds of farm produce. New factories, greater production, more workers, and better agricultural markets mean national progress.

During the first seven months of the current fiscal year 1919-20 per cent. of all imports into Canada for consumption came from the United States. On such imports we now have to pay a premium of from 8 to 10 per cent. on account of exchange, an additional cost to the Canadian people of more than \$60,000,000 a year. Further, we are giving employment to foreign workers instead of to Canadian labor and buying from American companies which neither pay taxes in this country nor provide any appreciated market for other Canadian products.

There is another serious side of the problem which cannot be overlooked. The world exchange situation threatens still further to curtail orders from overseas, especially for manufacturers, and if the slack is to be taken up, it must be by increased support from the home market.

The situation now confronting the Dominion demands national co-operation. The Canadian Reconstruction Association believes that as there is an obligation upon the Canadian manufacturers to meet home market demands and to provide employment for Canadians, it is equally incumbent upon the Dominion to promote national prosperity by buying Canadian goods.

This Association is asking consideration by municipal councils throughout Canada of the following resolutions:—

"Resolved that this Council endorse the principle that public supplies be purchased in Canada whenever they can be secured from Canadian factories at reasonable prices. And further, that all municipal officers in making purchases shall be, and hereby are, requested to consider the possibility of securing Canadian products."

Please be good enough to advise this Association of any action which you may take with reference to the above resolution.

Coun. Bissett moved that this Council adopt the above resolution and that the whole article be printed in the local paper.—Carried.

Another letter was read from the Firemen at the Electric Light station asking that attention be paid to their demand for increase of pay.

Coun. Bissett stated that as Mr. Farrer was manager of Electric Light department such requests must come in through him.

Mrs. J. P. Andrew wrote stating that she understood that her late husband had a flat rate of 1.00 per month for motor power at blacksmith shop, but lately she had been billed from \$2.00 to \$4.00 per month.

The matter was referred to the Electric Light Committee.

A communication from the Municipal Council of Gloucester, with resolutions re the Caranet & Gulf Railway was read and laid in the table.

Communication from the Central Fire extinguishers stating that a mistake had been made in prices which were now more than double that quoted. Matter was laid on table.

His Worship read a letter from the District Superintendent of the C.N.R. stating that the National Editorial Association would visit Campbellton and suggested that steps be taken to provide means of giving these distinguished visitors an opportunity of viewing our country.

Coun. Devereaux moved that this Council appoint a committee to act with the Board of Trade to look after this matter.—Carried.

All Trains Late and Roads in Country Blocked—Lighter West.

The province of New Brunswick was snow bound for two days last week. In the southern part of the province much damage was done to telegraph, telephone and electric lines. At Campbellton only about 10 inches of snow fell and the wind was not high, but further north the wind blew hard and over a foot of snow fell, which drifted badly.

Friday's and Saturday's trains were hours late, but by Sunday the passenger service was back to normal.

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**WANT BETTER R. R. SERVICE**

Association Formed to Get Better Service on Gaspe Coast.

An important meeting took place recently at the Chateaux Frontenac, Quebec in order to take into consideration the railway situation of the Gaspe coast. This meeting had been called by the Honorable John Hall Kelly, and were present among others the following:—

The Honorable Frank Carrel, Legislative Councillor for the Gulf division; Mr. J. F. Bugeaud, M.P.P., for the County of Bonaventure; Mr. Angus McLean, representing the Bonaventure Lumber Co., and the Caspédia Mfg. & Trading Co.; Mr. William Power, M.P., Quebec, owner of the Grande Vallée Lumber Co.; Mr. David Champoux, representing the Chateaux Bay Mills; Mr. R. L. Montgomery representing Montgomery & Sons Ltd.; Mr. J. E. Brantley, representing the St. Maurice Lumber Co.; Mr. George C. Scott, representing the P. Q. Lumber Co.; Mr. Charles Maclean, representing the Henderson Lumber Co.; Mr. W. Mullin, representing the Great Eastern Paper Co.; Mr. W. F. Napier, representing the Shives Lumber Co.; Mr. J. E. Brantley, representing the St. Lawrence Pulp and Lumber Corporation.

All of these gentlemen are interested in lumber business on the Gaspe coast.

All present were unanimous in declaring that the railways as operated at present between Matapedia and Gaspe Basin were preventing the Gaspe coast from expanding and that until said railway situation is changed further commercial development will be impossible. The road is no longer capable of taking care of the passenger and freight traffic. Instances were cited by the gentlemen present where they have refused to operate their limits and to go ahead with further developments on account of this railway situation.

