The temperance meeting held in Victoria Hall on Saturday evening was well attended. Ihe management had very wisely prepared a varied programme so that to a sound temperance talk was added the pleasures of a concert of instrumental and vocal music by the Band of the Seventh Fusiliers, with congregational and solo singing. The chair was occupied by County Crown Attorney Hutchinson, and with him on the platform were the Bishop of Huron, Rev. Canon Richardson, Rev. A. C. Courtice, Rev. M. P. Talling and several other prominent citizens who have identified themselves with the temperance movement. After a short opening service and a selection from the band, Mr. J. W. Belcher was called upon for a solo, and in reply he sang "Calvary" in a very creditable manner, receiving an encore.

The speech-making was opened by the chairman, who related his experiences with the many criminals that had passed through his hands as Crown prosecutor. He cited some evidence which had been taken by the l'rison Commission, showing that intemperance was the chief cause of crime, and stated that an excellent prison authority had before the same commission expressed the conviction that if the atmosphere outside of the jails was made as pure as that found on the inside there would be a remarkable falling off or crime and a smaller number of criminals.

The Bishop of Huron was then called on for the address of the evening. In opening the Bishop said: "I have been called upon to speak on a subject which in importance is second only to that of religion itself. I need not discant upon that with which you are all well aware—the widespread ravages which the use of strong drink has brought upon us. It is enough that we have judges charging, jailers testifying and attorneys speaking of it as the one terrible and fruitful source of crime." The speaker then endeavored to make clear the fact that each individual had an influence, and that if a person wished to help the cause along they could do so in the most effective manner by setting a good example. He did not blame the distillers or dealers of liquor, because they represented the wishes of the community, and were supported by the public sentiment of the people. They were kept in the business by the people, who could if they desired shut up the distilleries and liquor stores by becoming themselves total abstainers.

GRAND TRUNK EXPENSES.

There was one feature of the Grand Trunk Railway's annual meeting of special interest to Canadians, and that was the strong belief expressed by President Sir Henry Tyler, and Mr. Sergeant, general traffic manager, that the prosperity of the road would be vastly increased in future by the tunnel under the St. Clair River. No doubt seems to be entertained on that point. It is a most important work, and calculated to facilitate and greatly add to the traffic handled by the company.

Some crificisms were included in as to the management of the road. Western railway men do not agree that the expense of managing the G. T. R. is too high, and it is held that, compared with other roads, the cost of management is low.

There are, it is true, expenses which the management would doubtless be glad to re-duce, and could reduce, if they had the cooperation of our rulers. The company's fuel is taxed, and that represents a large sum every year paid out by the Grand Trunk. The result is that, in competing for traffic with lines across the border which pay no tax on coal, the company is placed at a disadvantage an unrecessary disadvantage that is hurt-ful to the railway as well as to its employes and the Canadian public. The same re-mark holds good about the raw material used by the company, especially the iron required to build and equip its rolling stock. For these expenses, arounting in all to a large sum every year, neither the all to a large sum every year, neither the directors nor the cynployes of the company are responsible; but it can readily be seen that impositions of this description render the work of competing with United States lines difficult and add much to the general

expense of management.

We have heard it said by the advocates of the high taxation system that our great railway interests should be independent of the United States, and it has been seriously suggested by some of our restrictionist contemporaries that what Canada needed to make her independent and great was a cessation of inter-course with the United States. No more suicidal policy could be advocated, yet some of those journals and the mischievous politicians whose sentiments they express, politicians whose sentiments they express, have done everything in their power to bring about such a state of affairs. 

The Duke of Argyll on Hypnotism.

The London Spectator contained a letter by the Duke of Argyll on Hypnotism. The Duke relates what he saw on one occasion in the house of the late Dr. Gregory, professor of chemistry in the University of Edinburgh. 