An Association was formed known as "ASSOCIATION FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF THE RAILWAY SITUATION ON THE GASPE COAST."

The Honorable Frank Carrel was appointed Honorary President.

The following officers were then elected:—President—Honorable John Hall Kelly.

Vice-Presidents—Mr. Fabien Bugeaud, M.P.P., of Champeaux, of the Chateaux Bay Mills, and Mr. Eugene Bouillon, of the firm of Robin, Jones & Whitman.

A general committee was then formed consisting of the President, the Vice-Presidents and Messrs. Angus McLean, William Power, R. L. Montgomery, J. W. Brantley, George C. Scott, Charles R. Maclean, W. Mullin, W. F. Napier.

The following resolutions were then unanimously adopted:

1. "It was unanimously resolved that the Executive Committee take the necessary steps to place before the Federal Government the real situation concerning the said railways showing that they can no longer answer the requirements of the Gaspe coast and that the Government, after investigating the value of the said railways, do not have the same, and failing an agreement that the value be determined by arbitration."

2. "That in waiting until this is done, that the Board of Railway Commissioners be petitioned in order to compel said railways to furnish a daily mail and passenger service each way from Matapedia to Gaspe."

3. "That the Honorable Charles Maclell, M. P., for the County of Bonaventure, the Honorable Rodolphe Lemieux, M. P., for the County of Gaspe, the members of the Clergy, the Wardens of the Counties of Bonaventure and Gaspe, the Mayors and municipal Councillors of the two said Counties, the business men, farmers and citizens generally be asked to co-operate in order to have the said railways taken over and operated by the Government."

4. "It was also resolved that every one interested in the Gaspe Peninsula be requested to join this Association."

5. "That the co-operation of the Bishop of the diocese of Rimouski and of the people of the town of Campbellton and of the Board of Trade of the town of Campbellton be also requested in order to bring about the object for which the Association has been formed."

Before the war a daily service each way existed between Matapedia and Gaspe. During the war the service between Gaspe Basin and New Carlisle being made daily as it was before the war, the present management has cut down the said service from New Carlisle to Gaspe. The service from Matapedia to

**DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT WINDSOR**

Main Building of King's College Burned Thursday Afternoon.

Windsor, Feb. 11.—The main building of King's College was totally destroyed by fire here this afternoon. The fire commenced in the servants' quarters and owing to the poor water pressure all efforts to stop it failed and it quickly spread throughout the structure. This building includes servant quarters, dining room, students' quarters and the president's residence. Almost all the students' personal property was saved as also were the personal effects of the president. The chapel and the new wing together with Dr. Willett's residence were saved owing to the hard work of the Windsor fire department. The building was damaged amounting to about \$70,000, only \$30,000 of which was covered by insurance.

**EDITOR'S MAIL**

Dalhousie, N. B. Feb. 9th, 1920

The writer wishes to take this opportunity to thank a certain party who is aspiring for political honors, for his very generous offer made to the town authorities some time ago, and assure him that his action will be fully compensated by myself and friends in the coming election.

Although I would not for one moment reflect on the good character of this party, I am at a loss to know to whom credit is due for the unsuccessful attempt made on the life of my dog Sunday afternoon between 1 and 2 o'clock, almost immediately following his report to the officials, when the crack of two rifle or revolver shots were heard. 

TOWN MANAGERS.

We are indeed gratified that so many ratepayers are advocating the employment of a town manager. To any who have gone into this matter, the scheme seems to be a most business-like one and has everything to commend it.

In addressing the Woodstock town council, Mr. John Fleming, one of the progressive business men of that town is reported to have said:—

"He commended the council for bringing about the policy of town management, and was convinced that one man management of town affairs would bring about much better results than the old committee methods. He would also congratulate the council for the selection of Mr. Armstrong as town manager."

The idea of a town manager seems reasonable and we are sure the present Council would be greatly assisted and relieved if such a man was in charge of our town affairs.

THE GOOD ROADS MOVEMENT.

The Provincial Government's enormous efforts to improve the roads of the province is in line with what is being done in the other provinces and in the United States. The only drawback is that the roads have been so neglected under previous administrations that very large sums are required to show good results. Had a few millions been spent on our roads years ago it would have been a good investment, for then wages were low and money went a long way.

The present government has spent about 2,000,000 on permanent roads, and there is general testimony to the marked improvement which has been effected all over the province. To secure this money the Government funded the motor vehicle tax, which is increasing every year. Motor vehicles are hard on roads, and it is only proper that their owners should contribute to the making of permanent roads. The present motor vehicle tax will provide interest and sinking fund on all money spent so far on permanent roads and charged to capital account. As the number of vehicles increases further amounts will be available for funding.

Most of the American States are arranging to construct permanent roads on road work this year. It is said an immense impetus has been given to the Good Road's Movement by soldiers returning from France where they saw how much good roads contributed to the comfort and convenience of a people.—Transcript.

### NO MAN NEEDED.

This Lighthouse Can Be Worked From the Inland Shore

### I. N. R. BUSINESS MEN IN EARNEST

Want Improved Train and Mail Service—Strong Petition.

The meeting of the Board of Trade called for Friday evening was well attended despite the storm. President D. Murray presided.

The President explained that because of the very heavy storms which delayed all trains, Hon. Mr. Veniot, Minister of Public Works was not able to come up from Bathurst in time for the meeting but planned to be in Campbellton Saturday and would meet the committee, re bridge, and attend a meeting of the Board of Trade.

Mr. H. J. Currie reported that the committee appointed to interview Hon. Mr. Veniot, and get all information in reference to a bridge had not been able to meet Mr. Veniot as he was away, but that gentleman had agreed to come to Campbellton as above stated. The committee had received from Engineer Stead plans and drawings of a bridge and much valuable information.

Mr. D. Stewart said that in 1913 he had occasion to go to Quebec and Ottawa and this bridge matter was discussed with the Quebec Minister of Public Works and the Dominion Minister of Public Works and the proposal that the province of Quebec should pay twenty-five per cent, New Brunswick twenty-five per cent and the Dominion fifty per cent of the cost of a bridge was looked favorably upon by all.

Mr. W. H. Wallace moved that Mr. Bastedo and as many members of the Restigouche Municipal Council as possible be invited to attend Saturday night's meeting—Carried.

Mr. W. H. Wallace reported that a publicity committee was doing some work in this regard. He asked that two additional members, P. M. Shannon and A. C. Belleville be added to the committee.

Mr. Geo. G. McKenzie moved that these two members be added to the Publicity Committee—Carried.

Mr. J. E. McDonald of St. Quentin was introduced to the meeting and placed the following petition before the Board of Trade:

To the Honourable President and Members of the Campbellton Board of Trade:

Dear Sirs:

We, the undersigned men and companies doing business along the International Railway, understand that we cannot join your Board on account of not being residents of Campbellton but hope that you appreciate the business we do in your town and assure you that we will all be glad to increase the name if we had proper accommodation and we all believe that if you gentlemen demand of the Canadian Government Railways, a daily express and daily mail that we would get it and at least double our purchases and business in your town during the months of December and January which are the dull months in the year.

We can assure you that passengers and freight were at least double the accommodation we had, in fact Conductors had to go by stations knowing that if they stopped they would endanger the lives of the passengers who were already pushed as much as standing room would allow and platforms and steps filled, thereby leaving 25 passengers, who could not get home.

Regarding mail, you have only to take a photograph of the mail teams carrying our mail from post office to station to realize that it is a disgrace to ask us to mail on a tri-weekly mail, without a mail car or mail clerk.

As you gentlemen can see the service given on other branches of the I. N. R. A Frontier College.

The Reading Camp Association, which was started nineteen years ago by Mr. Alfred Fitzpatrick, a graduate of Queen's, to provide daily newspapers and other attractive reading matter for lumber, mining, and construction camps, has grown to such an extent that it was incorporated recently under the name of the "Frontier College." In order that more attention may be paid to the education of the workmen, Mr. Fitzpatrick has secured a grant from the Government of the Province of Ontario, and Mr. Fitzpatrick hopes to extend its good work in the future.

The staff of the "Frontier College" is as unique as the organization itself, being chosen from college graduates or under-graduates who must understand the point of view of the men and who consequently share with them their daily labor. It is only during the evening that the instructor does his real work in the camps, and he is now required to sign an agreement to teach a minimum of ten hours a week, Saturday night being set aside for entertainment, and, if possible, Sunday being occupied with reading and writing letters. Dr. J. B. Macdougall, in his book "Building the North," pays a high tribute to the success of the "Frontier College." The organization receives small grants from the Governments of the different provinces, but the financial burden is carried chiefly by a few public-spirited citizens who appreciate the excellent results which flow from it.
